It is a new year and I do not plan on wasting any time getting going. As of now, David will handle the sales for the United States and Canada. Marisol and Eduardo will handle Mexico and South America with them all sharing California. Ben and IJX will handle Asia and India, Jeroen and IJN will handle Europe. Alice, Vinnie, and I will be in charge of visiting existing customers worldwide as needed. I will also be in charge, along with Ben, for new areas of business.

The new product lines:

- 1. Telecom Panels-developed by IJUS produced and assembled by IJX. We are making progress here and will continue to hit this area hard.
- 2. Injection Molded plastics, fabricated metals, machined metals and plastics, caste metal parts and cable assemblies will be coordinated through IJX
- 3. New gasket line produced by IJX. They will also coordinate our two partners there. Testing will be coordinated through IJUS.
- 4. Our general label products lines will be produced by IJUS and IJX
- 5. The SGS Program-Ideal Jacobs Medical limited has been created in Hong Kong and will coordinate the marketing, selling, production and running of the associated facilities. This program too will be sold by all.
- 6. New manufacturing and distribution centers. None are currently planned for 2008, but more will be set for 2009.
- 7. New companies: created as needed either for new product areas or new ventures.

My job is now mostly to be the rainmaker, coordinator, facilitator and problem-solver for all current and new programs. I am to help find new customers, pave the way for agreements and find new areas of business. I will also be in charge of finding, financing and everything else that is not in the day-to-day areas. My people must stop me if I attempt to dive back down into the day-to-day details of various projects where I am more comfortable, but not utilized to my fullest potential for Ideal Jacobs worldwide.

I am passing the day-to-day running of the QEO System to Mike and Vinnie, but will still run the annual audits. This year's audits should be done by this Friday.

With that in mind, part of my work for the next few days will be to modify our current informational booklet regarding the SGS to answer all of the questions posed by our potential partners in Mexico. I am sure that these will be the same questions asked by others; therefore, we might as well get them taken care of now regarding the overall scope and philosophy of the project.

When treating cancer there are four main areas of concern.

- 1. You want the highest success rate as possible for the people you are treating (the best being cured, the next best being remission).
- 2. You want the least amount of side effects from the treatment for the comfort of the patients so that they are healthier, more likely to survive and other patients will be more willing to undergo the procedure. The fewer symptoms and problems, the less money is spent on medication, hospital stays and other associated costs. It is also best from the profit standpoint.
- 3. You want the least amount of treatment as possible because it is less harmful and time-consuming for the patient, less of a chance for bad side effects and less costly to treat them.
- 4. You want to detect the cancer as early as possible so that the areas you are attacking are at their smallest. They are also the easiest to treat, have the highest chances to be cured and reduce the number of treatments needed. This will all save money.

Therefore, this is one of those fantastic win/win situations where everyone benefits if the cancer is caught and treated early. It will have better cure rates, less of a chance of side effects, reduced intensity of the side effects, less of an overall trauma for the patients and less of an expense on all levels. In order to accomplish this, early detection is needed. We are not presuming that the causes of cancer including heredity, diet, smoking, pollution and work environment will be dealt with on a nationwide or local basis anytime soon. Therefore, we have to make the assumption that the current rates of cancer will continue

at the same levels.

Cancer patients who have been diagnosed in the early stages are our most cost-effective and hence most profitable areas. We need to find as many of these people as possible. To do this, we need to set-up a flow of patients hospitals and/or scanning centers. Since we will have a hospital involved without joint venture, the odds are good that they will have the full body scanning equipment necessary to detect patients with cancer. But it would also be in our best interest to make alliances with other scanning centers that will be willing to refer their cancer patients to us. We could give either a referral fee to the scanning centers or invite them in as minority partner in exchange for a guaranteed amount of patients per month. We need to offer these full body scans at a discount so we can get more patients in and detect their cancer at earlier stages. The additional volume of the patients should make up for the decreased charges and will enable us to maximize our patient influx.

In order to make this venture profitable, we have to keep the center running at full capacity with as many patients as possible. Again, the least amount of treatments per patient will also be more cost-efficient and thus more profitable. Since we invoice per patient and not per treatment, an early detection is critical.

Perhaps, we can also contact the government to help us with scanning small suspect areas of the population who might not be seeking treatment until their conditions are much worse.

We need to utilize our strengths and have them work with insurance companies, the government and other health related organizations whose main interest is reducing patient cost and maximizing patient health.

Again, we are all working towards the same thing: helping as many people as possible with the highest success rates, getting least amount of side effects, reducing overall cost per patient and maximizing profits for all.

I then played tennis again with David the Pro. By the time I finished, I was barely walking, but it was a good pain and it felt great. I met David for lunch, edited my new book and then swam a little. Bunny finally got home from France in the late afternoon. She and the boys had a fantastic trip in Paris and then it was out to dinner. Afterwards, I edited some more and went to sleep.

David was nice enough to offer to get up this morning so I am scheduled to play with him from 7:30 until 8:30. So far we are ahead of sales from last year, which is a very good thing.

Ben and Alex are back at school and the house has returned to normal. It was good having them home and good this way also. I am getting restless. It's time to get back out on the road.

Al leaves on Friday for England and will be back ten days later

The gasket area seems heavy with potential and David is coming in tomorrow and then going on sales calls. The idea of a recession and cost-cutting is running in our favor as people will be more likely to change suppliers and products for reduced prices. I am going to North Carolina to see a new customer at the end of the month. I hope to sell them both a lot of labels and gaskets.

Kayla's swim meet for Friday was cancelled; I was going to go to it. I try to see her swim once a year. I hope that I can re-schedule for the 31st. I know once doesn't sound like much, but their schedule does not make it easy for me to attend. Alex and Ben are back at school and seem fine. I am having fun.

1/19/08 2:59 EST Home, NJ

The email has been crazy regarding the SGS Project and the

potential centers. At this point, it looks like Marisol has two good prospects to call on when Ben, she and I meet in Guadalajara next month. This, plus the facility in Malaysia on which Ben has been working gives us three good possibilities and a problem as well. If we take the profits from IJX and mortgage the property in China, we should have just enough money to buy one SGS unit outright. Otherwise, we are going to have to either bring one of the Chinese equipment manufacturers as a partner, try for outside financing or only go ahead with one project. While I have no urge to give the Chinese company a disproportionate amount of the stock in a joint venture, I am also aware that if we go for venture capital or private investors in the US, they will not want to participate for nothing. I could always try to get a loan myself, but I am not sure if I want to. I promised Wendy that we would get rid of the debt in China here first before going into anything else. We still have about \$265,000.00 left to pay on that. My wife is very wise and I know that she wants me to mortgage China before even considering anything else, which is what I will do. I have no urge to be in debt in the US for a moment longer than needed yet I don't have as much problem if it is outside the US. Therefore, I will hold my position and wait until we get to Mexico, see what is possible and go from there. Since I am already ready to take the plunge for the first center, it is not a problem. It is the next two that will be an issue. When it rains, it pours. I have no intention of letting any of these possibilities get away if we can find a way to make them work. Besides, I am hopeful that both of the groups in Mexico will want to continue the journey and franchise through Mexico and then South America.

Tonight we are going with friends to New York City, a very rare occurrence, but Wendy really wanted to go to the restaurant where Barry is a chef so it should be interesting. I hope it is an okay time. I would like to enjoy going into New York. It probably stems from when I was just out of college and did not get a job there. I remember the hopeless feeling of looking up at the skyscrapers and realizing that no one in that town cared if I lived or died. I am glad I got out quickly. But times are different. It has been thirty years and I will try to keep a more open mind.

Al is in England. Tomorrow she goes to the Netherlands to meet up with Jeroen. I hope her cold is better. They have a lot of ground to cover with huge potential for business. I am glad that I am going to North Carolina, Mexico and China over the next two months. The road is calling.

I also need to start saving for the first quarter of this year. We are getting stretched, but the moment of truth is coming. I can feel it and I plan to go for it.

The first gasket proof for the first order is coming in a few days. I saw a picture. It looks good so far. It is the start of a whole new product line. I am very excited about the prospect. David should already be in New England, getting ready for tomorrow.

1/21/08 9:56 EST Monday Night – Home, NJ

On Thursdays, I usually play tennis early at 6:15 AM. I forgot last week and arrived late. I felt horrible and even worse; I went into intense paranoia for this morning's game. I added an extra alarm clock

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so I am now up to five. This cannot be good.

I got a call from Al. Jeroen and she are getting along well; they are in Munich. Unfortunately, Al's suitcase is not and she called me in despair. She will be in Italy tomorrow and if she does not get her suitcase back in the morning when she goes back to the airport, then she can buy new supplies later in the day. It is horrible to lose your suitcase and even worse when you are sick. She has a bad cold. The good news is she is with Jeroen and he can watch out for her. I miss her and hope she is okay.

David is doing fine on his latest sales swing. He is costing a lot, but I believe he will do well.

I had a customer call for another version of a piece of business where we have been getting killed because of all the changes. With that in mind, I will set up pricing guidelines so that 50% to 75% of the estimating will be able to be done by others. Once this is done, I will have more time for overall command, new products and sales areas. It is the next logical step and time to give up this last bastion of my old function. I have to let it go and I will do so. It is in the best interest of everyone.

I play tennis early tomorrow. I screwed it up last week and now I am paranoid about being late. My five alarm clocks will be set for 3:30 AM, which should be enough to get me up.

Kayla is up studying for her midterm exams. It is amazing how hard she works. I miss Al, but it is good she is away to check our systems.

I created the first draft of the new pricing system today. Once we

get it fine tuned, we will spread it to the other areas of the business and test it over the next six months. Eventually, it will become our primary source of pricing and I will pull back in this area. In the future, it will allow me to save at least 20% of my time, which is a huge chunk. After speaking with Dan Gallagher, I think I will start the new carbon credit business. I am not sure if anything will come of it, but it sounds interesting. I want to see if I can get the credits and then trade or retire them. Besides, I hope I can use it for PT since I am not sure if we have any other major areas for pollution reduction.

Al is in Paris. Her calls went well even with all of the traveling and luggage problems.

I think we will be hiring more people to give Alice and me more time to move into new areas. Al can take over more of my jobs and I can move further into new projects like the SGS System. I heard from Ben in Malaysia; it looks like they almost have a deal with a hospital and we have been invited to participate. David is back from New England. The two SGS prospects are being reviewed by our potential Mexican partners. His trip went well he will go back in another two weeks. I am having adrenalin surges followed by periods of tiredness. It is strange and exhilarating while the surges last.

I went to temple this morning and then went biking. It was cold, about 34 degrees Fahrenheit and by the time the ride was over, I had on almost all the clothes I was carrying. I have decided we will pursue the idea of finding and trading carbon credits. My initial tactic will be to try to negotiate where I gather them, but only pay for them if I can actually sell them. I will start with Dan's company and work from there. They will need to add a clause to their contract saying that their company holds the rights to all carbon credits for the life of their projects. I am not sure if they are willing, but it is worth a try.

There are all kinds of changes of variations that will come in for the new pricing guide, it will take a lot of work and testing, but I feel I can inject most of my experience into it so I can gradually leave it to Al. Eventually, I will move it to our other companies and product lines.

Since I made the decision to make changes, my stomach has been uneasy, but the paths seem to be opening. For this project, we will need our contacts at EPA; I will set our groundwork first and then try to go in to see them. Maybe I will go to Washington if necessary to try to set up national guidelines for trading both within and outside of the US. It should be an interesting process and at the very least I hope it will enable us to stay in PT by moving into an area not having been done before. It also makes me wonder if we should have another company or run it through IJUS. Otherwise, it may not hold for EPA. Since IJUS does not mention any of our product lines there is really no reason why we could not flow the energy work through it except of course if any legal problems arise. I will need to think about it.

It is time for my 25,000 mile check-up for my car. As opposed to having to bring it in and pick it up again later, I decided to wait for her. Mike, the service man I have used before, promised an hour and fifteen minutes and he has never been wrong. I am using the time to write, edit, try out the new price list that I created and have a little time to be by myself.

Al is back from Europe and whenever she is gone, I get involved again in day-to-day activities. It gives me the chance to see what changes might be made to make the systems run better.

The pricing system that I created will hopefully not only take into account the actual costs of products, but also the variables that I use to arrive at our prices. Often it is not what the product costs to make, but rather what the market conditions will allow us to charge. Estimating prices is an art form. You can do it by straight formulas, but will then often lose the chance at higher profits. Codifying the system has be-

come an interesting challenge. We also have the added considerations of products coming in from overseas that we re-sell the currency fluctuations, the apparent impending recession and others. At this point, it is a 'feel" for me and I can do it very quickly, but it is time to give this area to Al and her people. The initial price list is done. Now we start to run it against my pricing to coordinate them and get them to get as close as possible. Al and her people will have ranges from which they can charge so they can add their own feelings for pricing. This is a big deal because the feel of the market place both high and low is critical for our success.

The second area at which I am looking is production. We have never codified how long various tasks take such as creating a film positive, making a screen, and printing a job. My plans are to take care of all aspects of production and then have Mike create a system where we know roughly how long things will take and schedule them accordingly. This will hopefully allow us more time for rush jobs and keeping our customers happy. I figure that it will take about six months for both systems to be up, running, tested and have people trained.

Today is the Florida primary and there are no returns yet. The only sure thing seems that if Mr. Giuliani does not do well, he might be out of the race. On the other side, it looks like Mr. Edwards may be in trouble, but politics changes so quickly. It is hard to tell. The president is trying to get through an economic stimulus program, which I don't understand. The pricing system that I created needed some tweaking, but I am hoping that instead of the third quarter for implementation, it may be ready as early as next month. I am planning that it will cut down at least 80% of the time that I spend on pricing, which is a huge chunk of time.

Tomorrow we start to go over the revised in-house production system, which will also generate actual costs for all jobs, something we have never had before.

I am getting ready to launch the carbon credit brokerage business and in order to do that, I think that we will have to go in stages. The first is to be accepted back into PT with our one big significant aspect helping to codify carbon credits throughout the United States. It will be a huge undertaking and I have been thinking about the best way to go about it. We are strong in some areas and weak in others. Our strength is having good ties to the Federal EPA, which could accept a plan on how to define and measure certain carbon credits on its own. That, I believe, would then be recognized around the world. The trick is going to be creating the plan, getting it to the right people, and then helping to get the right person to agree to sign off on it, which I think is the head of the EPA. That is not so simple. It is a process, but I think we have to have the whole plan ready before we start. I will begin by defining what, when, where, why and how carbon credits can be handled within the United States, which may or may not be in total agreement with the rest of the world. At this point, a lot of companies are selling carbon credits based on their own forests, windmills or anything else, but are not federally approved. That is what we need, a federal structure and system to implement.

It is a big project, but I have some extra time and plan to take a shot at it. EPA needs a winner especially in the public relations area and this could deliver a lot of good press for them not to mention align us with the rest of the world.

I can't help believe that no matter how much renewable fuel that we can produce, nuclear is going to have to be part of our infrastructure. So with that in mind, I will move forward to eventually be part of a nuclear-fueled plant probably somewhere in Mexico.

My tennis friend's son is opening in a Broadway show tonight. He is the second male lead, replacing another actor. His father and mother are in the audience and I am sure that they are both gleaming in pride. It is a great thing when your children are good people. It is also great when they strive for and reach some of their goals. Their success spreads to everyone around them, which is a wonderful thing.

I finished the second draft of the production system; it seems pretty good so far. We will have to test it along with the next draft of the pricing system. It is moving faster than I had anticipated. They may be ready to go within two weeks.

Uncle Dave challenged me yesterday to write a new employee application/screening form that would enable our people all over the world to be able to get the type of employees they want, including here in the US, no matter what position.

I started the form and it has been an interesting exercise. I was originally going to use ranges of asking a question with 1 being the least and 5 being the most but since I am trying to cover all positions from sales, to computer people, to production people on the manufacturing floor, I decided to go for general answers instead. Obviously, the form is biased toward my point of view. I tried to infuse myself in a type of artificial intelligence where the survey does the work. The answers would be reviewed by the local IJ location. I don't know if it has merit, but is has been fun trying.

Since I got up at 2:30 this morning, my body is a little off and I got hungry for lunch early, but they served a muffin, banana and cereal, which took the place of one of my peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. I am actually drinking some diet soda, which in retrospect may not be a great idea, but I am hoping that we will land within the next ninety minutes so I should be okay.

My connection to this plane was a little tight. I had to take a shuttle bus between terminals and there was something going on with the bus in front of us, but I made it. We picked up Ben, had lunch where we updated each other on what was happening and discussed how to handle the calls for the SGS project tomorrow. Then Ben and I met later in the afternoon. We discussed how well IJX was doing and additional strategy for tomorrow's meeting.

After that, I worked out then met Ben for dinner. Before we ate we went to a local supermarket, something I like to do especially in foreign countries. Ben purchased some stomach medicine; he also hasn't been feeling well. Dinner was excellent and I left Ben. He was walking around for a while since he had taken a long nap. I was really tired.

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4:42 PM Guadalajara Time 5:42 PM EST

I had about nine hours of badly needed sleep and then worked out, had breakfast and got ready for the call. Ben was already out early with Marisol trying to get his passport/visa situation settled. His passport had been held because he did not have valid identification. Paulina and I met them at the medical equipment manufacturer, our first potential partner for the SGS System for Mexico. Unfortunately, Ben did not get his passport and was extremely and understandably frustrated. He was also suffering from stomach problems and jet lag so he was starting off from a bad place. Marisol was feeling better and we all went inside. This manufacturer's main base is Spain, but the operation here was handled by a man named Arnaldo. Also in the meeting was another man name Jose. He very nicely contacted his attorney to try to get some help. We then launched into the meeting about the SGS potential center, but I did not last very long because we were in agreement on most issues. There will be some negotiations regarding percentages for profits, personnel and procedure, but the idea of moving forward was there. In fact, Arnaldo had brought in Jose to head the effort from their side, which was another sign.

They had two hospitals that they wanted to be involved to insure the needed flow of patients. Jose, Marisol, Ben and I went over to visit one of the public hospitals. We met one of their doctors there who was extremely pleasant and offered assistance because he thought the SKS Machine could be a big help for his patients and especially the children.

After that, we split up with Ben and Marisol trying to get his passport again and Paulina and I are driving Jose back to their headquar-

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ters. This was good because it gave us a chance to talk, become friendly and learn about each other which is extremely important when you are going to be working together.

I was happy with the way it turned out and we will go see the second potential hospital tomorrow with Jose, Ben and Marisol; however, Ben will have to go back to Immigration to try to get his paperwork fixed. Ben was very upset with the whole situation; I don't blame. He is due to leave tomorrow afternoon for California and then home. He may not be able to go. Marisol will stay with him all day if needed to try to get this settled.

Tonight we have another meeting with a different Mexican company, this time the owner of a cancer clinic. We have two strong potential deals now with Malaysia and the health products company. If this company tonight is eager to do business, then maybe something can happen. Otherwise, we will politely withdraw. It is good to go into any meeting from a position of strength and that is how I view the one tonight.

I never know what to expect when going into a sales call. That is multiplied when it is in a country other than the US, a group of people I have not met before, and selling in a new area. When we got to the cancer clinic, I did not know what to expect, but when we were ushered into their conference area, I began to think there might be potential. This organization was obviously profitable. I like to think I can tell by how the operation is run and how it looks. There were four partners in the business who came to the meeting as well as the administrator (another good sign). They spoke some English so the conversation went periodically from Spanish to English with my speaking almost all the English and Marisol the Spanish. As it happens, this clinic is uniquely set-up for a joint venture. They already have a Linear Accelerator, another type of cancer treatment machine. They also already know how to build a containment center and have most of the needed staff and the room. Actually, their part of the initial start-up cost would be very small so their overall risk would be minimal. Their main concern was the guarantee of patients that they would have to provide. After we spoke for a while and felt each other out, it appeared that there might be a fit between us. We left it so that they would send list of questions to us and we would answer them within a week. If they thought center was possible, then it was possible, we would send one or two of their people to China to see the operation there. We would be back here in April and at that point, they would either be

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ready to sign an agreement or it would go no further. In their case, the toughest part might be getting the permit for the machine to get into the country and all the other paper work needed. I mentioned we did not just want to do this for one machine and if they entered into a joint venture, then we will expect them to continually expand throughout Mexico. We all had to be moving forward and growing to ensure everyone stayed happy. I hope they understood that was a necessity.

I am always interested when there is more than one language being spoken in a meeting. It gives me a chance to center on the people, not what they are saying because I don't understand enough of it, but their body language and how they are saying it. They often give good clues as to how they are really feeling.

Afterward, Marisol dropped off Ben and me. I went out for some fruit and tomatoes. I had a feast of my last peanut butter and jelly sandwich, a tomato, some fruit and six of the cookies that I bought yesterday for which I feel appropriately guilty eating. I will go to sleep soon because I have a 9:00 AM meeting with Eduardo tomorrow morning and need to work-out and eat breakfast first.

I got up at 5:30 AM, worked-out and had breakfast with Ben. We talked about the SGS projects and the incredible potential. We also talked about the two companies in China that manufacture them and our position with both. We have to reach the critical mass of having multiple locations, financing them and being in position to franchise. If we can do that, and ensure everything is running safely and efficiently, then the potential profit is huge. I then sat with Eduardo in our IJM office where he searched for potential sales targets. It is a long process, but it is necessary in order to properly go after an entire area. He searched for manufacturing companies of over 500 people in the city. From there, he will harvest the best potential leads and either access their websites for more information or email his friends to see if they have contacts to these companies. It is time-consuming and boring, but also works and needs to be done in order to expand our customer base here.

Meanwhile Ben and Marisol were waiting at Immigration trying to get back his passport.

It looked like sales are slowing down at IJUS. I told AI to cut out almost all overtime, but she had already done it. She is so good! If we continue to slow down we would have to start cutting back, not something I like to think about, but will do if needed. If the recessions get bad, things could get ugly before they get better. It is also a great time for us to attack new business

2/12/08

I spent part of the morning with Eduardo, giving him my views of how to go after new sales and watching him implement some of my suggestions. I will continue to help from New Jersey, but the main responsibility is his.

I am extremely happy to report that Ben got his passport back. Now he can go home tonight. It was a long haul, but with everyone's help, he got what he needed.

Paulina drove me to our 1:00 appointment with a local private hospital. On the way, we stopped for an iced tea, which gave us a chance to talk. I wanted to give her some of my philosophy about business, life and the team that I was trying to build worldwide. She has a good head on her shoulders and I feel that she can handle a great deal more responsibility as needed.

We then met Marisol and Ben at the hospital where Jose was there waiting for us. This call was with the hospital administrator and was much different from the others we had encountered. He was a relatively young man and this hospital obviously had money. Happily, he was honest and he told us that the main problem was going to be getting the oncologists to agree to use the machine. In order to do that, we would have to approach them as a group or individually and make a deal where they would be paid a commission on some basis either per patient or some type of referral system.

We knew that getting the customers was going to be the hard part, but if the hospital could not guarantee anything it would make it a much harder proposition. In the public hospital, the doctors had less of a choice. In the cancer clinic, they already had a stream of patients.

The main negotiating points I see are:

- The guarantee of people to be treated
- Getting Paid
- Getting the necessary permits and taking care of government regulation

Items that we have to research:

- Permit questions: how to define the SGS unit or not?
- Registration costs: check if we should define as research equipment
- Government regulations regarding importing the machine and operating it
- Check how to set up the joint venture regarding the government
- Ensure the machine is on the ground floor or the basement if there is one

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- Making sure your staff is at the hospital or at least you are paying them
- The cost of the installation
- The cost of maintenance
- The cost of the salaries and benefits of the people
- Watching the money
- The cost of the people needed-whether we use hospital staff or BioSystem people
- Defining responsibilities

As always, once we do it the first time, the rest will be progressively easier and less expensive. It is always the first one that is usually the toughest, but that is the nature of all new business areas so I am prepared for a lot of work, confusion, false starts, and disappointments. I know that the odds are against any of them actually coming to fruition. No matter what, it will be an exciting adventure.

We are sending proposals to two groups and I let both know we have two potential deals working so that they did not think we were either going behind their backs or giving them an exclusive for the whole country. With six million people in Guadalajara alone and the ability of each center to handle a maximum of 700 patients per year, there is little chance of saturating the marketplace for a long time.

As per my talks with Ben, our market consists of countries where there is much less access to the newest and most expensive equipment. That means Mexico, South America, Eastern Europe, parts of Africa, India, the Middle East. That should keep us buy for quite a while.

The weather in New Jersey is not great; there is snow and ice predicted and rain after that. There is nothing I can do and trying to get home earlier than tomorrow night would probably result in even more delays. I will charge all of my various electronic items and figure to hunker down in Houston in the Continental Airlines lounge until we are ready to leave.

I would really like to get to my tennis game on Thursday morning; I hope that I make it.

I finished working at about 6:00 PM last night and was preparing to go get dinner when I got a call from Marisol that Jose had set up a meeting with the owner of the hospital that we visited yesterday afternoon. She was to get me in twenty minutes. Luckily, I had one fresh shirt left and I got back into my suit and was on my way down to the lobby when I got another message that the meeting had been cancelled. Sales go in streaks and I knew immediately that mine had ended for this trip. No more was going to happen on this trip. I relaxed

and walked over to the nearby Chile's restaurant (my new favorite restaurant for this area), order some salads and a sandwich and brought them back to my room. While eating, I was watching some of the primary election results; Mr. McCain had won some more delegates, but Mr. Huckabee was not giving up. Mrs. Clinton and Mr. Obama were virtually tied and looked like they would fight it out to the convention. Dinner was excellent. I then did some packing, called home and eventually went to sleep. I got up at about 3:15 AM, worked out, got ready, packed up and grabbed a taxi to the airport. My taxi driver was named Miguel and he spoke virtually no English, but liked to talk. We got along with my very rough Spanish. The more I speak and the more I watch movies w/subtitles, the better I will get. Besides, it is fun trying. I am due back in Mexico in April so I should have more of a chance to practice. I am now waiting for a flight to Houston, which will connect me to Newark. The flight from Guadalajara was on time and well run. I got through immigration and customs and then called in to the office. A lot was happening there but not much I needed to do before I got back into the office tomorrow. It looks like we will need to start a New Mexican Company, probably called Ideal Jacobs Medical-Mexico Co. There will be a lot to do, including figuring out the stock being issued and who gets what. There could potentially be a great deal of money going through this company so we have to be careful from the start as to who gets what. The best way to keep our people motivated and moving forward is to give them a small piece of the business. I have done this before with good results and plan to do it again. I will need to check with Gary on how to handle this. I also need to check to see if we need a Mexican native to get started as a Mexican subsidiary of Ideal Jacobs Medical-Hong Kong. There is a lot to consider.

I am feeling a little tired so I think I will read the newspapers that I picked up. After I eat, I'll go back and start editing.

2/13/08 3:01 PM EST In flight to New Jersey

When did it happen that I am suddenly thinking in terms of billions of dollars? What shift enabled me to move toward such large amounts of money? I think it was the SGS machine and it's poten-

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tial in the world. Suddenly, we are speaking in terms of a millions of dollars of profits for our joint venture partners per year per machine. The marketing for this project alone demanded an expansion of what was possible. It became more evident over the last few days when we demanded that our potential partners in Mexico not focus on one machine, but be committed to massive expansion or franchising locations throughout Mexico and South America. This is not a case for small conservative thinking, but fast planning with our heads so far in the clouds that it will no longer appear to be us anymore. In a way, it is not. We have suddenly morphed into a new organization. All of our people including, Ben and I have changed and I do not want to go back.

In order for the SGS System to reach the market penetration necessary, we have to move quickly.

We now have the potential for one machine in Malaysia and two in Mexico. We need to get these deals signed by our return visit in April and then have them in operation by the New Year. It will be a stretch to get all three running by that time, but if they begin operations in January, the money should be coming in March. All partners will have to agree that part of the profits generated will be used for more locations. We will leverage one on top of the other and create more joint ventures with additional partners. My projections of where we can be include two locations in 2009, three more locations in 2010, five more locations in 2011 and ten more in 2012. By next year, we should have attracted as much outside investment as needed, which will then free us to expand as we want to other parts of the world. Once the first center is opened, each one will get simpler (like modular homes in separate countries), get the first one done and the rest will follow. That combined with my suddenly having large blocks of time available (I am in process of passing off a lot of my current duties to my able staff) will force me to move into new things, big things, gigantic things or risk getting bored. So this is it, my declaration in writing: I want to do great things for people, help them medically and help them to start and run companies. I want to be involved with producing and utilizing energy and carbon credits. I want to make a difference. I want my voice, our voices, to be heard. I want respect and I want to be able to look in the mirror and be proud of what I have done, of what our team has accomplished. I do increasingly better for the future.

Yesterday was spent catching up, which I mostly did.

After playing tennis with my brother this morning (always a fun experience), Al, Vinnie and I had a meeting with Indy. She was excited

I sent an email to my partner Ben today regarding the next countries I want to open Distribution Centers and then SGS Centers. They are:

India Dubai Hungary Israel South Africa Saudi Arabia Argentina Spain

Since Ben has got all of Asia, I will give him South Korea.

We are already working on India, which leaves Dubai, Hungary, South Africa, Saudi Arabia, and Argentina. I will get moving.

I also sent out to Marisol, Ben, Al, Mike and Vinnie copies of emails I want to send to our potential partners in Mexico Victor, Jose and Arnaldo asking for information so I can more accurately create the projected financial information that they all want before going any further. Those statements along with answers to the questions that they owe us should be enough for all of us to decide whether or not it is worth bringing some of them to China to see the SGS installation.

The recession looks like it is happening; sales are slowing down. I will not cut back yet, but may need to soon. It is a good time for intelligence expansion.

It is rare that I am writing at this time of the morning when I am not traveling.

I got an email from Ben this morning that both SGS companies want us to represent them. At this point, we are left with a question of what to do. I do not think that we can raise sufficient quantities of investment capital until we have at least one center in operation of which we are a partner. To do that, we have to choose, at least for the first machine, which company to represent. By making that decision, we may be making a long-term commitment at the same time because the other company will probably know about it. One company is smaller and not publicly traded. The other has a lot of capital and can help us finance this project worldwide. It is a difficult decision and one I am not ready to make with Ben just yet. If we go with the smaller company, I want a piece of it and that will have to be worked out. We are not locked in yet. I hope for information soon.

I am reminded of the DuPont cousins when they took over DuPont with virtually no money. I cannot put myself into extreme debt and still function at my best. We will need a large infusion of other people's money, probably 50 million USD to launch this correctly. We have a lot of work to do.

I got word that the Mexican Medical products guy will not join us in China at the end of March. We are moving too fast for them. Ben was right about the Mexican Cancer Clinic having better potential. We shall see if they commit this week.

I emailed contacts in South Africa, Dubai and Australia today to start potential new IJ or SGS sites. I got an email back from the man in Dubai; he is now stationed in Cairo, but still has connection in there. I asked him for help in both places.

I am having some energy problems. I am wired now and have to go to sleep but am exhausted at various points of the day. I have not adjusted to working or being on call usually from about 4:15 AM until 9:30 PM at night. Maybe there is no way to adjust to it.

There is more talk about an overall recession. I want to pay off our debt and am trying to hasten the payments. We need to be out of debt here in the US so I can think more clearly. The sooner the better.

We will all try to meet in Hong Kong early that Sunday afternoon so we can take a train to Shen Zhen and all have dinner together. I am hoping for a lot of fun, learning, bonding and growing as a team. I plan to end up back in Hong Kong Thursday night at my favorite hotel so I can walk the harbor and then leave for home Friday morning.

It is snowing outside and is supposed to turn to rain in the late morning. Kayla takes the SATs in the morning. I hope that she does well enough so that she does not have to take them again. It would be one less stress point in her life.

If we are successful with the EPA Self-Certification program, then the ability for the Exchange to validate credits for the US will be neutralized and fall back to the EPA. I am looking forward to seeing if I can expedite that change. I would much rather have the power with EPA than anyone else, especially if we are helping or in charge of the program. There I go, wanting to be in charge again. That's just part of my nature. I plan to bring it up at the IJ Summit so we can pursue this type of program worldwide. I got the figures for worldwide sales for 2006 and 2007. We were up about 8% over 2006 and considering we mostly got rid of one of our big customers, it was a fantastic year. Still, with all the talk about bad economic times, we are hitting everywhere for more business and will continue.

Both my new CD will be ready for world release by April and our new line card should be good for business. My new book will probably be ready in early summer. That, combined with the sales efforts of all of us, should keep us in front of our customers for the next six months. It is exciting, scary, nerve-racking and vitalizing all at the same time.

Daylight savings time is on Sunday; we lose an hour of sleep, but gain and hour of daylight. Spring is coming; it will be flower planting time soon.

We have about four hours to go. I slept for a little while and then went over my talk for the opening of the summit on Monday morning in my head. I want to give everyone a family/business history. I think that they will be interested, except of course, Ben who has already heard it.

3/22/08

11:25 PM Hong Kong Time 11:25 AM DST

We landed and got through customs and immigration with no problems. The train ride to Kowloon was calm and pleasant as was the cab ride to the hotel. The only problem was that the cab driver spoke no English and we were not sure if he had the right address, but he did. It was good to see Hong Kong Harbor. It is a beautiful sight and one of which I don't grow tired. After we checked in, we went for a walk, had a light dinner and went for an additional walk along the harbor. I noticed that when we checked in that I had ripped my pants pocket on the seat in the plane. I asked Indy to help me thread a needle in the sewing kit that I found in the room. As we were getting back, Marisol, Juan, Victor and the doctor's two sons arrived, which was great timing. We all had breakfast together. One of Juan's sons is an archeologist and goes on digs for research. The other is a civil engineer. They are pleasant and speak English well as does Juan so breakfast was an interesting mixture of their good

Two good things came out of it: the first was that Marisol will take over the handling of personnel so it does not get out of hand and secondly, the Doctor and his people saw me in a different way from how I have acted the past few days. I have been very pleasant and easy-going (at least I think I have). This morning they saw me agitated, mildly upset and extremely aggressive (traits I wanted them to see anyway). They now know that I will not be viewed

as someone who never gets upset. As my dad always taught me you never want to always be the same way, a little different, inconsistent and not always as you seem is a good thing. This can keep people from not taking you for granted and not pushing you too far.

We are all on this bus and our luggage is with us, which is always a good thing. We should be at the center within the next thirty minutes. As per usual, Al has things running smoothly in New Jersey and things also continue to go well here. Being friendly and happy together will help to smooth over some of the rough patches that always occur when you are working towards something new. I can foresee where problems with SGS project occur because they usually center on finance, people doing as they say, or people thinking others aren't doing what they say. Expectations are very difficult things because they are different for everyone, continually change with the environment and also are altered by time. It is reminder to be thankful for what I can accomplish and try to be only a little upset when things don't turn out in the way I have planned.

We are passing over a lot of bridges and there are sections of buildings separated by fields of rice and other crops. It is raining, but the farmers are still tilling their fields.

The pollution levels in China are becoming much more of a world issue, especially with the upcoming Olympics and global warming. You can see a layer of it mixed with the clouds and the rain. It makes me thankful for the Environmental Protection Agency at home and how great of a job they have done in helping to clean up our air and water. I think I will continue to workout inside in the hotel's purer air.

Sales have been lower over the last two months; it is hard to keep the optimism up on that side. However, it is counterbalanced by the potential a recession gives us for more market share. That combined with our strong cash position, good profit margins, incredible team and new potential product areas will force me to center on the positive and place less emphasis on the actual sales statistics for now. I don't personally have to make more money at the moment, but I want the funds to be able to fuel the projects that I want to pursue in the areas of the world that I find necessary.

3/25/08

4:35 PM Shanghai Time 4:35 AM DST In Flight to Shanghai

What a day it has been thus far. We got to the SGS center and the Doctor and Victor immediately began looking like serious participants, making measurements and speaking with the personnel. One of the doctor's sons is a civil engineer who would plan the construction of their center and he was involved also. We were there a few hours, enough to see one woman get treated and then we left to do some

shipping at a local mall because we were too early for the airport. All during the day, we were all breaking into groups and discussing various points of the SGS system, how it could be engineered differently, how we can sell it internationally and specifically how to help get the center in Mexico started. Both the Doctor and Victor seemed optimistic about working out the details of getting the center started. By the time we were in an airport coffee shop, it had gotten down to actual negotiations between the Doctor, Victor, Marisol and me.

It will take anywhere from three months to a year to get the necessary permits for the center. We first had to find land and either renovate an existing building or build from scratch, which can take anywhere from one to twelve months. Once the space is found, we then have to set up a rental or buying agreement, set up the construction of the center, get the permits started, sign an agreement between all of us, set up a new company in Mexico, get an SGS machine sent to Mexico and send people over to China to be trained.

There is a lot to coordinate, but everyone is excited about the prospect. It is my job to keep everyone on track, make sure all of the paperwork is done, the various personalities are handled, everyone is getting most of what they need and the project moves forward rapidly. Marisol has done an outstanding job getting it to this point this soon and I am very proud of her. Now she has to double her efforts and help to find the location quickly before the good will of this trip cools down. I will be available to come down to Mexico as soon as the site is found to establish the formal agreement. The Doctor and Victor mentioned that they might be interested in becoming partners in the new Ideal Jacobs Medical Company that we are starting. I said to them I know that the Doctor likes to be in charge, but it was most probably going to be me. That will need to be worked out. I think overall control by a non-medical person is preferable because I believe that I can stay focused on the business itself. Besides, if they want a part of the new company, then they will have to come up with a substantial amount of assets in some form in order to get it.

Meanwhile on this flight, Jeroen, who happens to be seated near me, mentioned that he wanted to move ahead with learning how to sell effectively and utilize our capabilities to move into new areas of actual products as opposed to design. I am not sure how much Jan-Willem wants to be involved so Jeroen will probably be doing this mostly himself, which is fine. We will probably meet tomorrow on the treadmills in the gym to continue our discussions. It will mean a life change for him, but he is obviously ready to move on and it would be good if we could not only help him do it, but also profit from the venture. It is exciting to see him getting ready to take the leap. He is about to embark on a new adventure and I hope that we are a major part of it.

We have decided not to go to the second SGS center tomorrow.

Instead we will sleep in a little and have a sales meeting until it is time to leave for the airport. We will say goodbye to the Doctor, his boys and Victor tonight after dinner. I hope to be back in Mexico within the next month. I need to know how much they want to be involved, how much capital they have and their level of commitment before I can write out the formal proposal. Then it will have to be approved by Ben, Marisol and the SGS people. The goodwill of the group continues to flow and I am now expecting to do another summit in Mexico next year.

Some of our people are eating the food served on an airplane; I wonder if dinner as a group will happen tonight.

3/26/08

Wednesday - 4:10 PM Xiamen Time 4:10 AM DST In route to Xiamen, China

I got up this morning at 5:30, worked out, spoke with Al, (everything is good at the office), and had breakfast with Ben. We spoke about our visitors from Mexico and made tentative plans about how we would handle the upcoming negotiations after they find their space. We also spoke about our new roll-to-roll press that should be installed and working at IJX next month. It will be good to have the capability in-house because they are already UL approved, which will make selling the product easier.

Then we started our sales meeting led by David. Marisol was out with the Mexican group and Titan was looking at another SGS installation. David ran the discussion, covering some of the basics of sales and how to specifically sell our products. We also spoke about the SGS system and how we can sell them worldwide. That discussion continued through lunch and then it was off to the airport. I am finding it fascinating how various conversations spontaneously occur between some or all of us, covering extremely important needs and requirements of our various partners. I had one with Jan-Willem and he was concerned that I would be utilizing leroen too much too soon and would leave him in the lurch with his customers. I assured him that the increased use of Jeroen's time would be gradual and we could handle a lot of the proposed expansion through IJUS and IJX. They could take on more responsibility for operations if they wanted. Once reassured, he relaxed and we began to talk more about our expansion into Europe. We have one group interested in setting up IJUK and I asked Jeroen, Jan-Willem and Tushar if they knew anyone else that may want to get involved. Jan-Willem has an employee who flies a plane. He may be able to fly Jeroen to pick me up in Paris, fly to see customers in Lannion and then back to London to interview our people for IJUK. It is a small plane, one engine, but they told me not to be nervous.

At this point, I will now figure to fly to Europe within the next six weeks and hopefully to Mexico sooner.

I just spoke with Ben. We are working out the steps on how to handle Mexico.

Step one is to start a New Mexican Company watch.

IJ Medical Hong Kong is a partner. Marisol will have stock and maybe the Mexican company will also. They will have to do more than just give money. We will need to use them, to help with selling future facilities and bringing on more sites. Having oncologists on staff will be a giant advantage to our selling strength. After we incorporate, we will submit permits right away. We also plan to redesign the unit; it needs to be bigger for those who are generally bigger than Chinese.

I know it sounds crazy, but everything has to be done at once. We are in a zone and it will not last forever, especially if we pass on any opportunities. We need to move now everywhere.

We are supposed to land within the hour and go for Thai food. The others are probably going out afterwards and I may take it easy or workout again. If the others want to talk tonight, we can do that instead.

3/26/08

10:34 AM Xiamen Time 10:34 DST Sheraton Hotel

After the plane landed, we stopped at our hotel and then went out to dinner.

3/27/08

9:10 AM Xiamen Time 9:10 PM DST Our plant in China

This Sheraton is a really nice new hotel with a gym. I was happily walking on a new treadmill in a beautiful gym at about 5:15 AM. I got up at 4:00 after a lousy night's sleep. The room was beautiful and I met Marisol and Ben for breakfast. The discussion was about the SGS and the proposal upon which we tentatively agreed. It then has to go to SGS for approval and finally to the people in Mexico. I am not sure where the holdups and roadblocks will be. I just realized with the addition of IJ India, we now have four design engineers technically on staff, how cool is that!

Here is the working agreement with IJ India. It is short and simple, the way I like it.

- 1. We will create Ideal Jacobs India Corp (a US Company).
- 2. Indy and Tushar will create an Indian company that can do business as Ideal Jacobs India Corp.
- 3. Once the companies are formed, they will get 10% any gross sales in India, taxes and shipping charges are excluded. Those commissions will be paid as soon as Ideal Jacobs US is paid.

- 4. Whenever possible, all orders for IJN will be produced by IJ and IJX.
- 5. Any traveling or other related expenses will be reimbursed by Ideal Jacobs US, if you want a credit card please let us know.
- 6. Indy and Tushar will be expected to utilize prospects, including current and past customer contacts supplied by Ideal Jacobs worldwide and follow-up on any leads developed on your own. Our current customers will be polled to see who has locations in India and contacts will be passed to you.
- 7. Sales materials, other helpful information, sales help and all other support will be supplied as needed.
- 8. Commissions will be paid for as long as they are with the company.
- 9. Regarding the SGS system, if they are involved with the sales and set up of the operation, then you will receive 5% of the profits for as long as you are with the company. In the event that you become employees of Ideal Jacobs through partial ownership of the company, we can discuss stock participation for SGS units in India.
- 10. Any design work that you are involved with that is utilized in IJ products is commissionable for as long as you work for the company and the amounts will be worked out on a case-by-case basis.

Sleep deprivation is in full swing, my stomach is a bit upset (not surprising considering the change in my diet over the past week) and the pressure I have been feeling plus I can feel myself getting more emotional. I am going from exhilaration to panic and back up again amazed at what our team has already done and what we are capable of accomplishing. It is time to go home and tomorrow is just the right time. I am hoping to have dinner tonight and roll play for sales with everyone joining us including David, Indy, Tushar, Jeroen and Jan-Willem. I spoke to my wonderful wife and she will have a great dinner ready for me after we land. We leave for Hong Kong in a few hours; it will be good to be back there again. I am very happy.

Things we have to do:

- 1. Start Ideal Jacobs Medical Mexico company immediately and have it set up where it can be a public company
- 2. Check on the permits and if we can get more than one at the initial attempt
- 3. How to handle the import taxes and duties and who pays them
- 4. Start Ideal Jacobs India-check approval from Indy and Tushar first.

3/28/08 9:06 AM Hong Kong Time 9:06 AM DST Hong Kong Airport.

We landed, got through immigration and customs, took the train I like to Kowloon and then taxied to the hotel. It was a nice night and after we checked in, we all went to the roof where the gym and outside pool area was located. The view of Hong Kong was breathtaking as it was already early evening and the building lights surrounding the harbor were luminous. We then walked to my favorite small café that had some sandwiches and salads and we all enjoined a light dinner. While eating, I mentioned that I planned to get up very early to workout. Jeroen had wanted to come to the gym with me yesterday, but had slept through his alarm. He said he wanted to try again. I had already arranged with the hotel to open up at 4:30 AM. We all wondered if he would make it this time.

It was a time split up. I showed Jan-Willem where the local malls were so he could buy presents for his kids. Jeroen, Indy, Tushar and he went off to shop; David and I went to take a last walk along the harbor. We talked about the events of the past week and how well we thought things had gone. Our company has gone up a level over the past few days and there is a tangible change in the feel of our operation. We are truly global and now ready to work between and with each other to spur sales growth across the world. I indulged myself for a moment and wondered what my grandfather would have thought had he been with us this week. He had come over from Russia with very little and started our business with nothing except a driving will to survive. He passed more than a decade ago and I hope wherever he is that he is happy with the success that we have attained.

I got up this morning at 3:30 AM and got to the gym at about 4:25. David came a few minutes later and as I got on the treadmill and began walking, Jeroen entered. We spent the next hour talking about sales, his life and where we were all going. He already had setup a meeting to discuss the SGS with a potential site, with which I was very happy. We role played: I was the man he was meeting and he was himself so he could prepare himself for the meeting. Often in sales you know who you are seeing and have some information. From that, you can deduce some or most of the questions and issues that will come up so you can be ready in advance. Once you are ready, you can relax and not worry about what you are going to say next, concentrate and listen to the other person. It is very hard to listen, but I think our crew has become increasingly better at it, especially with David's help.

Speaking of David, he was a big help this week and has emerged as a primary player for our company. We are changing his title; he is now Director of Global sales and his territory will now be the world, covering all product lines. He is ready to grow into becoming a major

force for our sales and our company in general and I am very happy that he is with us.

We all met for breakfast one last time and then went to the airport except Tushar who has a later flight. We bid Jeroen and Jan-Willem goodbye at the entrance and now it is just Indy, David and I just like we started at the beginning of this fun adventure.

We have a lot to do and can start as soon as we get back. I am now at the gate, David is nearby, Indy is shopping as she loves to do and we board soon. It will be good to get home.

3/28/08 11:16 PM DST In Flight going Home!

The man sitting next to me is named Mickey. He works for a big telecom firm for whom we actually have indirectly made labels. He is in sales and I have been bending his ear about our company. Since he is a true salesman, he too is in interested in people and in turn has been telling me about himself. He loves his job, sales and his life. It is a pleasure sitting next to someone with a positive attitude and optimism.

We are on schedule so far.

I will work on my daily log and get ready for being back in the office. We need to hit the ground running and everyone needs to follow up from the Summit so that we do not lose our momentum.

I spoke to Wendy and Kayla before we left and they are both well. Kayla goes for her driving test in eight days, all very exciting. I remember when I went for my test; it was about thirty-five years ago when I was seventeen. That sound so long ago.

I am going to have to extend our network out further because we need to find more distribution center possibilities. Now is our time to grow.

3/28/08

11:47 AM DST

In flight over South Dakota-back in the USA!

A little more than two hours left.

I got a few hours of sleep and feel pretty good. Barring any delays, I should be home by 3:00 PM. I got the newsletter done. It was mostly about the summit and will give, I hope, a good idea of what occurred. I plan to go into the office and start going through my email and get back on my regular routine.

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3/30/08 10:14 DST Home, NJ

I spent part of this afternoon (after tennis and biking) catching up. The formal proposal for the SGS Agreement is now out to Ben and Marisol. If approved (I also sent it to Gary), then it will go down to the people in Mexico. In the meantime, we will start the new company in Mexico and Marisol will help them start looking for a location. She will get me the information for a CT Scan Company in Canada so that I can see if they want to Joint venture with us through Mexico. Our system depends on the output of a CT Scan so it is natural to have their machine with ours. I will email Howard and Gary tomorrow about starting IJ India. According to Tushar and Indy, it will probably cost \$12,500 to get the company with the name Ideal Jacobs India started. No matter, we can use the money for working capital.

There is a lot to do right away.

3/31/08 10:05 EST

The SGS Mexico proposal was cleared by SGS, Ben, Marisol and me. It is now with the Mexican cancer group. They are supposed to get back to us next Monday. Ben wants a signed agreement immediately even before they find a location. The financing is ready.

Once again, I stressed to everyone at our meeting today with Al, Vinnie and Mike that the centerpiece of our operation is labels. They are our best source of profit and the other areas are in to help spur sales there. If the gaskets and panels turn out to be big, that is great, but labels have fueled our growth and prosperity. I am not about to turn from them now.

I tried the doctor a few times regarding the tingling in my right last finger and part of my arm. From what I understand, it is a common occurrence in my family. I will try the doctor again; perhaps a cortisone shot may help.

We have our quarterly ISO 9001/2000/140001 OSHA meeting this week. Mike and Vinnie will take over and I will be there to help. This is another way for me to step back from the day-to-day operations.

We have a great amount of money in estimates out, millions of potential dollars. I have no idea if they will come through, but it's fun to think about. I hope that we priced them correctly.

Three months of the year are complete already, it is hard to believe. Time is moving very quickly probably because I am having a great time.



4/2/08 10:08 PM DST Home, NJ

It turns out both of my computer clocks are about fifteen minutes fast and have been for years. I actually fixed one of them, an amazing feat for a "non-techie". I think I actually did it. Now it is 9:54 PM.

Tomorrow Cliff goes in for prostate surgery; I will pray for him tonight. It is a big deal and the full recovery could take months. I hope he is okay soon.

Jeroen had a good call on the SGS system in The Netherlands and I will know next week if I am going out there to try to set up a new location. He has also closed a new panel deal and is working with Al in France on three other sessions. He had a good day today.

Sales for the first four months are down about 3% in the US, but I believe up everywhere else. I am amazed and heartened how well IJX is doing and that is totally due to Ben and his great team. I also have high hopes for IJM and IJN. We are working on getting IJI on line and business cards are being prepared. Both Tushar and Indy are hungry for success so I have a good feeling for them.

4/2/08 9:49 DST

Home, NJ

Uncle Cliff came through his operation well and should be home tomorrow. We all hope that the results of the operation are good.

Kayla got her drivers license and we are all very proud of her. She is also seventeen years old today and we celebrated by taking her out to dinner with her boyfriend Max. I like him and he is good to my daughter, which is a very good combination.

We were asked today by EPA PT to mentor a group from the Statue

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of Liberty, concession area to help them into PT. I liked the idea, especially since it is part of Ellis Island through which a lot of my relatives entered this country. Vinnie was up for it as well. We will do it together; it will hopefully be a lot of fun.

I started checking for contacts for IJI today, I am finding myself selling much more globally and working as a team leader for global sales. David is doing well and taking care of the US and is now moving into Canada.

I pre-interviewed a possible new saleswoman for the SGS for the future. She would work for the US Company if we can get FDA clearance. It will probably be a few years away, but I need to lay the groundwork now.

4/4/08 10:47 DST Saturday Night – Home, NJ

I am scheduled to be part of a panel on Tuesday night at our Synagogue. The only reason I would agree to it was because they moved the time back from 8:00 PM to 7:00 PM, that way I can still be home by 8:30 to get ready to go to sleep. One of the guestions I need to have ready is why being a lew is important to me. Our religion has been in existence for over 5000 years and our history has taught me some good lessons. Maybe the most important is to always remember that even though I am a white, male from the United States, which puts me into a category that enables me sometimes to move ahead, I am also a Jew. For those who aren't part of our faith; rest assured that being a member means a perpetual life of always being a minority, often blamed for things we cannot possibly have responsibility for and being discriminated against simply because of who we are. This feeling, though often not in the forefront is always in the background and has served me well to remember that we have solidarity with evervone else in the world that for this moment are not in the majority. We need to close our first SGS deal not only for our own people, but also to gain credence with the people from China. I look forward to next week. Who knows, maybe it will be The Netherlands that closes first.

4/7/08 10:56 DST Home, NJ

The negotiations continue between us and the cancer clinic. I am not sure if they will be able to come to an agreement.

I spoke to Uncle Dave today. He was advising I draw further back from the day-to-day operations. Of course, I got angry at his telling me what I am supposed to do. I usually get annoyed at him when he is right. Having the structure of the office is really important and my new role is a bit daunting because of its lack of structure. However, I will persevere and find a new definition for feeling safe and secure.

4/10/98 9:55 DST Home, NJ

It reaches about 75 degrees Fahrenheit here today and it was beautiful. We have a narrow river running near our factory and sometimes I walk outside to watch the water flow. Sometimes there are ducks play-

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ing in the water. It is a tranquil moment in a usually crazy day. I like the sudden difference and the change back.

Last Wednesday, I went to our Temple to be part of a three-man panel for our confirmation group. It was me, described as an entrepreneur, a lawyer who was a partner in an environmental law firm, and an executive from a company that gave out large loans. The purpose was to show how we merged our belief in religion and god with our desire to be successful. We all had the same basic paths of trying to treat everyone as we wanted to be treated and willing to fight for what we wanted on an ethical basis. It was a fun meeting and I hope we were helpful to the kids.

Jeroen emailed me tonight that he is going to work two days for IJN and three days for his other company with Jan-Willem. This is a big commitment for them and I want to make sure that there is enough success in all areas to justify their faith in us. I started working today on additional countries in Europe for the SGS of which Jeroen would be in charge. He is excited, as is Ben at the prospect of David going over for sales training and visiting customers. David is coming back from a Canadian sales trip tomorrow. 4/11/08 10:25 DST Home, NJ

I have spent part of the last few days contacting people from all over the world who I thought might not only be interested in the SGS program, but would also have the raw talent to help sell it. Response has been good, but I believe in the odds and therefore have to bump up my numbers to help increase the chance of success. We have enough going now where I am about 50% confident we can close a deal. Ben emailed me tonight that the heads of SGS are coming to Mexico in May and have offered to have us participate in any of their deals. I have offered to meet them on their trip and be with them. I am hoping that we have something near ready to close when they are there.

I am taking a vitamin supplement in a juice form and I mixed up the in bottles tonight and took a big swallow of wine instead. I do not like alcohol and am now taking ant-acid pills to try to stop my stomach rumblings most probably due to the wine.

David has been a big hit since the summit. All of our IJ groups want him to come and train them and also go on sales calls. What they don't know is how dogged he is and how tired they will be after being out with

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him. I will be interested to see if they are more tired being out with him or me. As I always say, I want to have people around me who are better. I am hoping that David is a better trainer, mentor and day-to-day salesman. I will be content at being a rainmaker, setting up the overall deals, closing them and then passing on the rest to our people.

Jeroen has been on fire in The Netherlands and looks like he has gotten out two ATCA panels accepted by Alcatel Lucent. If so, then it should make it much easier to sell them to others worldwide. Next is the Micro TCA and we also are now making panels for another Telecom Manufacturer so we are starting to penetrate the market. Vinnie and I have a meeting at the Bell Labs next week to show our design for a filler panel. If it is accepted, then it could mean large volumes for IJX in Asia.

We are quoting more gaskets, the potential is huge and we got the go-ahead for a new cable assembly prototype, which should be a great entry way for us into that market.

I am constantly on the look-out for new people to bring on as salesman head new distribution centers.

As for now, I am in need of sleep and tomorrow I plan to go to Temple, walk and ride inside our house if the rain forecasted does arrive, proof read the changes for my new book and then go out to dinner.

Dan has asked me to be on a committee to review our Temple's health and future. I am only on this committee because of him. I don't do night meetings and rarely do non-business meetings at all. Nevertheless he is my friend. I like the head of our group and the president of the temple so I am happy to give my view, but first they have to give me all of the confidential information I asked for and that could take a while.

4/14/08 9:52 DST Home, NJ

My brother had a minor injury and could not play tennis this morning. I tried to see if two different people could take his place, but none could go so I biked again, the long route. It was a typical spring day, not too hot. After lunch I went to the office, brought in my clothes for the week, went to buy dinner at a local health food restaurant and went home. I have been doing the second round of editing on my new book. Three chapters out of twelve are complete. I emailed Al today; I want to hire Elana Cohen as our new director of media relations. We need someone to coordinate my CDs, books and our mailing and media relations worldwide. I think we could be getting a lot of good press if we tried. She also has ties to the government here in New Jersey, which could be extremely helpful with the carbon credits idea. We

They will probably not certify the credits from the limousine company that uses hybrid cars, but they were more hopeful on the solar tubes. It is the first piece of hopeful news from them; we will pursue it tomorrow. We got news from Romania.

I normally get up and start getting ready for work, four days a week at 4:00 AM. Thursdays are usually 3:30 AM because I have an earlier tennis game. Today was no different and about 4:15, I checked my emails and saw there was one from Marisol regarding the SGS deal. Her crew had found two perspective sites for the installation and both of the owners wanted to become shareholders in the adventure as opposed to renting us the space. With this in mind, I crafted a full proposal, after speaking with Ben in China. It is now working its way through the various interested parties in Mexico. The whole thing is very exciting and we are all anxious to meet each other, to get a formal agreement signed and started. Now we wait, one of the harder things to do.

Kayla was notified that she got an award today. She goes to one of the most competitive high schools in the state and she was designated in the top 5% of her class, one of twenty people. It is awesome that she has done so well and her mother and I are extremely proud. We try not to add any pressure to her already crazy work schedule and I hope we have accomplished our goal.

I am helping set up sales calls for David in the Texas area. He will be gone next week. He has amazing tenacity. There is no way I could see all the people that he is visiting. He spends almost half of his time on the road. After Texas, he will probably go to Mexico, Asia, California, the Midwest and maybe Europe. He is also helping to train our salespeople.

4/17/08 9:45 DST Home, NJ

It was a gorgeous spring day. I played hooky a little, left about 4:30 PM and went biking. I practiced my speech for the OSHA conference. We also started to get ready for the OSHA audit next Wednesday. It is a good kind of audit because the SHARP group asked if we would volunteer to participate. They want to try and measure the advantage of being in the program, I am happy to be involved. The program has helped to make us better and more profitable. We owe it to them to share our story and try to help others.

4/19/08 2:55 PM DST Home, NJ

Our porch.

It is a magnificent spring afternoon here in New Jersey with warm, pretty skies and everything is blooming.

I asked to be part of a special committee for our temple. It was a long range planning group, separate from all others. The only stipulation was for our members to think outside the box about where our temple should be going in the future. Nothing more definite than that, all issues and possibilities were open and we could suggest anything. There are few if any meetings and none of them would be at night. They wanted to make sure I had no reason to say no.

I am not sure how other religions operate, but in Judaism, a temple or synagogue is usually led by a rabbi. He or she has a staff and there is a board composed of members who, with the Rabbi, decide all matters regarding the daily and general running of the temple. The organization is not expected to be profitable, but it also does not want to lose money either.

As would seem inevitable, running anything by a committee especially made of well meaning, but often non-business people who deal from business theory versus reality can cause conflict. By definition, they will rarely come up with innovative ways of running things and are much more prone to staying on a predetermined course and not risking change. This is another reason that I try to stay away from participating in them.

There have been some rapidly changing events in our area over the past decade. That change has occurred in the demographics of our basic family units. There has been a bubble, a large group of new families with children moving through time. That increase will end in the next two years. In other words, the amount of potential congregants (customers) will rapidly decrease for us very soon.

I had a feeling this was the situation and after I got the financials

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from the temple. It confirmed what I feared.

While our temple is well run and relatively efficient, it is extremely top heavy in families with baby-boomer parents. The amount of new families coming in as are not even close to replacing those leaving and that spells disaster for the future. This has not been a secret, but unfortunately not dealt with until now and we are facing a potential disaster.

It is also not just our temple in this situation, but institutions covering most religions over, which makes things worse or better depending on how you look at it. When everyone is in trouble, people are often willing to look at solutions that would never have been considered in better times. Adversity promotes tolerance and willingness to think outside the box.

The options we have are:

- 1. We can keep going as we are, getting smaller until we have to merge or vanish.
- 2. Since we are well run, we can hope to wait out the other less efficient temples that will then be forced to merge or go out of business and then fight to take their people.
- 3. We can attempt to merge with another temple now before we are in real trouble so we are dealing from a position of strength.
- 4. We can move the temple and hope another demographic area will help us survive.
- 5. We could get some large benefactors who could finance us so we can keep going, but this will not help our decreasing membership.
- 6. We can cut staff, services and "hunker down" so we can survive with a smaller congregation.

None of the above sounded appealing to me and I started to think about what I would like to see and how we could make that happen.

From the way our temple is run, and to how our religion is based, I realized the following things.

By definition, houses of worship are only "busy" certain times of the week. There are various services and functions, but there are often large blocks of time where nothing is happening and a valuable asset is left sitting that still has to be lighted, heated and cooled.

People only go to their houses of worship for the following reasons:

- They are in mental need
- They want to worship
- There is a holiday they want or feel they should participate in
- They want their children to have a religious education

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- They want their children to go to pre-school
- There are programs they want to participate in
- It is a place to send their children/teenagers that is safe, stimulating and productive atmosphere.
- It is a place where they feel comfortable, safe and see their friends Our society is increasing in pace and requirements, we have

to multi-task to have any chance to get everything done that is required and desired. Therefore, any organization that does not cater to helping to fulfill those needs will, by necessity, decrease in importance.

Therefore, if we keep going the way we are, we can either merge or cease to exist in a few years. We are at a crossroads in the history of our temple and actually our religion. Whether we like it or not, a lot of temples are probably going to go out of existence and there will be less of us around. Unfortunately, since we did not act sooner we have less time to act now, but I have a plan that will potentially fix all of our problems and completely change the prognosis for the future for us and others around us.

Historically in times like these, temples have merged with other temples and the following problems occur.

- There are two sets of clergy who have to re-define who is in charge
- There are two sets of boards who have to re-define who runs what
- There are two congregations who have to try to merge to become one family, which will always lead to resentment and lasting bad feelings
- There are two sets of administrations that have to merge to become one, again with resentment and lasting bad feelings.
- There is competition between the two congregations to see who really took over.

But what if it wasn't two temples that merged, but a temple and a church? Think of how that could work.

- 1. There could be one big facility so everyone saves on infrastructure and overhead costs.
- 2. Each religion would retain its own clergy and staff.
- 3. The main sanctuary would be two-sided with the main vestments of each religion set up behind movable walls on each end so that only one would be visible at a time.
- 4. Since Christians generally worship on Saturday nights and Sundays, then Jews could have Friday nights and Saturdays. Yes, our religious school would have to be moved from Sundays to Saturdays.
- 5. The major holidays of both fall on different days so they would

not interfere with each other.

- 6. We have the house we bought. We could move the administration into it, leaving the rooms in the main building to be split into two sections for classrooms, one for each religion.
- 7. There is already additional space set up for weddings, funerals and other services that could be used for smaller functions for both religions.
- 8. The economies of scale would be overwhelming and the use of the facility should increase dramatically with much of it being profit.
- 9. The boards for each religion would merge with specific committees separated for the individual religions. Since there are two different religions, there is no jealousy or competition from two Jewish groups competing with each other. The merging of the two groups will hopefully promote a positive harmony to work together.
- 10. The potential for cross programming would be amazing and the media attention should be incredible.
- 11. We would be the first cross denominational facility with Jews and Christians living and working together in the area. If it goes well, we can also invite in a Muslim group.
- 12. The attention should be enough to generate the interest necessary to start pulling other congregants and their families to us. The clergy would embark on a media tour that should produce great free press.
- 13. Our pre-school could be non-denominational, denominational, cross-denominational or any combination desired.
- 14. Our rabbi and reverend would become stars, visionaries who would able to begin a movement to bring people together through religion versus tearing them apart. It could become a model for how religion will be in the future.
- 15. Our children will mingle, become friendly and work and play together. They will also be separate as the situation demands.
- 16. We will become a blended institution, still maintaining our religious affiliation, but bringing in a new definition to the word diversity, working and living together. We will become the forbearers of a new type of religious experience and our total clergy will become our spokespeople.
- 17. Our congregations should increase geometrically. Finally, there would be something new in religion and helping the bottom line at the same time.

I had figured that sending in my proposal would be the end of it. The head of the committee would take one look, say it is crazy, tell me I was out of my mind, in which case I would then be free to say, I gave it my best shot I am done. However, I got an email today that he found the idea intriguing and now I have to go to a meeting next week. This could be a long road.

I have been doing more work with the SGS program, and am now helping to set up a combination IJ/IJN medical trip for Jeroen and David into Eastern Europe next month. Ben is taking care of Asia; we are sharing India, which leaves everything else in my care. Work on the proposal for the first site in Mexico continues. Marisol sent potential land photos to us tonight. I played tennis this morning as well as rode this afternoon. I practiced my speech for Thursday in Atlantic City. I may do it one more time before we leave.

Rina is now in for her visit and I started working with her today. She is very quiet and unassuming, but beneath that lays a layer of steel. We are having lunch tomorrow.

4/23/08 9:43 DST Home, NJ

We had the OSHA review today. We were one of nine sites nationwide chosen. Although they promised it would not be an audit (always assume an audit when people say it won't be) going through our systems, interviewing our staff and getting background information made everyone exhausted when they left. The OSHA guys were very pleased, which was all I cared about and we should see the report before it is released. I am happy to do anything for the Department of carbon, which is the reason Vinnie and I head to Atlantic City tomorrow. I am speaking at one of their shows.

I am very tired, probably because I have worked out twice the last three days. One reason was I was afraid that I gained weight. The other was that I probably can't workout tomorrow.

The plans are now in the works for David to go to Europe and Asia, and already the airfare is over \$9,000, but I think it will be worth it. He is covering ground I can't.

A former Lucent head designer called me today. She needed work because her husband's real estate company was not doing well due to the housing market. I felt badly, but didn't have anything for her right now. I am on the next edit of the book and it is coming along well. I hope to be distributing it by June.

4/24/08 9:43 PM DST Home, NJ

Vinnie and I drove to Atlantic City this morning. It is an unusual place filled with lavish casinos and conference facilities. Before I spoke, Vinnie and I visited the OSHA supplier area where there was a group of vendors showing their safety related products and services. It was interesting and we even met one of our friends from the State OSHA group who had moved to the federal side. The panel discussion that I was on went well. I told the story of how our company uses Health and Safety, along with Environmental and Quality policies to try to maximize our efficiency, reduce pollution and maximize profit. We are part of the OSHA SHARP Program, a regional system set up for those companies with excellent health and safety systems. The other two spoke about the OSHA VPP group, different and more involved than the SHARP Program. It was fun to meet them and be a part of the panel. I hope we can do it again. It is always a pleasure to speak. They are good people and have been very nice to us. Our audience was small, attentive and appreciative; it was a fun experience. Afterward, Vinnie and I walked to the boardwalk to see the ocean. Mike leaves for Mexico tomorrow, he will spend most of his time working on the financial and data systems, interviewing a new potential in-house accountant and possibly an outside salesman. I am hoping to hear about the SGS center this week. I may need to make my plane reservations to go next week. I will probably have to go to

April

Mexico City first. I have heard some scary things about it. I am hoping that once I am there, my fears will become groundless although I plan on staying as secure as possible.

I heard from Ivan last Friday. If he has an actual possibility in Europe, then I may fly out to meet with Jeroen and David on the appointed day. Since I see myself as the company closer, I need to be at the meetings either at the beginning or when it is crucial to go for the finish. I like the challenge of closing; it is like getting the last shot in basketball with a few seconds left. If we are going to miss, I want it to be because of me. If we are going to win, I want it to be because of our team.

4/28/08 9:40 PM DST Home, NJ

Oil has reached \$120.00 per barrel and home foreclosures are increasing. It looks like some tougher times may be ahead. We have to be ready to expand to take the market that our less efficient competitors are now occupying. Mike is in Mexico this week and David is scheduled for next week. They need help with structure, guidance, discipline and support. I plan for them to have it all and the same for our entire world sales team. It is a little scary knowing what could be coming since we have been through times like this before, but I am already in recession mode, which consists of intensive selling on my part and watching over everyone else. It is odd that it doesn't matter which product line I am selling. The mere fact that the "waters" are being churned as my dad would say will generate sales in time. It is rarely a straight line meaning you make a sales call and then something happens. It means you always have to keep moving forward and attacking. There is never time to be complacent. In good time, you want them to keep going and in rough times, you are afraid to stop. It is like running on a wheel in one sense, but always having your destiny in your hands in another. You know the rules of the game, you know what has to happen and as long as you do it, then things will usually turn out okay.

We had the meeting for my temple today. I figured that they would hate my idea and I could then resign from the committee and be done. They did not. In fact, they thought it might have merit, which means a long process will now begin as to what is possible with the potential customers that are out there and what market share we can take. With sub-prime mortgage problems, rising costs of food and especially fuel, I wonder who is really ready. I hope that we have planned accordingly to not only survive, but thrive. If not, it is my fault.

John also cautioned me about the Gamma Knife project I resolved to be more careful than before. As of today, I was bargaining harder with the cancer clinic people in Mexico and gave the participants an ultimatum that if everyone was not ready to move ahead and meet next Thursday, then I was abandoning my intention of going down there. I have already decided that David is going to check the situations with IJM and do sales training.

My thanks to John for forcing me to re-focus on what is important and trying to make even more sure of what we are doing before we take the plunge.

Ben just got home and Wendy and I helped him unload his car. He looks great. He has two interviews for an internship in New York City tomorrow. I hope they go well.



5/2/08 10:27 DST Home, NJ

I had an epiphany last night. It occurred to me that we were not trying to market the SGS project in the correct way. It happened while I was emailing people from Canada. We cannot get a unit in there, but I thought I might find people who knew people outside the country and then it hit me. Instead of talking directly to doctors here or in the counties where we want to sell, we need to be talking to the entrepreneurs who are immigrants like my partner Ben, Indy and Tushar who should be our representatives. Here is the plan. Immigrants who have made it here have the following characteristics:

- 1. They can speak English
- 2. They can work within our economy
- 3. They are probably fast moving and quick decision makers
- 4. Probably have strong ties to their former homelands
- 5. Are seen in their homeland as very successful since they made it here
- 6. Are considered good business men since they made it here and people that they want to do business with are trusted people in their homelands who can be teamed with us to create new potential centers

It is actually very simply. We find the immigrants, they find the people, we make the deals, the immigrants act as liaisons and we all make money. After that, we team up with more people and we all make more money. Very simple, but the question is would it work. I started making calls and sending emails and generated enough interest that I expanded the effort to second and third generation families of immigrants here who still have the entrepreneurial spirit and the ties to their homelands. It is early, but I am excited about the huge

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potential. I have a lot of people to contact.

I spoke to Indy about it today and she was thrilled that she did not have to talk directly to doctors for now. I told her to contact ten immigrants with the plan and bet at least one would be interested by next week. Let's see if I am right. If this idea works, then we can expand it to other areas of sales.

My son Ben and I spoke about converting part of our basement into a recording studio. This is great for both of us as I need a place for recording my future CD's and he needs space to record music. It will be good to work with him on a recurring basis.

Almost all of the parts of the new mailing are ready. We still need gasket samples from IJX and then it can go out. It will be all over the world and the timing is good.

I do not believe I will have what I demanded and they will probably think that they can stall for more time and do as they please. It will be an interesting day for them.

I had lunch with Elana today. She is starting a new career in food consulting and I think she will be great. Besides being very intelligent with a lot of common sense, she has a background as a chef, a passion for helping people through food and adheres a philosophy to which I gave her a copy of my new CD "Peace Through Work", and then I went back to work. It was a good day until about an hour before I left when two big jobs went wrong. Happily it doesn't happen often, but it really bothered me and it took a few hours for me to calm down. I actually only fully relaxed after Elana called me to say she listened to half my CD and had to call to tell me how much she liked it. My system to help people calm down during incredibly tense situations really spoke to her. After thanking her and getting off the phone, I felt a bit sheepish for preaching about being able to relate and then not doing it myself. It was wonderful of her to call and ironic she chose that moment. I still have a lot to work on myself and need more practice to do it better.

Alex got home from college tonight. He looks wonderful, we saw some of his artwork for the school year and it is breathtaking. If he works for me this summer, I will put my plan into action of making postcards out of the artwork, packaging them for sale and trying to set up art exhibitions of his work at one or more local museums.

Uncle Dave's nephew Jay is graduating from High School in a few weeks and I was going to write him a check, but then decided I could do more. Uncle Dave helped put Ben through college, he felt it was his duty being his godfather so I called him and offered a summer internship for Jay where in addition to being paid, I will try to set up a program that will relate to his business major that he will start in the fall. Being his mentor will hopefully be of some value to him. Who knows, maybe he will have the chance to work more with us in the future.

David is down in Mexico and having his hands full with our staff there. Through no fault of their own, they have never been trained in business or sales and are getting a crash course from David. He is extremely tough, detail oriented and aggressive. Every time he hears someone down there say that things are done differently or not as aggressively in Mexico, he goes crazy and pushes harder. They have got to start producing more sales, get new customers and become much more efficient for us to be satisfied.

Being good in sales is easy to measure. Volume and profit are simple to define if you are facing reality. Since it is black and white, there is no place to hide and it keeps you in a continual sense of uneasiness of where your next sales are coming. It forever keeps you in a state of readiness and so you are rarely totally relaxed. While that is not necessarily the best condition for your health and mental well-being it is a sure indicator of a good salesman. Being cocky, overconfident and sure of the future indicates either you have no experience, are going from theory, are not smart enough to realize all of the unknowns that can happen, are too brazen to think bad things could happen to you or worst of all, overconfident because you think it is easy. Unfortunately, that is our situation at Ideal Jacobs Mexico. I picked people who were not in sales and put them in sales positions. That is my responsibility. It looked easy to them, but after a year, they had predictable results of no new accounts and no additional success except those given to them by Ideal Jacobs. It is not really their fault, their bravado comes from being on the buyer side. Where they came from, salesmen treated them like kings. Being on the other side is a totally different perspective and they concentrated more on being liked then being aggressive and going for the order. Unfortunately, their results show their inexperience and I am to blame for letting it go as long as it has. I should have realized it before. But hopefully, it is not too late and I sent David down to get a true feeling for the situation and the possibilities. His reactions so far are also predicable. Our sales people think that they are working hard, but in reality, they are not and they are not aggressive enough. They are more worried about being liked then making sales. This puts them on a direct track to defeat. Their future is up to them, but they resisted his coming, and his teaching, but after being threatened with a bad result, they are finally starting to listen. I hope for all of them that it is not too late. That is why there is more money in sales than in buyer. In reaction to the situation, I have appointed David in charge not only for the sales down there, but also the SGS effort. If all of it can move forward, it will be directly because of his efforts and I have given him command of the situation as he sees fit. Tomorrow, they will see the attorney to get the first IJ medical company going, which I had been led to believe was already in place. We also have to get a second company going immediately if the SGS center can happen. We are now behind and if the center is going to happen, we will have to move quickly. We are all learning as we are going, we with a new country and they with learning how to sell. I hope that we all can come out at the end smarter, wealthier and ready to progress much more efficiently. I am very lucky to have Ben with me

on this. He is a voice of reason and calmness on which I can call both early in the morning and late at night and I can do the same for him.

First, the bad news.

We do a lot of business with contract manufacturers. I mistakenly sent a credit memo to a customer and his customer so the end user saw the prices that we charged our customer. This is an extremely bad thing and although we tried to pull the email back when our customer emailed. It was too late. It sent me into a panic and I have felt badly about it ever since. We all make mistakes, but it doesn't stop me from feeling badly.

David has been in Mexico for the last few days and things have not been going smoothly. Perhaps I expected too much from Eduardo and Marisol. Maybe it was the way they told me about how things were done in Mexico. I got worried because almost no new business or customers were being created. He found them both to be unorganized, not aggressive enough and not willing to take the risk of not being liked. By the end of his stay today, he was extremely frustrated, but I think Marisol was beginning to get the idea. Selling is very difficult and actually an art form and if you don't love it, it is impossible to learn to be good at it. I think Eduardo is in the wrong job and unless we grow big enough there for him to do other things, I do not think he will last.

As for the SGS center, we do not have a medical company started in Mexico like I thought. The lawyer Marisol picked was incompetent so David had to push like crazy to try to get started with a new one today. I am hopeful it can be done in two weeks. The problem is if Victor is able to get a permit, we do not have a medical company to which to assign it. We fixed that temporarily by using Ideal Jacobs Mexico and we can transfer it later. Meanwhile, after an incredible amount of pushing by David, Victor and Marisol, we will go to Mexico City next week to try to get a permit. If they do it, it'll be the first giant step to moving forward. If not, the project is dead. None of us have a lot of faith in Victor at the moment, but maybe he will come through.

The good news is that by his Herculean efforts this week, David has proven himself a valuable member of the IJUS team and is viewed as such.

Moving on to more good news, I spoke to EPA and amazing they have agreed to our carbon credit proposal. We have to add another significant aspect we plan to address for the PTrack program so Vinnie is going to help our local High School clean up their toxic chemicals. That should be enough to keep us in the program and allow us to begin the carbon credit adventure. It is a massive undertaking and will start with IJUS figuring out our carbon imprint. We will use us as an example for others. I contacted Dave Williams' nephew to see if he wants to intern this summer partially for this project. I have also asked for help from Dave Williams, the Cohen's, Don Argintar and Robert Roe from the township. It should be enough to get us started. It is our chance to help save the world and I don't take it lightly. Besides, it will also probably be very good for business not just for the publicity, but also to become carbon credit brokers. Calling people is a great way to stir the waters for interests in all of our lines. Times are not easy, but we will keep pushing. It has always worked before.

Don Argintar was in and he can set up the beta site without a problem. I have been working with Indy and we are writing an article together about immigrants. We have new procedures for them to follow down there. If they can do it, then we will all prosper. If not, then changes will need to be made.

With the recession in full gear, as long as the large housing problem continues to grow, we will continue a company reduction plan in case of emergency. I have instructed our people to search out waste, inefficiency and over-staffing as our volume drops. If needed, it can be implemented swiftly and before we are hurt too badly. I do not like to lay people off, but will do so as needed. It seems to be a catch in certain parts of the world.

Some of our salespeople keep saying things are done differently in their country. That code phrase "we do it differently here" usually means being less assertive, aggressive and trying to close. As times get tougher, it will get harder to close, but also easier in a way. When people are desperate to keep their jobs and stay in business, they will listen to others like us with new ideas about saving money and faster deliveries. It is time to attack and be very aggressive. For all of those who can't, they can go work somewhere else. The answer I have for those who say "we do it differently here" is simple: produce the sales and I will leave you alone, if not, you will take our advice on how to proceed. Sales are a bottom-line business. These are tough times and my short level of patience has grown even thinner. Produce or leave, it is very simple just not easy. Alex has been editing my book and saving me a lot of time. He will also make the design for my new CD collection called "Life Cycle Moments", a four CD package of my last four efforts.

5/17/08 8:35 AM DST Newark Liberty Airport, NJ

Kayla, Alex and I are on our way to Cleveland. It is Ben's graduation from college and Wendy is already out there. Oh how my children have grown. Not just because Ben will be 22 years old tomorrow and graduating, but also that Alex and Kayla just left me in this lounge to go back into the main airport and had no thought about going alone. I try to see reality as it is and utilize what the times and circumstances present us.

I started working on the carbon credit program two days again after we got the formal okay to go ahead. We have proceeded rapidly and are almost ready to submit the form to Don to set up the beta test site off of our website. It will be an online registration. Alex started working on the Carbon Credit project today. He is figuring the mileage from Ideal Jacobs US to everyplace else we ship. We will need that to calculate the total miles for the CO2 calculation.

5/21/08 9:38 DST Home, NJ

We gave a price to one of our smaller customers and when we followed up, they said they got a cheaper price and went with an alternative supplier. While in their mind, this might have been a good thing, but it may backfire for them in the future. Here is how, by our knowing that they have an alternative supplier, we now know that when they call us for rush orders and they start to try to bargain with us and threaten to go to another supplier that they already have another supplier and have already tried them first. Therefore, we know that they are now in a much more desperate spot then before. We have less pressure on us to cave into their continual demands for price reductions. By not giving us this job, they are in effect setting themselves up to spend a lot more money later on. If we are someone's only supplier and they totally depend on us, then it puts pressure on us to help them all the time. But if they have an alternative, then that pressure is lessened.

I had never been a big fan of massages ever since I tried it while at a health spa where Wendy and I have vacationed. I did not feel comfortable and kept all of my clothes on the whole time. I have been having some stress related pains lately and combined with my continued use of ant-acid pills, my family has been urging me to find alternative answers than going for the pills. It is not as though I am taking twenty a day, but they still think I am becoming dependent so I agreed to try a massage therapist that my wife and kids see. It was not that hard of a decision since I had a stabbing pain for the last two days in my neck and back and I found myself there this afternoon. This person was an extremely rugged middle-aged woman who had emigrated from the Soviet Union. I have not been through a work out like that since my days in martial arts and fencing. She was poking and pushing places in my neck and back that were causing enough pain that I actually had to ask her to stop a few times. I consider myself to have a reasonably high threshold of pain. As I went back to the office and my body started to get increasingly achier as I moved, I wondered if I had done the right thing. By the time I got home, my head was also now hurting and I took two aspirin. Later in the evening, I felt better and both my wife and I agreed to wait until tomorrow before passing judgment on to the results.

Suffice it to say that if my neck and back feel better in the morning, then there is a good chance I will return.

David is a perfect teacher for that aspect and although I know Jeroen will want to get away from him by Friday, he will also learn a lot in the process. I am having David take over the sales calls that Marisol and Eduardo had been making in California and Massachusetts. He is better suited for them.

5/21/08

We officially went into recession mode today. I fired one pressman. The other half of the team had been moved because she was pregnant and we did not want her around the inks and cleaners. Other layoffs worldwide and demotions will begin next week. I do not anticipate many. It is never easy firing someone. You are taking away their livelihood, but if we don't have enough business, then we aren't doing anyone any favors so I will do what has to be done.

Business this month is much slower than last year. My plans are to keep going as we are, as long as we stay profitable, increase the integrity of our system by more training for our people and get ready to take the market share that I think will become available as times get tougher.

Vinnie is still in Washington at the EPA conference and having a great time meeting people and learning new things. They have virtually no information about global warming or carbon credits, which we found amazing. He did hear about greenhouse gases from one of the heads of the California delegation and he plans to seek more information tomorrow. If EPA doesn't have a Carbon Calculator ready soon we will ask to adopt California's for the project and hopefully then bring

them into the process at the same time. Alex has been working on our carbon footprint information and making great progress.

I will announce David's promotion to VP of Global sales tomorrow. He will take over direct control of all sales and marketing worldwide except for IJX unless they want it.

We are using one of Alex's drawings for my new CD Compilation; it will go out probably next fall for new customers.

5/23/08 10:23 PM DST Home, NJ

IJ Mexico is in trouble. Both our sales people there have no idea what is needed to sell. Not that I should expect anything else, they were trained as buyers. They said they could do it and I let it go for seven months hoping they could do as they said. But over the past four weeks, it has become evident that their circle of friends that they depended so much on who are still buyers have let them down. Now we all have to pay for their misplaced confidence and my wanting to believe in what they said. By this Tuesday, I plan to fire one of them. If there is no improvement within the next five weeks, I will fire the other. That will leave the inside manager to handle the business we already have. She is competent and can do it. Since I need a Mexican citizen to be with the company, I will attempt to make a deal where the salesman who owns stock to exchange it for either money or a car and with luck everyone can remain friendly.

David and Jeroen finished their sales trip. This morning was the big meeting with Alcatel-Lucent. Jeroen said he would handle the call and unfortunately, his expectations for the outcome were not met. He has raw talent, but has to make the decision as to whether he wants or can be aggressive enough to sell as needed. I don't know what his answer will be.

The economy is going downward before my eyes. I see the signs and the look of panic beginning to appear. In response, I am canceling various projects that don't have a great chance of success to conserve capital. I am sure others are doing the same. We have entered crunch time and only the strong will survive. I figure this recession will last another two years. I demoted one person today, our part-timers will go next and then more staff as needed. It will become increasingly less fun as this gets rougher. My use of ant-acid pills will increase accordingly.

I don't like the idea of having to fire someone hanging over my head, but I have to wait until at least Monday to fire the person in Mexico. I have to give the manager there the option to fire him or have me do it. She said at the beginning she would do it if necessary, we will see if she has the will to do it.

Firing people is horrible.

Now is the time when ideas and willingness to innovate and fight will bear fruit and I am ready. We will use our brains and conserve funds, as per the teachings of my dad: How put us into position to move into new areas.

The panel business probably will not amount to much, but it doesn't matter because it got us into the gasket business, which holds great potential. Who knows where we will move into and make money because that is part of the joy of the game.

Sunday Night Memorial Day Weekend

This morning started normally, but on the tennis court with Uncle Ira, we were pulled off by one of the owner's, who nicely came to get us. My dad was on the way to the hospital with a possible heart attack. We had been through this before and we went right up to the hospital. As it turned out, we beat my mother and him there. After waiting for a while, he had an EKG that showed no heart attack so my mom thanked us and Ira and I went back to finished our game. My dad is 83 years old and these attacks are becoming frequent. I then went biking, as per my normal Sunday schedule and stopped off to see Phoebe who was well. After that, it was back home and then I went shopping for dinner, some supplies for tomorrow's graduation party for Ben and flowers. Today is Memorial Day and I missed the parade in Maplewood. I hope I never forget what all of our veterans have done for us and the platform they have built that gave me the foundation to go after my dreams. It is good to remember how good we all have it, often from the sacrifices that others have made. Or in other cases, how some people seem to have had no choice and end up in life with fragile bodies and minds that limit what they can do. When I am having a tough

day, I try to think of them and how my worst day is usually better than their best. Moreover, I have no right to complain or even think of feeling badly.

Moving on to more pleasant thoughts, Ben's graduation party begins in less than two hours and my wonderful wife, as always, has prepared a bountiful celebration that should leave all felling well by the end.

I played tennis this morning outside and it was a long, grueling match, which of course I lost. I tried to go to the acupuncturist today, but his receptionist booked me for another physician in the office instead of him. Perhaps it's a sign not to go.


Mike said we are now ahead of last year in sales, which is amazing especially considering the economy.

My niece Rebecca called this morning and decided she wanted to try to work somewhere else for more money. It was fine with me. I had satisfied my familial obligation to her, which was good and as it turned out had defined a new job for the next person. The kid who I told to come back yesterday came in today. He had on a tie as instructed and was very sweaty since it was about 95 degrees outside in addition to his car not having any air-conditioning. The fact that he came in dressed with the tie and got through the interview well was enough for me. However, had my niece not decided to quit, I might not have hired him, but now Colin starts tomorrow.

I spent part of today working on the meeting for tomorrow. It is turning into a big deal and I am hopeful that it might become a new area for us both, with the solar water heaters, mergers and acquisitions in general. I made an agenda and sent it to everyone involved including Murray. I decided to treat him as one of my team. He would either like it or not, get along well or not, want to work with us or not. I asked for modifications and both Vinnie and he sent some. I look forward to tomorrow. The Carbon Credit Website should be ready tomorrow. I emailed EPR and we are trying to arrange a meeting on Monday in New York City. I have no idea how we will be received. I also spent a lot of the day working on things for Marisol and Jeroen. Between David and me, we are putting a lot of work on both of them. I hope it works for all of us. I also spoke to Paulina today. I wanted to make sure she knew how great a job she was doing and how much we appreciated her being there. Ben and his family are coming in on June 30th. He and I have a lot to talk about.

6/11/08 7:36 PM DST Wednesday – Home, NJ

We met with Murray today.

He is an interesting man and one obviously used to negotiations. The problem he had, in our eyes, was that he was dealing from a position of weakness. It seemed to us that he had no finances and his project was based on the hope that he could scrape up enough money to get a grant from the state to keep going. His other company was apparently not operating so he only had this project, which had been leeching money from him for over a year. He had two costly divorces and he desperately wanted a "home run" before his career ended.

He required between \$250,000 and \$500,000 from us, depending on what part of the conversation we were at and he was willing to give us 25% of his company. He called it a lottery ticket and we all know what the odds of a lottery ticket coming in are. Still, I liked him, I liked the product (a solar water heater for roofs) and I wanted to meet the inventor. I told him that we would counter offer within a week. - 1. Start a new company-Ideal Jacobs Energy Corp. Give Murray and his people 35% of the new company in exchange for the intellectual property signed over to us including the pending patent. Murray and his people will be on the board of directors, but the entire company will be run by Ideal Jacobs people and we will have a majority of the board.
- 2. Hire the inventor so that he works for us, give him a salary and medical benefits. He has been screwed by almost everyone in the past and this should be a breath of fresh air for him. All changes to this invention and all his future inventions would be in the new company name. Murray thinks that he can get a \$250,000 grant from the government, but needs a \$250,000 investment guarantee from me. I will put up the \$250,000 under the following conditions.
- 3. We only have to put up \$100,000 to start while the application is in. We will not need to put in any more until the grant is given.
- 4. The \$100,000 will be used for: patent review and modification, prototypes, research, certifications, marketing, advertising, pay and benefits for the inventor, future inventions. None of the \$100,000 will be given to the other stockholders until we get the grant money.
- 5. If the grant money does come in, it will be used for the project.
- 6. Cut off contact with the research group.
- 7. Because of his confidence in being able to get this grant we are willing to enter into this agreement. However, if he is not able to secure additional funding of at least \$250,000 within the next six months, then his participation reduces to 25% of the stock of the company.
- 8. No profits will be taken by any shareholder until all debts are paid for in full owed to the corporation from any supplier for any reason.

I have been trying to work out a commission plan for David. I want it tied to profits as opposed to gross sales. You always want your people to be watching the bottom line of what is left over as opposed to potential lower profit gross sales. I know he can do it and I know he wants it.

The Jensen's were here tonight for dinner. As it turned out, both Alex and Ben were there for dinner and Kayla came in for desert. Our children did us proud and the Jensen's as usual were wonderful company. We have been good friends for years and as I always say, if Jim or I needed each other for any reason, nothing would stop us helping one another.

No word from Murray, but I have been thinking about my own version of a solar roof and I will pursue it ourselves unless Murray makes a move next week. I have been conflicted about my Saturday Minyan Group. I am having more trouble sitting there and I am not getting much out of it. I think I will take a break from it for a while and use the time to research my new solar idea to try and help the world with it while also bringing benefits to us. I have not been fully utilizing my abilities to invent. I think the time has come to see if I have any real talent in the area and see if we can do something in the solar field that can really impact a lot of people with hot water, water purification and electrical generation. I know I have no formal training, but maybe that

is the best way to be. I don't know if something can't be done.

I finished the outline Sunday for the new Lifeguards CD about a crisis of faith. Here it is:

Opening.

When my oldest son Ben was about to be born twenty-three years ago, my wife and I wanted to join a local synagogue. As our search narrowed, we went to a Friday night service at one of them to try it out. While sitting there, my eyes wandered around the beautiful sanctuary and I centered on a group of remembrance plaques on the wall. One of them had my grandmother's name on it. She had died when I was eleven years old. Feeling that this was a sign, and with my wife's agreement, we joined immediately. Strangely when I went back later to view the plague it was gone. As it turned out, this was the temple that my grandparents had belonged to and my Dad had attended when he was a boy. One of the first things I did as a member was join their Saturday Morning Minyan. It was a group of regular people, not lead by a rabbi. We ran it ourselves. Over the past year or so, I have found myself beginning to wonder why I was there. The service no longer spoke to me and I found myself going more because of habit then enjoyment. That doubt then began to spread to other parts of the religion itself, the doctrine and the structure. It wasn't meaning what it used to and I no longer seem to be in step with what was happening. Faith covers many areas. If there is doubt in one segment, does that mean there is doubt everywhere or is questioning why things are what we are supposed to be doing on a continuous basis? What are we supposed to be doing?

It's time to talk about the things that keep us all awake. We are the Sunday Night Lifeguards.

Welcome to The Sunday Night Lifeguards. I'm Andrew Jacobs with Rabbi Daniel Cohen. Let's get right to it.

Dan, a crisis of faith.

Is that what you love to hear because you know people are thinking or you don't like to hear that because people are in conflict with it?

How do you doubt your religion?

How did you deal with it?

Is whatever you are dealing with finished?

How did this affect the relationships around you?

How do you explain when things go wrong to seemingly good people, like Job in the bible?

I often say that people seldom do what is in their best interest. The main reasons for that are:

- 1. They are emotionally involved and blinded by the situation
- 2. They are only seeing things from their point-of-view
- 3. They want to win and the other person lose as opposed to everyone winning

How would you react to those ideas regarding the conflict that arises everywhere?

Let's take me for example.

I like to think of myself as intelligent, willing, and able to think things through and act in everyone's best interest. What if the conflict I feel would indicate a change in the way I conduct my life, which in turn will affect the people around me and those who work for me? I am not just one person, but I affect the lives of a lot of other people. Should I allow the conflict within me affect the way I relate to others? Obviously there is a chance for both better and worse times because of this change, but right now everyone is doing well with the way things are. Should I risk a change that might benefit me, but would potentially negatively affect them?

When do my and other people's responsibilities start and stop?

You, as a Rabbi, had a very different view from many of your friends and contemporaries. A change in your views with them would not be nearly as big of a deal as a change in your views that would affect your congregation. How do you know what to do, when to do it and monitor the changes that are happening? Are you locked in to being a certain way because it is an expected part of your job and responsibilities?

How do you separate structure from faith, from doctrine and from a living plan for life?

Could I be correct and the religion could be wrong? Am I out of step or are

they and if so, can or should we come back together? Is that when people start new religions?

Is God going to be angry with me for reacting this way and will things suddenly turn badly?

Am I asking questions that should not be asked or just hope things will work out?

Let's move from religion to everyday matters. Let' say that you have been in the same job for twenty years. You hate it, but you have a family to support and people counting on you. Should you stay with it? When do the obligations you have to yourself override the obligations you have to others?

What if you have a family member, a parent who does not treat you well? You have done your best over time to be a good son or daughter and your patience is about to give up. Our society and our religions tell us to honor our parents. What do we do when we can no longer do this? If we sever the relationship, are we dooming ourselves to eternal penance because we did not do what was expected of us?

You have a chance to follow your dream into a new line of work. It will mean you and your family will have to take a major financial risk to do it. You will be affecting everyone's lives with your dream. Should you go for it?

What we are talking about is responsibility versus want. When is it right to go for it and when is it right to make a change? Who decided in the end if we were right or wrong? How is it all measured? Who decides?

I am planning the distribution of my book to start in August, which is a good time for our next mailing.

When Ben comes in two weeks, we will have a lot to talk about. Our people have been making progress in setting up contacts for the SGS system. There's no deal yet, but progress is being made. We will also talk about more sales people for India, working on both IJN and IJM regarding more sales, better penetration into the market and whether personnel changes are needed.

I took Kayla to camp today; it was sad seeing her go, but she seemed very happy by the time I left. I guess I am fine, but still a little lonely and sad.

Checking on sales is becoming more of an effort since we are now worldwide and I can't just judge things on how IJUS is doing. My moods coincide with how we are doing in sales as well as my weight. I know it sounds strange, but they both are directly tied to my ego and how I judge myself.

I have acupuncture again tomorrow. I am not sure if it is helping, but I will continue for a while. Both boys are doing well, but my son Ben needs to be out of the house. He will hopefully be finished with his internship and on salary by September so that he can move out. Alex goes back to school in August. Kayla will be home by then and life will hopefully go back to normal. Kayla's car got hit by another car last night, which was not her fault. The boy who did it admitted to it. She came in last night and got me up both because she was really upset and to check her car. I had been asleep, but it is never a problem when one of my kids needs me. After she calmed down, I tried to go to back to sleep, but it took a while. This morning I spoke to the boy's father who asked me to use their body shop for repairs. I will try them tomorrow; otherwise, I will go through insurance. I'm a little uneasy about this, but Kayla and he are friends so I will try to let them do it the way they want.

David is in tomorrow and we are working on a new compensation plan for him. I hope to get it settled within the next few weeks. Come August, it will be review time for raises, bonuses and cut backs where needed. It is a stressful time for everyone.

6/18/08 7:24 DST Home, NJ

I woke up this morning and immediately had an anxiety attack over Kayla's car. She is at camp now. I needed to check if she was okay from the accident before going to the man's collision dealer instead of going through our insurance company. I was annoyed that I had agreed, but decided to calm down and eventually later that day after some phone tag got a hold of Kayla. Happily, she is fine. I spoke with the collision man and he seems to be okay. In fact, David and I had been going to a meeting with Indy and two other people for the SGS project and on the way, David was driving my car and got into a car accident. Now there were two cars to get repaired, which actually got to be humorous by the end of the day.

As I mentioned, David was in and we spoke about sales, the news sales CD, which I must outline and the SGS meeting. Indy had set this up and I had no idea what to expect, but by the time we got to the meeting after being delayed in the traffic jam and the accident, I was not in a great mood. The guests, however, were good and one of the people in particular looked like he could help set up a deal in India so I quickly forgot about everything else and centered on that. He said he could set up a joint venture with a hospital, clinics, doctors and patient guarantees in exchange for our bringing in the SGS unit and

possibly take care of the construction. He is supposed to get back to us early next week and I invited him to come to China to see a unit in operation. I am going to Asia in October, Canada next Month and Mexico in August. I miss being on the road.

The days are moving swiftly, which means they are good.

I see Ira tomorrow and have the final proof for the family history he wrote. It is a grand effort, but I fear the feedback will not be all positive. Some relatives did not put in anything and others will not like what was left out, or written. He is a good man for trying.

It is the longest day of the year.

It is also Saturday morning and I would normally be getting ready to go to my Temple Minyan, but today is different. I am in "the cave", the room in my house where I love to write. I am sitting on the floor with my laptop, Bailey is beside me and now I begin a spiritual journey that I have been contemplating for a while. I am determined to come up with a better way for me, a guide that will enable me to take journey into myself without the standard structure of my religion. In my case, it is Judaism, but I have to feel that many people from all religions get to the point where I am. Where does the religion stop and the faith begin? If I am going to have a relationship with my God and yours, then don't we need to find a simpler, faster, easier way to get to the point where the good stuff begins? I define the good stuff as thinking about what is important to me, the work I want to do, the people I want to support and the better person I want to become. Religion was created as a structure to mold the thoughts of its congregants to be on a path so in the shortest amount of time, they could be acting in a similar way to reach the same results of whatever the religion says it can supply. Religion is a way to level the playing field with a list of do's and don'ts that if you follow, will get you to a certain position and that position will be recognized, respected and sometimes exalted by the others in that religion. But I don't see how that is so great for the individual. Rituals that can be cemented in structures over thousands of years can often become rigid forms of conduct that do not allow for any freedom of thought, movement and especially change. Therefore, what am I trying to do?

I want to start from scratch as to what I want for myself, my family, and the world around me. I want to have, less conflict, more love, peace happiness, success and I want everyone else to have it too. I want people to have the chance to be, in the most positive way, the best that they can be and leave their path up to them. I don't want to force a low level of equality. I want to help create a level playing field where we all can soar to what is possible.

We are all different and we are all the same, but how do you get things to be better?

You start at the beginning and with yourself, which means it begins with me.

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I created a prayer that I recite virtually every night. It is my way of always trying to remember who I am, being thankful for everything I have and for the people around me.

I hope it goes well and everyone's health remains intact. My trips to Canada and Mexico are now set. Next will be Europe and Asia. I started working on a new place for Hungary. It may be good to be in Eastern Europe too.

After tennis with my brother and biking by myself, I met Dan and Ben over at Dan's office to record the next edition of the Sunday Night Lifeguards. This one was about a "Crisis in Faith", mine to be exact. It was a good from both a recording and personal standpoint. Dan is such a normal guy for a rabbi. He is very easy to talk to and a fascinating person to interview. The exciting thing about conducting the session is I got to steer it to the places which directly concerned me first and then to others, which I thought would also be of interest to everyone listening. I was never one to like the confines of a structure that can never be altered. Our religion seems that way to me, but with Dan's guidance, I saw it in a new light. Still, as per his views, there is room for much change and I plan to continue on my guest to find out what available structure works for me and what doesn't. I want a building in Millburn. It is the same building that I have wanted for years. Today I put my plan into motion. I had Uncle Dave call the renter there and ask if they were staying. They said yes and they had an option to buy. I then had Uncle Dave start searching for the owner. Once found, he will let the owner know I am interested in renting or buying in the future. In the event that the renter goes to the owner and says they want a rent decrease because of the economic conditions, the owner, who might not have had an alternate option before, now has one by contacting me. The renter now knows that someone else is interested and will be much less likely to try and bargain down the rent. If they do and force the owner to buy, they know someone (me) will be bidding against them. Therefore, if they want to own the building, it is in their best interest to pay all of the rent due, which may be a problem if the receding economy continues. If they

do try to cut the rent and succeed, then the owner may be much more interested in selling and I would take a low paying tenant since I don't want to occupy the building for four years anyway. In other words, I am in a good position and will now wait a year or two and see what develops. Worst case, I have to let go and find another building. Best case, I get the building that I want.

I told him he did not have enough money or manpower for this project and therefore, I did not want to be a stock holder. I was sorry that he was dismayed at the small value I placed on his company. If he wants to use us as a supplier, that was okay. I still would like to build their solar water heaters and be involved with the water purification products. If they don't move quickly, however, they will be pushed aside by the competition.

This morning started normally: my five alarms went off and I woke

up, (not too quickly, but I did).

I got to the office, answered my email and then I got a call at about 6:10. It was from Paul my tennis coach. Normally this would mean a cancellation or time change for my lesson today, but this time it was different. He said there was a cat that was almost dead in the driveway at the tennis club and he wanted help as to what to do. We talked and thought about emergency services, but it was so early that we did not figure anyone would come. I am not normally a fan of cats; I am allergic to them and usually keep my distance. But I found out this was a kitten and my paternal instincts kicked in. I told him that I would be there soon; my normal lesson was at 6:45 AM.

I asked Paul to put something by the cat so that no one would run him over. As I turned into the lot, I saw him and it didn't look good. It was a little kitten about six inches long. I took out the supplies I brought with me. I put on the plastic gloves and placed him into the box with a towel and some plastic cushions. Then I ripped off the top of a Styrofoam cup and poured some "half and half" inside. He did not move, but I put some on his lips, no reaction. I placed him near the entrance to the club and called out for Paul. The kitten still moved once in a while so we knew he was still alive. We decided that he would take him to his veterinarian, which opened at 8:00 AM. I wasn't scheduled to play with him until 7:45 so it worked out well. I gave Paul some money for the vet and after we played, he left.

Marisol agreed and she will leave after David and I go down to see all the customers in early August. Paulina will take over. It is always sad when things don't work out.

I called Barbara today after I got a list of good foods from the acupuncturist considering the minor problems I have been having. She is a trained chef in organic foods and has nicely agreed to help me choose what to eat instead of fighting my stomach.

My back was bothering me yesterday, the acupuncture helped. Steven wanted me to cancel my game, but I was scheduled and would not do it. However, I did play inside, which helped and I went to a spin control as opposed to an "all out kill game" and my back was okay. I played well and I will consider playing that way more to be friendlier to my body.

I am getting older and my resources are limited. I need to be smarter and I will attempt to do that with diet and workout modifications. It has been quite a day; I hope I sleep well tonight. Last night the alarm went off twice. Wendy told me this morning and I never even heard it. I am usually a light sleeper, I must be really tired.

6/28/08 2:59 PM DST The Berkshires

I played tennis yesterday with my brother, a fine time as usual. Afterwards I went right home, did not even stop back at the office, and Wendy and I drove up to the Berkshires. I started to relax as soon as we got to the New York Thruway and it was wonderful to be back up here again. The last time was in December. I know it seems ridiculous to have a second house that we visit so infrequently but just knowing it is here has its therapeutic effects. We left Alex and Ben home with Bailey; if the weather is okay, we will stay until Monday. After we arrived yesterday afternoon, we went shopping and I took out my bike on a short run that went past the Tanglewood Music Festival Box Office so I could buy tickets for tonight's performance of "A Prairie Home Companion." There were no inside seats left, only those for the lawn so if it does indeed thunderstorm as forecasted then we won't go. We went to a new restaurant in nearby Lee last night, which was very good and last night I slept out on the porch. My hope for sleeping there was to see both the fireflies this time of year and being able to fall asleep in the fantastic New England air. The fireflies were indeed out and there was a fireworks display with an occasional sparkler shooting up to the tops of the trees. I feel asleep to the sounds of the insects, random cars

and the feel of nighttime itself.

Wendy and I were supposed to go out for breakfast this morning but the new place we had planned to try did not open until 8:00 AM so we ended up at the local bagel store instead. No matter the food was good for me. Wendy only wanted coffee anyway and then I realized why we had been guided there.

When Paul, my tennis instructor, had found the kitten a few days ago he took it to his veterinarian. I had given him some money for its care but unfortunately the kitten had died and the Vet refused the money, but said to give it to a shelter. I gave Paul some additional money to donate, but he could not find a place. In the bagel store was a donation receptacle to help animals and I knew I had found my spot. Now the money is in, I can stop worrying about what to do with it and I hope it will help.

After breakfast a friend of my named John came over to bicycle. He lives near us at home and he and his wife bought a place up here a few years ago. We have spoken about getting together and this morning marked the first time we actually did. There are two types of bikers, on-road and off-road. Like people who sail versus powerboat, those who cross country ski versus downhill, bikers come from two very different paths of life. An off-road biker is normally more concerned with the toughness and varied topography of the terrain and less with total miles. We even dress with the street bikers in multicolored uniforms and the off-road bikers wear enough clothes so that when they wipe out, they will sustain the least amount of injuries. Off-road biking often means falling off the bike or getting beaten up by the terrain. I am one of those.

John came over and as we started out, I spent the next two hours mostly seeing his back. He is a really nice guy and in excellent shape. I plan to bike with him again. We talked about life, family and business; we are both about the same age. He eventually wants to retire up here and maybe start his own company; I have no plans to ever retire, but would like to spend more time up here. As I mentioned, he is in good shape and by the end of the ride, I was really tired and in need of massive amounts of fluids. The next time, however, we will go off road, which might slow him up a little. It was fun being out with him.

Once home and in changed clothes, I came to the quick realization that since Wendy was not back yet and I promised to get dinner for tonight not to mention lunch for myself. That meant I had to change clothes and take my bike out again to go to the local supermarket. It was hardly a hardship, but I was still tired as I made my way back up the long hill into the town of Lenox. On the way, I stopped at the local hardware store and picked up some glue for some home repairs I have to do and also some air fresheners for our basement.

When I got back, Wendy was already there. After lunch, I did laundry and some editing.

All year long I wait for Garrison Kieller to come to Tanglewood with his show and it is scheduled to begin at 5:45 tonight. Unfortunately, the thunderstorms are scheduled for the same time so I am not sure if we will make it.

I have been giving a lot of thought to my idea for a change in the religious service I follow and from that I thought it might be a good idea to write my own list of commandments. That probably sounds a bit presumptuous of me to do that, but everything starts with an idea and if I don't pursue what I am feeling, then I am simply not being honest with myself. In Judaism, there are 10 main commandments and hundreds of others. Here are my first 21, or at least my first attempt at it. I have borrowed some commandments from other religions to make them my own:

- 1. Treat someone, as you want to be treated.
- 2. Do your best but no one is perfect. When you make a mistake, admit it, try to fix the problems that occurred from it and then move on without guilt.
- 3. Never use guilt as a weapon.
- 4. People rarely if ever change; assume they won't and move away from them if they are toxic.
- 5. Honor your parents for as long as they deserve it; if they don't, then respect them but limit your contact
- 6. Being a relative does not mean someone can demand anything that is dishonest, immoral or will cause undo hardships in any way.
- 7. Stay married as long as both people want to be.
- 8. It is impossible not to think mean, horrible thoughts; it is not a cause for worry or remorse as long as you do nothing about them.

- 10. Be positive towards everyone, especially yourself.
- 11. Stay away from people who are negative.

The thunderstorms started at about 5:00 PM so we called John and his wife and ended up having a very nice dinner with them last night. They have a small dog, (a Bijon like ours) and it was nice to see that ours was not the only crazy, lovable one around.

I got up this morning and rode my normal route including through the woods. It was beautiful. But the skies, as predicted began to cloud over and we were thinking about leaving for home after we had lunch with our old friends Jerry and Laurie. They are always fun and it is always interesting talking to Jerry about being in a family printing business. Laurie is also an artist and is now marketing some of her artwork like we are trying to do with Alex. We left them at 1:30 and decided to go home, we zoomed back to our house, cleaned and locked up in less than thirty minutes. Wendy and I are a great team and were on the road before 3:00 PM. I had some trepidation about leaving on a Sunday for home because of traffic, but we had two things working for us: one was the price of gas and the other was the forecast for storms. Whatever the reason there were not a lot of cars and we made it home in good time.

Everything here is fine, we have already seen Alex and Bailey, Ben should be home soon. Kayla has been calling from her camp, she has a few days off coming up and would like to come home for a day but it is tough getting her up and back in the time slots necessary so we are trying to make arrangements where she can at least leave there for a while.

We have a new intern starting this Wednesday. He is the son of a good friend of the family so I told him he could choose his hours and days working, but I got a call on Friday saying he had to leave early his

first day because of an eye doctor appointment. I have been really easy on this kid and to have him dictate this to me on his first day was annoying. Had he not been a friend of the family I probably would have fired him on the spot. Instead I called home to talk to him and got his mother. She saw no problem in the eye doctor changing the time on her so she had her son change the time on me. She saw nothing wrong with it even though it was his first day of work.

If I give this kid only one gift this summer (assuming he lasts past the first day), it will be to look at how his actions will affect others before he takes them. Had he thought about his new boss instead of himself, he would have realized what a stupid thing it was to tell me he was leaving early on his first day as opposed to asking if it was okay with me or telling me the situation that his mother did not give him a choice. The right move for him would have been to call me with an apology, say his mother did this without his knowledge, she says he has to go, will not make a new appointment before he goes off to college and would I mind if he went. In that case I obviously would have said it was fine and thought better of him for having taken my feelings into account. Often in life it is the little things that make the big difference. Thinking from the other person's point of view, even if you end up doing exactly what you would have done before will often end in your movement forward on the road to success instead of the road to oblivion. If I can teach him to think I will have done my job.

I wanted to think of the construction of the units in printing terms because that is a clear, defined way of thought for me. I thought for a while and perhaps may have come up with a breakthrough, which I will verify with Dan later. If it works, it will revolutionize the industry, make it cheaper, faster and easier to not only create hot water, but also purify water. As I have often said, pre-determined thought and conventional modes of learning can be both a help and a hindrance. Since I am not encumbered by traditional engineering thought and have no formal scientific background, my mind is free to explore new areas. Nothing is impossible since I don't know otherwise. In many ways, it is a great place to be. I am, however, sometimes looked down upon by those with degrees, but that happens to me everywhere so I trv to janore it.

After I got the idea, I went to breakfast with Wendy and then it was on the road with Stella (my bike). She is wonderful, always waiting for me in the shed, ready to ride and be out in the fresh air. Today was no different and we were consistently trying to outrun the rain showers, which only drizzled on us a few times. It is a cloudy, rainy day and I will go see my parents later. It is also the Jewish Sabbath and up until a few weeks ago, I would have gone to Temple this morning. I am finding that the guilt of not going is subsiding. Therefore, I should spend my time reading on my own and not going to services especially if I don't really want to be there. But then again, the feeling of guilt takes over for not going to services. Yet, if I am still reading on my own, writing here and praying, then why does it matter? Obviously I have some conflict here. My religion, in fact, does say that you can pray anywhere and being together is not a necessity. As my wonderful wife has said, I should try it on my own for a while and see how it works. Trying to make sense out of a world that often seems to have no plan has always fascinated me. Chaos does not mean there is no form or structure. It just means that there are situations that we can't recognize. As I have gotten older, my beliefs have become simpler in many ways. I can understand that there are reasons why people do horrible things to each other and I can also understand the reason and justification for revenge. I can understand that there are times when one's beliefs are strong enough to warrant sacrifices of varying degrees. I believe in laws and I believe in level playing fields. I also know about reality and the world as it is. I believe that strength enables tenderness and power enables equality and stability. Weakness or indecision will never win. The hard part about strength and power is that it is intoxicating like a drug. People do as you want and say what you want to hear. But strength and power should only be used to move forward for everyone's benefit. I should have feedback in the morning if it should work. If it does, we will move forward. As with many of my ideas, it is cut and dry. Marketing it is a separate matter. First, we must see if it functions.

But he persevered and has been getting good results so come Monday morning, he will be going after more. When I got back from dinner, I was about ready to fall asleep. For a moment, there was a little panic as to how to enter, but there was a car behind me and I stepped out to find out what to do and it turned out to be their security. He let us through. Once I got home and changed, I went biking in the 90-degree heat. I was dressed in my usual garb, but since my neck was hurting, I put some ice in a tee-shirt and wrapped it around my neck. It must have seemed pretty strange, but it helped and after I rode to the office and rechecked the cooling system, I was back on the road. It was really hot, but I got through it and spent the rest of the afternoon getting my clothes together for the week, bringing them to the office and then going to see my parents. I had a book about Jean Shepherd that I wanted to give my dad so I brought it along. I have decided that I would dedicate my book to him and here is what I plan to say.

It has become a part of me and I cherish the ability to be able to convey what has happened to me, and the lessons I have learned with the hope that they will not only entertain, but also help others to avoid some of the pitfalls into which I have plunged. In addition, my books and CDs have become a major component of our branding worldwide and have helped to promote the Ideal Jacobs name everywhere. I am no Hemingway, but good enough that I have the unique opportunity to have an audience that wants to see and hear my work without having to go through the confines and delays of formal publishing houses. Besides, I can give it out for free.

Therefore, this book is dedicated to "Shep". He may have passed on a few years ago, but he is still very much alive in the tapes I have of his radio shows. He talks, I listen and still learn.

I spoke to our highest level contact from OSHA today and he was nice enough to send our carbon credit proposal up his chain of command that will hopefully bring it to the governor. The people in OSHA Sharp are friendly, helpful and go out of their way to do good work. In this case, even though our program technically has nothing to do with health and safety, they are giving us all of their support to help get a pilot project going. Meanwhile, Senator Lautenberg's office has the same proposal and we are hoping for feedback this week. With all of that in mind, I remembered that Dan had suggested we send out the proposal to the township of Maplewood where our plant is located. They have been in the forefront of the global warming problem and trying to move forward on a grass roots level to make a reduction in the carbon footprints of township individuals and companies. It then all clicked for me. I sent our proposal to the head of the town's safety group with the idea that I no longer had to go to the state for permission or even help. The township could do it all themselves, especially since my company would buy up all of the carbon credits produced whether they could be used in the future or not. We have the perfect test case right in our own town. Now all I have to do is get them to agree to it.

It will be simple. People in the town will sign up for the program and use the EPA Carbon Calculator. We will record all of the data and issue payments for the carbon credits produced. It is possible that the township will also want to be involved from that end and maybe start certifying the credits themselves in the form of municipal tax deductions in exchange for the credits. From there, we can get a good idea of what can actually be accomplished, show the state how it can be done and then expand from there. Since money, structure, data gathering, retrieval, processing, accounting and accountability are not a problem, it should make it a much easier sale. Or at least I hope it will. The next stop is to get the comments from the head of the health department, then to the mayor and town council and finally the people themselves. We now have a clear path to travel.

Wendy has been in the Berkshires since Sunday and I miss her. However, being with the boys has been fun.

Yesterday I got an email right before I was supposed to play tennis, that my partner's wife had just had twins and he was cancelling on me because he had been up all night. An understandable situation so I decided to go home, get my bike and go riding for an hour. The workout would have been just as good and I would still be outside. When I got home, I got another email saying that he decided he could play so I rushed over to the tennis club and we had a good game. I lost two out of three sets. From there it was back to work, to get ready for today's trip to Ottawa. David was in yesterday, he was going to Toronto today and we talked about sales both for Ideal Jacobs and Ideal Jacobs Medical. Marisol is still trying to close the deal for the SGS center in Guadalajara. David and I will go down there in two weeks both to discuss that and to do the formal turnover of Marisol to SGS sales and Paulina taking over Ideal Jacobs Mexico.

Since I figured I would not workout today and Wendy was gone, I took advantage and went riding last night. It was beautiful and my mind was much clearer by the time I got back. I spoke to Wendy and she sounds okay. It was raining up in Massachusetts and she will be happier when we are back together when I go up there on Friday.

I woke up this morning to the daunting sound of thunder and rain, not great signs when trying to fly, but so far things seem to be on schedule here.

We hired a new pressman, a specialist in roll-to-roll presses to take over the press we plan to install next month. Vinnie and he are working on finding the best press for us and we are excited about the prospect of our increased capacity.

Even though the press has just been installed, I am already looking for more space. We hope to put in a small fabric over foam gasket line that we will eventually incorporate into larger quarters in the next few years. Vinnie and I are going to Asia in October and while there, he will visit our gasket partners and machine manufacturers to see what will be needed to get started here. It is a little contradictory to the norm. We will be importing Chinese machinery and technology into the US. I don't care where it comes from as long as we get it legally and it will help our marketing efforts worldwide. I am convinced that the rising price of oil will spur manufacturing and assembly in the U.S. and I plan on riding that wave as it continues to grow.

My first stop today is Alcatel-Lucent, there is a new man in charge. We have had contact before and I am looking forward to visiting with him about what additional areas we can be of service. For now I just want to be in the air.

The Presidential race is in full swing here and as usual, the Republicans, with whom I am aligned, are running a stupid campaign of being on the fringe right wing. They are trying to appeal to the conservative faction of the country which does not appeal to me. Unfortunately, Mr. Obama has virtually no foreign policy or any other experience and giving him the power with the hope that his theories, will work, is not acceptable. I just think back to the last candidate who sounded like he

did and that was Jimmy Carter, which was an absolute disaster for the county. New ideas are fine, but they have to be based in experience, logic and foresight. I am afraid Mr. Obama fails in that category so I will have to vote for the Republican Candidate.

7/23/08 7:00 PM DST Ottawa Airport, Canada - The Tarmac

We ended up being about an hour late and after getting through immigration and customs, my driver for the day was waiting for me. We left for Alcatel-Lucent. There was a new buyer there and my tardiness had worked out well since his boss had called him in for some rush meetings. Off we went to lunch where we spoke about his childhood in Shanghai and then his education in Canada. He took a different path from his father who was in real estate and wanted him to come into the family business. He wanted some international experience first and struck off on his own. He is competent, tough and a good buyer, which was evident after we went into some brief negotiations about prices for 2009 when we had returned from lunch. After most of the work was done, I went to check where I always keep my passport and it was gone. I freaked out and immediately searched and could not find it. Excusing myself, I said I had to go, stopped first to be introduced to another person involved with labels and rushed out to the car with the buyer following to see if he could help. No luck and I was really getting upset, but I thanked him for his concern and his offer to help get us into the gasket area and told Paul to get us back to the restaurant. Perhaps I had left it there. A few minutes later, Paul suggested that I may have put it in my carrying case and after we stopped, I breathed a large sigh of relief when I found it.

From there we went to Ciena to see an engineer who I had been speaking to for years and while waiting for him, I got a note that my flight home was probably cancelled. I called my office to check and out it was really cancelled. There was a big storm and most flights to the New York Area were delayed or cancelled. We rushed back to the airport where I booked a flight to Philadelphia. After a few hours of waiting, we boarded the plane and here we wait now on the tarmac. Philadelphia has a hold on air traffic and if we stay here for another hour, they will probably cancel the flight and I will leave in the morning. I have a driver setup in Philadelphia to take me to Newark if we

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take off. I would like to get home tonight.

I have been doing a lot of final editing for the book. I hope to be done by Monday and then we go to art and press. I spoke to Wendy before. She is good, but misses me as I miss her. It is beginning to rain here.

I had sent a letter to the owner of the building that I wanted in the next town. It simply said if he had any space that he wanted to rent to please call us. He called today and does have space. I will check it when I get back.

7/24/08 5:20 AM DST Ottawa Airport

You read correctly, I am still in Canada.

Our plane was cancelled at about 8:00 PM last night, which necessitated a rush to get back through customs. We had technically already entered the US when we got on the plane, to the US Airways Ticket Counter. By the time I got there, the line was long and it would have taken too long to get through. Figuring I would be able to get on the 6:00 AM flight to Newark this morning, I went and got some Canadian dollars, got a hotel through a nice Airport representative and off I went to the Best Western in downtown Ottawa. Meanwhile David had been having a similar experience. He had by this time, had three flights cancelled and was also working on getting a hotel for the night.

I got to my hotel room and went to sleep at about 10:30. The good news was that in retrospect I had a good day. Seeing my first customer had paved the way for additional business covering more of our product lines, which was a great thing. The second customer also offered to help us get our gasket line into their product flow. The other good news was that I had remembered what my Uncle Phil had done, which was always carry spare underwear when traveling even for the day because you never know. Therefore, I had some clean clothes to change into, which was very nice after a long, hot shower. I got up at 3:15 AM and went to the airport. I then wondered why I thought I could get on the 6:00 AM flight to Newark when everything else had been cancelled the night before. The answer was I couldn't, but the ticketing people were great. I went from Continental to US Air back to Continental to Air Canada and I am now scheduled for the 6:00 AM flight to LaGuardia in New York. I am not sure where LaGuardia is located, but I can make the assumption that I can get from there to Newark Airport.

The other good news is that thanks to my Blackberry, I am reasonably caught up with work. The editing for my book, The Ideal Entrepreneur, is done for now and I am planning to go biking tonight since I had to cancel my tennis for this morning. I emailed and called my tennis partner last night and told him how hard I had tried to get

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back and he understood, but it still would have been nice to be home. Things happen and I am hoping this adventure will end easily and happily with me getting into the office before 11:00 AM so I can catch up on everything.

7/24/08 7:21 DST In Flight to LaGuardia Airport, New York

The plane has left Canada!

We should be on the ground by 8:00 AM and then I will start my trek to Newark Airport. My hope is that there is a direct train from airport to airport. Worst case, I will go by car, but it is rush hour and will be time-consuming and expensive. As is normal for me in retrospect, I tend to view things better and I am really happy I was able to spend time with the AL buyer yesterday. Having a face-to-face meeting, especially out of the office, gives me the opportunity to build a better relationship with him. As a buyer, he obviously wants the best quality products at the cheapest prices with on-time deliveries. But there is so much more to a business relationship. The possibilities are there and I must make sure that each of our company's best interest remains intact.

7/24/08 8:20 AM DST Uptown Manhattan-Harlem

Going towards the Lincoln Tunnel and Newark Airport

We landed on time and the weather here is rainy and not great. My hopes for a direct train from LaGuardia Airport to Newark Airport were squashed since there isn't one and I had to either take a cab or bus. The thought of trying to navigate a bus schedule was out of the question considering I needed to get back to the office as quickly as possible. I will be very fortunate to get to Newark Airport in an hour and then pick up my car. With luck, I should be in the office by 10:00 AM. If that happens, I will consider myself very fortunate. Life on the road evens out; most of the time it is either great or okay. The day I cannot bear the thought of having delays and cancellations is the day I need to do something else. I am glad that day has not come yet.

7/27/08 7:44 PM DST Home, NJ

I got up yesterday at about 7:30 after a wonderful night's sleep on our porch in the Berkshires. It was just cold enough to need my sleeping bags, but not cold enough to be uncomfortable. As planned, I had breakfast with Wendy and then went mountain biking through the gorgeous New England woods. You can't ride in the woods in New Jersey because it is illegal. I noticed a message in my car saying there was a problem with the hybrid and all wheel drive systems so I called my dealer in New Jersey who said if the car was acting okay, then I could drive her home.

I picked up my father-in-law after biking and we had lunch. Just as we got back, my engine felt like it seized and we stopped dead. I was able to move her a little more so she was in their driveway. The good news is that my car was safe in a spot that was okay to leave it. Also, my wife had her car up here so I could get home. There was a Lexus dealer within an hour's drive and I had coverage to take care of the towing. I called the Lexus hot line and they set-up my car to be picked up and taken to the dealer. I called the dealer and they said that would be ready for my car. The dealer said they could return the car to my in-laws when they finished. My mother-in-law, the wonderful woman that she is said she would drive my car back down to New Jersey for me when it was ready. I had Kayla's car to use when I got home until mine was fixed. Moreover, I got to ride home with Wendy instead of our taking separate cars

However, the bad news is that my car was in trouble and I would not have it for at least a week. I lost some time when all this happened. All and all, I came out way ahead, knew it and remained relatively calm throughout the whole thing.

AAA took a long time to pick her up so we left the key in the car and Wendy took me into Lenox for a little while. Then we went back home for a snack and we got ready for Movie Night at Tanglewood. This is a special concert that Wendy loves where music is played to clips of movies with John Williams, who composed the music to Star Wars, was conducting.

We got to Tanglewood in time to have dinner there and just as we were walking in, we heard thunder. After waiting in the car for a little while to see if the rain would stop, we gave up and went into Lenox and had dinner. It was just as well since a giant cloudburst happened a short time later. After getting home, we decided to leave the next morning a day early. We were out of the house today before 8:00 and home by 11:00. I went for a long bike ride and then to the office to try to catch up after being out almost two days last week. Tomorrow is going to be crazy, I doubt I will catch up then and we have an appointment to go see some additional space in a new building to house the new press line. By late afternoon we should have also heard from Vinnie and John as to how their search for a potential press went.

Meanwhile, questions about the SGS center for Mexico have been going back and forth between our people and I am hoping to have everything concluded from our side by Tuesday. My partner Ben helped me realize part of my dream when we opened up IJX and I hope some-

day to do the same for him. He really wants this center in Mexico to happen and I will try to make sure that it does. I think it is a great idea with a lot of potential. It does, however, have a lot of risk including additional financial stress on IJUS. It would seem an unusual moment for great expansion giving the economy of the world, but with my contrarian point-of-view, it is also a very good time. The risk we are taking here is not nearly as much as with IJX so the stress level is not as high. Buying the roll-to-roll press at the same time and possible additional outside space to enable it means the risks are multiplied. Besides the Carbon Credit Project, I think we will limit ourselves for anything else for the foreseeable future. I need to be able to sleep at night.

7/28/08 9:55 PM DST Monday

I was up at 4:00 AM, went to the office, checked my email, exercised, had breakfast number 1, played tennis, had a quick haircut, went back to the office and spent the rest of the morning trying to catch up from being out two days last week.

I spoke to my VP's throughout the day regarding the SGS Center and everyone agreed that it was a good idea so it moved to the next stage. Vinnie and John left early in the morning to go to southern New Jersey to see a press that was the one that John had used for years at his other job. The report was that it was in very good shape, but was big too big to work in our current space. It was a good thing since we were going to visit the potential, new building I had been eyeing for years to see if we could rent space there. There were six of us on the tour including my son Alex. Everyone was looking for something different. Vinnie was checking for power and layout. Mike and Marc were checking the space and layout, Al was figuring out how the company was doing and why they had so much extra space. Alex was with me watching everything and I was dealing with the controller who was our tour guide. The company had scaled back and had a lot of extra space. There was 12,000 sq. ft that would be perfect or it could be cut in half. We were interested and agreed to call back the controller later in the week. He mentioned it was a Korean-owned company and I would have to deal with the boss, which was okay with me. If my experience in negotiating was not positive, then having him as a landlord would be a disaster so the situation would define itself. The economy is not great so if this space did not work out, there was more elsewhere. It was like a fantasy finally getting into the building that I had passed so long. I would like us to be there if we could work it out. Then it was back to the office and more paperwork, I got a lot done, but will need all of tomorrow to try and catch up more.

With the exacerbated financial situation in the global economy,

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this may seem like a strange time to expand, but it feels right and my team is behind it. The new press with support materials including press people will cost about \$400,000 for the first year. I figure that the space will cost about \$75,000 and the SGS Center will cost about \$650,000. I hope my instincts are right.

7/29/08 9:53 PM DST Home, NJ

After tennis and my second breakfast, I started on the backup of paperwork I had still from last week. All went well. Vinnie and John found an additional press to look at so now we may have a choice of roll-to-roll machines. Either way, we need more outside space and I emailed them this morning to say that we were interested. Just in case, I went to look at alternative space, which wasn't suitable. Uncle Dave will look for more. I got Marisol's final package ready with two options for after she leaves IJUS. I want her to join the new medical company I hope to help setup when David and I go down next week but want to be prepared beforehand. We will have a lot to do including the changeover to Paulina so we need to be ready. I spoke to the Lexus Dealer in Massachusetts and so far bad news on my car. I am highly concerned that she will never be right again. I may try to trade her in early. I will talk to my local dealer tomorrow.

There is a heavy amount of stress regarding the new press line SGS facility and cash flow. People owe us a lot and it is mostly on time, but we are being forced to tighten our resources. We are going to spend a lot of money and that is rarely a calm time. I will need to go to Mexico on August 16th to meet with the SGS people and Ben. It is too bad the trips are so close together, but we need everything with our people and clinic to be as solid as possible before the SGS people come in. Thankfully, business has been good because otherwise, my stress levels would be astronomical. It is crunch time!

7/30/08 9:55 PM DST Home, NJ

Vinnie and John presented the roll-to-roll press plan today and it did not make economic sense. It would cost too much per job so we abandoned the project. Instead we will try to put in a laser that can cut plastic and material parts. We can do that in our existing facility. I called Dave Williams and cancelled his search and with sadness, did the same with the building that I really liked. For that place, the controller offered his services for later if the time presented itself. I hoped that it would. We still have plans for a gasket line in the near future. I got a call from Senator Lautenberg's office regarding the carbon credits.

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They asked what I wanted and I said I wanted to start a pilot program with Maplewood. If it worked after six months, then I wanted help to spread it through the county and then the state. We would bear the costs at the beginning. His representative was in favor of the idea and I could say I spoke with her.



8/1/08 10:27 PM DST Friday Night – Home, NJ

Yesterday a man named Stuart came in to talk. I wasn't going to let him, but David persuaded me and it was a good thing he did. Stuart was a member of a gasket firm that we deal with in China. He is their only representative outside of China and when he came in one of the first things I wanted to know was if they planned to expand to the US with a plant. He said no so I then suggested a joint venture between our two companies. He was a little shocked, but intrigued and by the time we finished he was on board with the idea. Vinnie and I were already meeting to see his plant when we go over in October. Both the lasers and the gasket operation could significantly add to our volume and profit and all of us are excited. We finished the month with this year's sales ahead of last year's. Profits are down with our massive influx of funds into our sales push, but the results are already showing. I am content with our progress. I have spent the last two days catching up so I can be ready to leave on Tuesday for Mexico with a clear desk. Marisol is setting up appointments with customers to establish the transition to Paulina and also getting the final set of questions settled to pave the way to sign the first SGS agreement. I decided to have Mike come down in addition to David so the transition would be smoother.

8/2/08 9:15 AM DST Home, NJ

It is Saturday morning, the Jewish Sabbath. In past years, I would normally be at my Minyan meeting, but that has not been working for me lately so here I sit, in my cave, on the floor with Bailey at my side.

THE IDEAL ERA

For me, it is a time of reflection. The CD Dan and I made about a crisis in faith started out about me and then branched out in general. The conclusion was that it may not be a crisis of faith for me, but more of a problem with the confines of the structure. I was in temple last week and all through the service I kept wondering why I was there. Hebrew is a language I can read but don't understand. We say the same prayers and except for reading different parts of the bible that change weekly, it is always the same. I understand the repetition is to be able to give you a peace of mind to allow your being to move into another place, hopefully one open to the religious teachings and values that the elders of the religion want you to experience. However, it leads to frustration, which is why I am here and not there. I am thankful for what I have and the chance to not only help others, but also reach my goals with having fun along the way. I have been so fortunate that I always want to remember to be not only grateful, but also help others, something that can be very difficult in the course of a normal workweek. Trying to live by a code of conduct is great in theory, but the very definition means that when we deviate from it, then some type of retribution must occur. If we promise not to lie, cheat and steal and then do something that we suspect might infringe on those pledges then we have to be punished. Or do we? I am human and there are numerous commandments that I have broken and depending on the bible, I could have already been stoned and killed. How can you participate in a religion where, according to the ancient teaching you have already broken enough rules to be executed? How do you make it right in your own mind that you can ever be a good person if the rule book says you should die. Nowadays, that is not the case, but how do you deal with a set of rules that are finite and thousands of years old? As Dan said the answer is that the rules were not really rules, but guideposts for behavior. I am not sure what we will do with, it but I am sure we will use it to help our people and brand us further. I cooked dinner tonight. Having Alex home to edit is a rare treat and I want to utilize him as much as I can, but it also puts pressure on me to get it done so I went right from this year's book to next year's. He leaves in three weeks and I would like to get the first six months done if I can.

8/5/08

Newark/Liberty Airport

I have spent the last two days getting ready for this trip to Guadalajara, Mexico by working out five times so that I will hopefully be ready for the delays that might ensue because there is a big storm near Houston. Mike is already down there and David should be here soon. Friday and yesterday were also spent in preparation so that most of what needed to be done was finished. I got an email from Stuart, the man from the Chinese gasket manufacturer who we met last week. We are getting the plans ready to visit his facility again and then hopefully start a joint venture to put a small operation here in New Jersey. I also started negotiations with one of our label suppliers to work out a potential joint venture with them in Mexico. I also got an email this morning from Marisol that the SGS project there was dead. Maybe it was dead in their eyes, but not mine. They seemed to have gotten the idea that if they did not reach a certain sales level within two years, then we would pull the machine. What we said was that if it was successful, we might sell the operation after two years. We have no plans to pull the machine out if sales don't reach a certain level. I emailed Marisol that I wanted a meeting with their head negotiator this afternoon assuming we get there with the storm. So far we are on time and I hope that David shows up and we are not delayed. We will hopefully board soon. I always feel better once we are in the air. Marisol will finish her time with us by Friday. Paulina will begin as manager and there will probably be bumps along the way. I am scheduled to get my car back this Friday. The dealer has been wonderful and it will be good to have her back. I hope that David gets here soon.

8/5/08 8:05 AM DST In Flight to Houston

I called David about thirty minutes before take-off. It turned out that he got the flight times wrong, was still twenty minutes from the airport and the odds of his being able to park and make it through security in time were about zero. We have all had things like this happened so I chalked it up to fate and I would probably see him tonight. People had been extremely nice to him, let him cut the line and he wasn't even the last one on the plane. He said that he has never missed a flight and after this, I believe in his record. We should be in Houston in an hour and then we find our flight to Guadalajara, I have no idea what the storm is doing, but I am glad that David is with me. It is time to start the July newsletter.

8/5/08

11:41 Texas Time 12:41 DST Bush International Airport

I got word from Mike when we landed almost an hour late that our next flight was cancelled. I was scheduled to depart at 2:30 to Guadalajara and David got bumped to the next one. He is on standby for mine. After we got new boarding passes, we headed to the lounge and the combination of not enough food, sleep and planes got to me and I was in a very bad mood. I called into the office and a big job had been cancelled, which only made my mood worse. I will try to see it from an optimistic point of view. David and I ate the food I brought, plus some water and took some ibuprofen. Then we moved to the new terminal and we are here for another two and a half hours.

This airport has taken on a surreal nature. Many planes were banned from landing and stopped departing. There are not many of us actually here and those that are seem resigned to their fate of waiting until the next flight. It is raining like crazy outside, but I am glad it is not snow.

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8/5/08 3:12 PM Guadalajara Time 4:12 PM DST In Flight

After about five hours of waiting in Houston, we are on our way to Mexico. Happily, David also got on this flight. It is amazing when the real self-control and discipline comes in. It takes so much effort just to get where you are going that most people would not even take the journey let alone try to conduct business. It is not for the light hearted. I have been going since I woke up at 2:30 AM and David got up at 2:00 AM, but no complaints. It sets us apart from most other people and puts us into positions for the success that we both crave. I am very thirsty, but I don't think I am getting anything to drink for a while. My email seems to be working again, which I am very happy about.

8/6/08

8:26 AM Mexico Time 9:26 AM DST Guadalajara, Mexico

We got to Guadalajara and through immigration and customs by about 5:00 PM. Marisol was there and took us to the lawyers where we finalized the payment packages for her to leave and Paulina moving up to general manager. By this time both David and I were pretty tired. Marisol dropped us off at the hotel and we went to Chile's, my favorite local restaurant for dinner. The food was excellent. We bought water and fruit after and went back to the hotel. My plan this morning was to get up at 5:30, workout, eat and get ready for Marisol to pick us up at 9:00 AM. Unfortunately, I got the time zones mixed up and got up instead at 4:30. I found out about the time confusion after exercising and utilized the extra time to get more things done, which is always a good thing. I received an email from Marisol; the SGS deal is dead. I emailed Ben to cancel his plans and I will do the same so we will not meet back here in two weeks. Unfortunately, we spent a great deal of time and money on this project, but better now than later. We will have nothing further to do with the medical group or SGS in this part of the world. Things don't always work out; it is time to accept it and move on. Marisol's last official day with us is Friday. There is a thunderstorm in progress, which doesn't make it easier to make sales calls.

8/7/08

4:33 AM Mexico Time Guadalajara Airport

Yesterday turned out to be quite interesting. We were traveling as a foursome yesterday with Marisol, Paulina, and David. Our first call was to Flextronics. Things went well except it was obvious that Marisol was uncomfortable with the situation since she was going to be leaving us and IJ Medical was obviously a dead issue. After giving it some

thought, I suggested that she open her own business as a buyer. She could rent herself out to companies for specific projects and for those situations where a full time buyer wasn't needed. She was skeptical at first until I wrote out an announcement for her new company and we began to sell it as we progressed through the day. After Cisco, Telica and finally Sanmina-SCI, were we doing well as the IJ team and Marisol's spirits had risen considerably and the thought of being a small business owner went from being an impossibility to one that had real promise. We might have even gotten her the first customer yesterday so she ended up being very pleased. Paulina has been great to work with and we feel confident that she will grow well into the position of general manager. David and I traded heading up the sales calls. Our styles are different, but we meshed together well and it was fun for both of us watching how we handled various situations. He is in charge of the sales here and will come down four times a year. We both feel there is more business to get and he is aggressive enough to bring it in. We finished with the call at about 6:00 and then went back to the hotel. David and I decided to wait for Mike for dinner. He had been working on the IIM books for the past three days and was finally satisfied. He was also confident that Paulina would be able to handle things well. We met at about 9:00 PM and went across the street to Chili's again. The trip ended with mostly good things so we have a good meal and relax after a few tough days. I went back to my room and after realizing there was no time to workout this morning, I exercised some more before going to sleep. I got up this morning at about 2:15 AM, which meant I was now in serious sleep depravation mode since I had not gotten much over the past three days. The ride to the airport was swift, but worrisome because of a thunderstorm. This would normally not bother me, but since I was flying this morning, it could mean a delay. This could impede my connection in Houston. Of course, I could do nothing about it, but worry. I heard from Ben in China, he was unable to cancel or change his ticket for the trip to Mexico and he was really angry. There are a lot of companies I have been after for years and have so far not broken, one is Cisco and another is IBM. We do business for both, but through contract manufactures. The best way is directly through the companies themselves, but it can be a tough, long-term endeavor. If I don't get them, maybe my kids will in the future. So far, our flight is on time and I will hope for the best. Now it is time to edit the August Newsletter.

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8/7/08 12:48 DST In Flight

The plane ride from Guadalajara was great and I was able to get through immigration and customs with enough time to go to the Continental Lounge and change my clothes since I was wet from the long trek through the warm airport. Having the change of clothes was fantastic. I have reached the point in the trip where I am so tired that I don't know what to do with myself, so characteristically, I kept working. My eyes were burning and the spots in one of my eyes had gotten worse, and should be better with some sleep. I had two glasses of diet soda. The caffeine has kicked in, which also means I can keep working. I need to get as much editing as possible. Alex leaves soon and I wanted him to finish as much of my new book as possible. I edited the Newsletter for August so that is ready. Meanwhile Mike is hopefully getting to Chicago in another hour or two and will then meet his wife in Newark this evening, who has been in South America. I am anxious to hear how David is doing with Paulina on their sales call. I can also feel the emotions beginning to build up inside me, another sure sign of sleep deprivation. In retrospect, the bad things that happened were the SGS deal died and we spent a lot of money paying out Marisol to leave. On the good side, having Paulina in charge should be very good, David as the head of the sales effort there, not having to pay out a lot of money for the SGS Center and helping Marisol potentially transition to her new business are all very good. We will follow the same model for IJ Netherlands. If Jeroen and Jan-Willem can't produce sales, then we don't need to pay them as much as we do for just processing orders. We can do the same thing with having David in charge of the sales there and I can also help. I am going to Europe in September and will be on the look-out to set up a new distribution center closer to where our customers are located and less expensive.

Kayla came home yesterday and is leaving for camp this afternoon, there may be a chance to say hello if the plane lands in time. It would be wonderful to see her and get a hug. I will cancel my second trip to Mexico tomorrow and focus on finishing up the one for Europe next month.

For now, I may sleep or watch a movie.

I got back in the office yesterday at about 4:00 PM. The flight was early!

I got to see Kayla for about forty-five minutes before she left yesterday. The eleven-year-old kids for whom she is a junior counselor

are tough, but she said she would go back so she must not be having a horrible time. She took her car back so I do not have to pick her up when camp ends. That happens a lot now. She does not need me like she did in a lot of ways, but hopefully, the big ones will always be there.

I fell asleep early and even so I did not have enough and getting up was not pleasant.

Tennis was also difficult with my brother, my energy level was low, but increased as the day wore on and with a nap in the afternoon, I was fine.

It was a day of catching up after the trip to Mexico and things are in good shape.

8/10/08 7:28 PM DST Home, NJ

I have been emailing with Jeroen, who is starting to worry because no new sales have been coming. So far he is spending 75% of his time on plastic panels and the Gamma Knife. I plan to kill both projects tomorrow. He will center on labels or gaskets or we will find another way.

8/11/08 9:53 PM DST Home, NJ

I went to my urologist today, a very nice man who I consider highly competent. Since prostate cancer and problems run in my family, it is always with extreme trepidation that I approach my bi-annual check. Happily, this one went smoothly and I am happy to report things are fine, but I am always still a little concerned.

Jeroen called me today and told me that he is now running the main business. As soon as I heard this, I realized there was no way he could sell for us at the same time so I knew we would have to make some changes. I advised Jeroen to get a few potential plans ready, have them setup in writing and in two weeks when he meets with his partner who is on holiday to tell him to choose or Jeroen will do it for him. We will start making alternative plans if needed. I told him today to abandon all sales attempts except for labels and gasket, but in his current situation I doubt he will be able to try and sell anything. My feeling is that Jeroen and his partners will work out a new arrangement that will hopefully also be good for us. It doesn't matter that I like both Jeroen and his partner, but business has to function on its own and it is my job to make it so. I am learning a lot.

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8/13/08 9:27 PM DST Home, NJ

For the last few days I have been battling what I thought were allergies but now may be a cold or virus of some kind. I haven't been sleeping well and the last three tennis matches have been tough, but I have kept up. There was a lot of paperwork for yesterday and today but I accomplished a lot. Ben and I may have cleared up how to handle some accounting issues, which have been plaguing us for months. The solution just has to be cleared by Gary. I have to book some of my flights for Europe next month, but I am waiting to hear from Ben to see where he will meet me so we can work out the balance. We heard from the gasket company in China that is going was to setup some type of alliances for a prototype operation here. They seem as enthusiastic as we are which is excellent. We will meet with them again next month when their head salesman comes here. Mike is in The Netherlands and after my talk yesterday with Jeroen, it seems that things are better. He has a lot of decisions to make with his company, his partner and his life and they will need to be made soon. He is a good man and I wish him well. Paulina is doing fine in Mexico. We are having samples made for the new laser. If it works, then we will buy it probably in September. Ben's girlfriend Katie is staying with us for a week. She is a nice girl and is working for us part-time while she is here.

After going to the acupuncturist last night and having dinner with Wendy, I felt a little better, but realized that what I thought were allergies was actually a sinus infection. I am pretty sure that I knew how to handle that and feel better now that I had a direction. I got some sleep last night (better than the last few days), got up this morning and played tennis. Considering the way I felt, it went well and then it was back to the office.

I got a call this morning from a man I have known for years from bell labs. His department is being cut back, as is common within Alcatel-Lucent right now and he was checking his options. He belongs to the Industrial Design Department and it sounded like they were going to be slashed again. I have been trying to take over that area for over a decade and I may finally have my chance. 8/16/08 9:40 AM DST Saturday Morning – Home, NJ

Yesterday I tried to put a major plan into effect. I spoke to Sue about my plan to take over the Industrial Design Section for Alcatel-Lucent, expanding it worldwide with our people at IJ Netherlands and create a new group at IJX. Sue and Ben both liked the idea, but I have not spoken to the people in The Netherlands yet. I found out who was in charge for Alcatel-Lucent and put in a call. I have had a sinus cold for the past few days and took a nap. Unfortunately, he called while I was asleep and my people did not wake me up. This would usually have made me angry, but I always try to see that things happened for a reason. I worked out a short plan, circulated it amongst my people, and sent it yesterday afternoon. I am hoping for a meeting this Thursday with Sue and him. It is a simple plan. We will hire two of their people, set up a billing system and have all ID work comes to us. Sue will run it and then we will attempt to do the same thing in Europe. Our people there are already doing Alcatel-Lucent Design. It is simple yet effective and the advantages are major. They reduce both their head counts and their costs, save their people's jobs and outsource a function that we can handle. We should hear something on Monday.

I know from experience that my parents still think of me as their "baby." I think one of the biggest issues with older children and their parents is that there is such a long history together. It is a problem that an in-law child does not have. They came into the family already grown and living on their own. It is easy to treat them as an adult and as an equal while much more difficult when you changed a child's diapers and now they expect you to treat them as an adult.

Your parents think that they are right and they have in this way for many years. You, as the child, have either accepted them as demigods or found it easier to just let them have their way. What happens when they have crossed the line and their previous behavior, while tolerable now, is no longer? How do you let them know the rules have changed and get them to accept it?

You now have kids of your own and your parents cannot help but make comments about how they did things in their day and how you are screwing up your kids by what you are doing. How do you get them to either stay out of it or at the very least, let you parent the way you and your spouse see fit?

You are running your life the way you want, your parents find the need to comment, and they think it is still their duty to help you along the way. How do you get them to leave you alone?

Your parents are getting older, their health is deteriorating, and you can see that they will not be able to take care of themselves soon. What can you do to help get ready for what is coming? What if they demand to stay

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in total control and refuse to deviate from what they have done for all of their lives?

Your parents handle their own finances and suddenly bills are not being paid. How do you talk to them about starting to turn over their finances to someone else?

Your parent's relationship is not the best and one is treating the other badly. What steps should you take?

One of your parents is not acting positively toward you or your siblings. When should you step in?

The health of one of your parents is deteriorating. How do you make plans to take care of both when they could end up in separate places?

How to you deal with the inevitability that there will be unresolved issues with your parents and that with their passing, will never be resolved? I realize that you might say then that you should try to resolve them now, but what if the risk of closure is not worth the risk of irreparable damage? You have one set of parents. They bore you, nurtured you, cared for you and loved you. What happens when the status quo is thrown off and you are suddenly doing for them what they have always done for you? You, in effect, take over a lot of the parental duties. How do you keep from letting the positive elements of the first part not be lost in the second part? Everyone wants to feel needed and everyone wants to be independent. How do you deal with a parent that tried to use money or power to keep you under their control?

How do you not feel guilty about them?

How do you not feel guilty once they are gone?

What is the best that you can realistically hope for as your parents and you get older?

What we can remember when dealing with our parents is that we are not perfect and they are not perfect. Age does not always bring wisdom and youth is not always right.

Patience, tolerance and good will for everyone will make the journey much more pleasant. What seems perfectly logical and correct today may seem like a bad idea tomorrow.

My back was sore so I am glad I road my bike this morning instead of playing tennis. My usual partner is in Alaska so the timing worked out. It was a beautiful morning and it felt great to be out on my bike.

I sent the script for the Sunday Night Lifeguards to Dan for review, but no word back as of yet. Al, however, really liked it.

It was an amazing day. I spoke to the section leader for AL who controls the Industrial Design Group and although he had not read my email, he had no problem with the concept. I downloaded the parameters and realized that we did not fit a number of the requirements. The state would only pay someone \$40,000 to install and run the system. I consider it to be such a low amount that almost no one will go for it. I, however, have a plan and will probably offer our system for free. The supervisor mentioned that he would try to steer as much business as possible toward us and that was enough for me. We would set up an office at the AL Murray hill facility. It would be a great chance if it all comes together.

The cost of oil has made air cargo prices soar and we are taking a profit hit from the materials from China, which is another reason to do more ourselves. We are set for two days of meetings next month with the gasket manufacturer for some type of alliance here. We have spoken with Cary and I am hoping that there will be enough room opening upstairs to handle our expansion.

Alex and his friend Melanie left this morning for St. Louis; they are almost there. I miss him already. Kayla is away for the weekend and Ben is home. The house is quiet.

We do business with a very large Contract manufacturer and one of their divisions asked us to quote a lot of things, but gives us little business. The customer emailed back saying that we had to use the exact material needed, which was much more expensive. We gave the prices in today and got a verbal agreement to go ahead. It was a lot of money. We placed the orders for the material based on the customer's verbal agreement and then I got an email tonight that said our prices for the rush and the necessary material were too much and they wanted to hold and review everything after the holiday weekend. The only problem was that the deliveries needed would therefore be impossible if we waited so I had a dilemma. I could take a chance and order in the stock and figure that we would get the business or I could stop everything and wait.

It is Saturday morning and I have to stop soon to go eat and get ready for my bicycle ride with Uncle Dave. It rained last night. A great thing for our flowers and trees, the sky is still cloudy so I have no idea if we will get wet. I will, of course, be carrying my backpack with rain

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gear, extra water and other supplies so I should be ready for whatever happens. Stella, my beautiful and faithful mountain bike is equipped with wide tires, which are excellent for slippery conditions so I feel comfortable being with her.

I am still upset from yesterday's adventure with the big order. But also through experience, I know that by stopping everything and telling the customer that making their delivery is almost impossible, the pressure is now on them and not me. We should have no monetary exposure. Being the boss has a lot of good aspects and others that are not so pleasant. In this case, the decisions are mine, the way to handle the customer is mine and the final outcome is determined by both of us. I base my life on odds. In business, I make choices and enough of them work out that I am happy and extremely grateful for the chance to do more.

The economy is getting tighter and it is showing everywhere. Our customers, I know, are under pressure from their customers for lower prices, faster deliveries and still high quality. The pressure on us is enormous and only getting worse. While I am happy to report our volume for North America is 5% higher than last year, our profits levels are lower. The main reason for that is our large amount of outflow into our sales and marketing campaigns. We are traveling more to additional locations, which is a good thing, but expensive especially in the world today. Our customers are constantly asking for volume pricing, in some cases they promise to order a certain amount of a specified label, but then don't follow through. They take the less expensive price product and do not come through with the volume. Therefore, when an order comes through and a customer has not taken advantage of a volume discount we have offered, we are not going to tell them they missed it. Business ethics are very complicated. I have fought with the issue above in my head for years, but have come to the conclusion that things cannot only go in one direction. We offer once. If the customers don't take it, then that is their problem. They are certainly quick enough to push us for more discounts especially when our costs keep rising. In a perfect world, everyone would get along easily and with no conflict. Business would proceed with no problems and everyone would make money and be happy. But that world is impossible and we have to deal with what we have. I love it that way. We have to work within the marketplace we have.

I am here in "the cave" listening to The Little River Band, a group from the 1980's with Bailey by my side. It is very peaceful here, a haven from the turbulent world.

Wendy just called down to me. She and Kayla are going into Manhattan to have lunch at the restaurant where our nephew Barry works. Ben had been down a few minutes earlier to get his base guitar, which he will take into work at the recording studio and store there.

He should be mostly moved out by next week. It is the little things in life I like: sometimes taking Bailey for a walk after dinner, taking out the recycling and garbage to be picked-up, looking at how my flowers are growing. I take joy in knowing I have tennis games set in advance, seeing my brother three times a week, eating cereal and a banana as my first breakfast before I leave for tennis. When I am traveling, it is the routine and the rituals I miss, seeing my wife and daughter at certain times of the day, knowing what I have to do and where I need to be. It is the foundation and structure that put my mind at ease and the chance to think about other things. The greatest part about traveling is realizing I get to go home and return to what I love. I do enjoy being out on the road, seeing the people and seeing how far I can push myself. I don't believe in daily toil or the heartache of the road, but rather the chance to be good, do good and experience what is happening now as opposed to concentrating on the past or what can happen tomorrow.

If the GRIP program works, we will try to set it up at our sister cities where IJX, IJN and IJM are located, a truly global effort.

The weather has been hot and humid, but is supposed to break by Tuesday. She sounded good and I found myself telling Barbara to have her email me. I must be crazy. Our overhead is going to zoom and I am looking at additional staff. I am thinking this person might fit into that niche and also be an overall help in the office. I will check her resume tomorrow. Over the weekend, Lehman Brothers announced that they were going into Chapter 11 bankruptcy. Merril Lynch is being bought by Bank of America. The banking situation appears to have more fallout to come. I hope we are right about our expansion plans. Company reviews are almost done.

9/16/08 7:26 DST Home, NJ

Her name is irrelevant and she is a symbol of the times. A friend of one of my relatives came highly recommended as someone who would be an asset to my company. Our initial contacts were encour-

aging. She got right back to me and was even early for this morning's appointment. She sailed through the interview and when it came time to talk about money, I had told her it was an entry level position, but she had so much talent and energy I went higher than usual and offered her \$30,000 which included being my assistant and eventually moving toward the position of manager of marketing. I even told her I would review her salary in six month for a potential raise. She was happy, accepted and I introduced her to everyone. She mentioned that she had to verify the deal with her finance people since her last job paid \$50,000 a year in New York City. Of course, she had left that job because of boredom and was now on employment making a few hundred dollars a week, but her judgment was based on her last salary. As you can tell from my writing, she emailed me later that the salary cut from her last job, even though she was now on unemployment, was too great and she turned down the job. I wished her well. My new book is done and we have begun to distribute it. It will probably take over a month worldwide, but they are usually well worth the effort with new and continued sales.

In the finance world, AIG is teetering on disaster, but has not fallen yet. Lehman Brothers may have parts bought and the take over of Merril Lynch by Bank of America seems like a done deal.

I sent copies of my new book to the people renting the building I eventually want to buy in Millburn. I called the American guy there in charge and got the name of the two Korean heads. He knew exactly what I was doing, laying the groundwork for a future deal and he seemed to appreciate my efforts. I am happy to go to Korea when the time comes to negotiate directly, but if times get very tough, a deal might come a lot sooner than the four years I am planning.

We all had lunch together including Mike, Vinnie and Stuart who was now part of the time regarding responsibilities and time schedules. Everyone seemed ready to start launching the new IJ Industrial Design section next week both here and in Europe. Asia would follow next month.

All in all, it was an incredible day with both plans being approved. Ben emailed me his tonight so we are ready for both. It requires a massive marketing effort, the kind we love to take on.

Yesterday was spent trying to finish up everything before the trip started today and getting ready for the launch of our new Industrial Design Group worldwide. There is so much to be done. David and I are both out traveling this week. Jeroen will join me on Wednesday and Ben will follow up in China next month. Both Al and Mike prodded me yesterday to go after one of our former best customers with whom we ended on bad terms about two years ago. They screwed us and they think we screwed them. They have a lot of label and gasket business and we only get a little now so both Al and Mike said that we should let David go after them. I don't like going to anybody with my hat in my hands begging for more business so I was trying to think of a way to enter without overwhelming strength and I might have thought of the answer this afternoon. After having breakfast with Wendy this morning, I went biking with Uncle Dave. I was out on the porch with Bailey and it hit me. The target we are now after depends on Alcatel-Lucent for a lot of business. That business is based on their being named in the drawings at the design stage. Technically, we are in charge of a little or a lot of those drawings depending on how much more business we capture and hence is our new plan of attack. Either they start giving us a lot more business and we move into an uneasy partnership or I threaten retaliation by trying to remove them as suppliers for as much future work through the AL drawings as possible. Granted, it is underhanded, but I never liked the way they operated with us before so I have no problem in using an iron fist on them now. I am waiting for a response to the email I sent to my VP's and Ben for the proposed email to the Chairman and President of the company. If they ignore me, then I will set up a partnership with other metal companies to bring them on board in exchange for our getting the label and gasket work. I am not sure how fast we are going since the flight monitor went off, but we are somewhere over the Atlantic Ocean. Before taking off, I spoke with Al and David and got an email from Mike. They all agree with the email to the AL supplier so it will be sent tomorrow with a copy to his second in command. Whatever happens is okay: if they ignore me, I will attempt to take their business away and if they want to do more business with us, that will be fine also. I also have a headache and will try to go to sleep for a while.

9/19/08

12:46 PM DST 6:46 AM Paris Time

I messed up on my timing. By my calculations, we should be landing in fifteen minutes, but I don't think that is happening since the plane is mostly dark. I slept for a while, but I am up now. Harry Chapin, a man whose music I have listened to for decades and actually saw in concert when I was a teenager, is playing on my iPod. It is like he is an old friend and brings back pleasant memories. It is sad that he passed when he was so young. He was very big in helping people and starting a major foundation to help feed the hungry. He was a good man.

They will serve breakfast before we land, which presents me with a dilemma. Since it is actually the middle of the night back home, I would be breaking my diet by eating. I am not hungry, but still I could eat. I will play it by ear. Maybe I will just have some tea so I don't have to worry about brushing my teeth again. I will listen to Harry and go get some more tissues from the restroom because they are always good to have when traveling. I have been running my Spanish software, but it is hard to work when I can't hear what they are saying so I gave up.

We may hire Roman, a former Alcatel Lucent employee if we start the cable prototyping group that AL may want us to take over. We will

have to see and we have a meeting on the Monday when I get back. I think he is scared, but wants to try something new. I can't give him anything definite yet, but at least I will fly him out to New Jersey next week. He has a few months from his payout so he isn't desperate, but just has no life line to hold onto yet. He might be okay for us. I can't imagine how tough it is for all the people who got laid off from AL in the last few years. Seemingly, they had jobs for life and now they have to find new careers in their 40s and 50s in an economy where there are not a lot of jobs available. They are not prepared to handle this type of market and the need to move quickly or the opportunities are lost. For guys like my friend loe with a family depending on them, it must be a daunting time. Like always even when I seem alone, it is good to have my writing. Being able to have control in at least one area is fantastic. I can write whenever I like. Of course it will be edited later, but the fun part is the first draft where anything goes. It is good company and always gives me something productive to do. It also puts me into some unusual situations because I always need things to write about. It is a sort of perfect mix. I need an interesting life to write about and it is also fun. Lights are coming back on in the cabin; I think we are landing soon.

9/20/08 10:48 AM Paris Time 4:48 AM DST Charles De Gaulle Airport

We landed on time at about 8:00 AM this morning and the trek through passport control was swift and efficient. My bag came through the journey in tact and I was then off to find transportation to Charles De Gaul Airport. After asking for information, I was directed outside the terminal and was going to board a bus when I met a fellow American. Bob was from Nutley, NJ and worked for a perfume company. We were both told the next bus would be a while so we hopped in a cab and were at the airport in about forty minutes. I had thought about stopping by the Eiffel tower to walk around a little, but it was not on the way and I had my luggage to worry about so I decided it was best to get to where I needed to go. The ride over was pleasant and uneventful and after I left Bob. I went over to Terminal I, which is where I sit now. I have about two more hours before I can check in and have already had some of my food. I will probably need more Euros so I will go in search of an ATM and a men's room. I have also been editing the third section of my new book and hope to get it to Alex in the next few weeks. It will give him some spare cash and enable me to have the first nine months done so it will not take long to be ready for press when the year ends. My new Blackberry has no service and I am afraid that the international part may not have been turned on. When I get to Ireland, I will call home from the hotel and if I still have

no service, I will ask Wendy or Kayla to call Mike at home to see if he can do something. He is on his way to Chicago so I am not sure what can be done. Not having a phone or email is a big deal and I hope I do not have to deal with that problem for very long if it happens.

I am starting to lose it from lack of sleep. From past experience, the need to pass out will come in waves as sleep deprivation kicks.

9/20/08 8:27 PM Ireland Time 3:37 PM DST Clarion Hotel Cork

The windows for Aer Lingus eventually opened up and it turned out that both my suitcase and laptop were too heavy to go on the plane so not only could I not take my laptop bag, but I got fined over \$200 for the extra weight. Even worse, I did not have my laptop bag with all of my equipment and emergency supplies with me including my Blackberry, which I had put in there since I could not get it working. Talk about feeling naked. I had only the clothes with me, my jacket and my passport, cash and credit cards, which helped to neutralize most of the other problems. The nose bleed I had before came back and sprayed onto my shirt, which meant that if my luggage got lost, then I would have a heck of a story to tell the people I was going to see on my calls. Not having anything to read, I went to an airport bookstore, which of course was mostly in French, but finally I decided on Barack Obama's book. Perhaps I had been too hard on him and decided to read for myself. The most interesting thing was the number of people who commented on the book when they saw I was carrying it. Inside the gate area, I met a woman named Shirley, who was from China and we struck up a conversation because I asked her how she was doing in Mandarin. She works in sales for M/Com Corporation, one of our customers and we kept each other company until we eventually got to Cork and went our separate ways. The great news was that I did get my luggage and my Blackberry working. My cab driver was interesting and wanted to talk about politics. He was keeping close tabs on our Presidential race, which I found amazing. I gave him the Obama book when I left. I am afraid Mr. Obama's book had no positive effect on me. 9/22/08 5:43 PM Ireland Time 12:43 PM DST In flight to Amsterdam

I did indeed sleep well and after ten hours of sleep, woke up to a rare, gorgeous, blue sky in Cork. I took full advantage and after a workout in my hotel room, ventured forth to view some of the town of Cork. It is an old city, but has been largely rebuilt as I was told due to various war-related problems. Still, it had a very old town feel to it and with the leaves changing seemed like I was walking through a holiday card. I noticed that the woman there rarely wore sandals, probably because of the constant inclement weather. The rain however blanketed the whole area in green vegetation which was gorgeous. I liked looking into all the shop windows and the names were fascinating. I almost made the mistake of looking into a Bookmaking Shop thinking it was a printer who made books when, in fact, it was a betting parlor. I went back to the same supermarket as yesterday and got enough provisions for my next two meals. After a great walk, I returned to my room stopping off just long enough to buy four hard-boiled eggs to round off my supplies. I was downstairs by 12:30, but it seemed like much earlier in the day to me and I was met by my taxi driver. He was a wonderful man, full of positive vibes and good humor and we talked about our families and politics as he drove me to Flextronics. It was my one and only call for the day. It is amazing to me the amount of interest in our election that seems to be everywhere. Most people do not seem happy with Mr. Bush, as I wasn't and seem to be leaning toward Mr. Obama. I guess what happens in the US affects the world. Everyone believes they have a stake in the outcome.

Having only one stop for a particular area is dangerous as you have no fallback. If the person you are seeing is not there or anyone else or it doesn't go well, you can't offset with anything else locally so you hope for the best and push forward. The person I was seeing was in charge of labels for all of Europe and she had a lot of power. We talked for a while about our two companies. The good thing for both of us was that she had business I wanted and I was willing to do almost anything needed, including additional distribution centers if necessary. She was happy with our talk. It became evident that the possibilities were there for both of us and I was determined to make it happen. She wanted a European representative for our company, which would be easy since it would be Jeroen. We agreed that for now, the Netherlands would be fine to service all of Europe.

We ended with her agreeing that she would get us more information for becoming a preferred supplier. Although, I think our contracts were already in place and she would get me the contacts for gasket in Europe, something I very much wanted to pursue. She also said she would get us the appropriate contacts for her people in India when I

go with Indy in December. It was a good call and as my driver drove me back to the airport, I was very glad I had come. I left the driver with one of my CDs and a copy of my new book. He was happy with both and even happier with the generous tip. I like making people smile both with good cheer and good tips as long as they are pleasant and treat me well.

The time at the airport was spent well with fast service getting through security and then having the time to email and call the office. I also got a call from one of my ushers confirming that he was able to help with the Jewish High Holy Day service over the next few weeks. It almost meant, however, he did not get a job he had been after, which I felt badly about. I hope that I can make him feel better when I see him in a few weeks.

The email I sent regarding the extruding company and attacking for more business has raised a lot of discussion from my team and has divided them into two groups. One set wants to attack hard immediately and the other wants to be more cautious. I finally agreed to hold off sending the email for a day until Sue has a chance to make sure the attack would probably not backfire on us at AL. It is a major plus for us and I do not want to risk it without a very big reward potential. We should be landing within the hour and then it is on to Germany. I will check in at the office when I get there and will call home when I get to my hotel tonight or sooner if I get homesick.

I got an email before from one of the companies I am due to see tomorrow. The man said the person I was going to see was still sick and he figured I wasn't coming. I wrote back that I did not know he was sick. I was still coming and hoped at least I could see him and his associate. There was no way I was going to cancel at this point so I am going whether they will see me or not. It is all part of the road and the life of sales. Things change and things go right and wrong. I found out also this afternoon that I double-booked one of my rooms and it was too late to cancel. The money is lost and you just have to chalk it up to the expense of the trip, try to be as careful as possible and move on. The more tired I get, the more these kinds of things bother me so I have to remember to pass them off as part of the deal and move on. I hope that they happen more in the beginning than the end of the trip. I had tried to hire an assistant a few weeks ago to take care of things like this for me. I think it is time for me to stop thinking I can do these things better myself and hire someone competent to take over.

9/22/08

Approx. 9:30 PM Germany Time 5:30 PM DST In Flight to Germany

I am not exactly sure what time it is, my computer clock is apparently a little fast and I need to recalibrate it to my Blackberry.

The giant economic bailout by the US government to help stop the banking crisis appears to be a done deal and markets around the world are showing their displeasure by shooting downward again. If you watch the news or read the papers, they are now referring to the world banking crisis that threatens to move everywhere. Last time I checked home from Amsterdam, the Dow Jones Industrial Average was down over 200 points. Everyone is sounding like the world is coming to an end, which makes it an increasingly good time to expand. Yes I said expand and that is exactly what we are doing. The good news is we did not invest in the SGS system, which means the IIX has no debt and the debt level for IJUS is very low. Judging from the reaction of the person from Flextronics I saw today, our takeover of the Industrial Design Section of Alcatel-Lucent could give us substantial new clout and combined with our new gasket operation, more could be coming. In other words, we are risking a few hundred thousand dollars over the next year, including additional space we need for the chance of making millions and that is a gamble I am most willing to take. We will promote our expansion to the world, putting ourselves forward as the mavericks going against the grain and we are ready. We are going to be attacking a lot harder now. We have the ammunition, the talent and are ready.

More good news, I met a very nice 80 year old man from Holland on the plane ride from Cork to Amsterdam. He has been at sea and in various types of ship and boats most of his life and I am sure that he made a very good and wise captain. We spoke about religion and both hoped that people could take a more international view of the world with less emphasis on national origins and religions so we could all work together instead of tearing each other apart. He was a peaceful, kind man and I appreciate that short time we had together.

I was eating the rest of the sandwich I had made in Cork when I got on this plane and the flight attendant offered me some orange juice. I normally don't drink full-strength orange juice because it is too strong, but for some reason I did and it tasted great. Of course, I am also drinking a diet coke, which I also should not be doing so who knows what will happen later. I will eat dinner in my hotel room some-time tonight and it will either be a peanut butter and jelly sandwich or oatmeal. I am not sure which as of yet.

I have never been to the hotel I am staying at tonight. If it is pleasant out maybe I can take a walk. My first call is not until 11:00 AM tomorrow so I can get up and workout beforehand, which is a great way to start any day.

I miss Wendy and Kayla and will call them later. I also miss Bailey, the nights are getting colder and happening sooner so we will not have many chances left to take walks before winter sets in.

My partner Ben emailed me from China. He definitely wants to go

to Singapore for our trip next month, which will also include one stop in China and Malaysia. We may also need to go to a second stop in China to promote the new Alcatel-Lucent Industrial Design takeover there. Since I am also going to Taiwan, that should be all for that trip.

In a way, I feel a little guilty for not being home for a while. On the other hand, being on the road selling is the best place for me to be for everyone because they know we are in action and doing what is needed face to face. They will follow my lead, my plan and my dream, my contract with them is to give them every ounce of energy and commitment I have to be successful for me and for them. The responsibility is mine and I do not take it lightly.

9/22/08

10:25 AM German Time 4:25 AM DST In Transit to Kontron

Last night was amazing. I arrived at Munich Airport and my taxi was waiting. It was a rainy evening and the roads were wet, but my taxi driver seemed to ignore everything and as I watch the speedometer go to almost 100mph, I tried to stay calm by listening to music. Happily the driver liked it so while it played, I answered my emailed and called the office. It turned out that the former head of the AL Industrial Design Section called and after a few attempts, I got him on the cell. He wanted to get started with our two new people right away, which was music to my ears and also wanted to be part of a meeting next week for further expansion. What a great phone call to get at the end of my day. Also, I decided to abandon the onslaught on the extruding company for now. I did not want to risk the new business that was supposed to start this week. We got to the hotel and it seemed almost deserted, but my taxi driver's perseverance finally found the front entrance and I got to my room. I have never, ever been to a guieter place in my life. There was absolutely no noise and I was afraid to speak too loudly or play the TV with much volume. I checked in again at the office. Things were good and then I called home and spoke to my wonderful wife and daughter. I finally tried to go to sleep at about 1:00 PM, but it took a while to actually fall asleep. Suddenly at about 6:30, I got woken up by some loud clanging. There was a church nearby and it was sounding its bells. I was tired enough to fall back to sleep until shortly before seven when the bells sounded again. The good news was I was getting up anyway. Whenever I am in a new city, I like to walk around. The town of Bad Worishofen is small, charming, exceptionally clean and highly structured. The entire area seemed to ring out with a direct sense of order and I enjoyed my walk. The big problem in a new place is obviously getting lost so I usually try to pick landmarks to remember. Thanks to the training of my Dad during my early years of hunting and fishing where he always trained me to know

where the car was, I am usually in good shape. He got lost once in the Adirondack woods in New York State and never forgot it. His fear was passed down to me, which is good because it has probably kept me out of a lot of trouble.

I was off to breakfast. This hotel is also a health spa and the food was simple and fine for me. My taxi driver was due to pick me up at 10:15 and when we met, he said he spoke no English, when he introduced himself, he said his name was Santo and he was Italian. I probably had the only Italian Driver in the area and my Spanish was enough to converse.

9/23/08

Approx. 3:45 PM Italy Time 9:29AM DST In flight to Milan, Italy

I still don't have my computer clock working accurately yet so I will try again.

Santo dropped me off at Kontron and told me he would come back to get me. I told him I wanted him to stay and he was making motions I did not understand so we went inside the company and the very nice receptionists translated. I was to call after I finished and Santo's boss would pick me up and take the next leg of the journey. I was fine with this and said goodbye to Santo. The receptionist offered to call the next cab for me as soon as I was done with the meeting.

The original man I was supposed to see had taken ill, but I pushed and the man I thought I would see was not available, but the head of purchasing and another engineer were. We had made two types of shaped polycarbonate coverings for their circuit boards and they had a few comments and changes, which I offered to incorporate in one new set of samples. They were happy with that plus our policy of keeping extra inventory when needed. The buyer was also very happy to hear about our new gasket program so it was a successful call.

Once downstairs, I was picked up by Bernie, the owner of the company and off we went to the other side of Munich to Emerson. The call there also went well. This group had recently been sold to Emerson and we were involved with making a lot of their labels. Our new gasket operation was of interest and I hope to get some drawings this week so we can price them for future business.

I contacted Al and found out there was an earlier flight to Milan and we just had time to make it. Bernie is a good driver and accelerating to 180km so I could make the plane I am on now. A customer notified us that they still owed us about \$7500, which is not a gigantic amount, but still a pain. It also showed the fragility of the marketplace and I am hoping that they are the only customers we have that it happens to, but we are tightening up on watching the cash flow and the credit. What happens on a world and national front also happens on a

local one and the cash and credit crunches that occur for all of the big banks and institutions filters down to companies like ours. So far we have access to everything we need, but we have to keep an eye on our debt so we don't get into trouble. For now, our path seems right and we will pursue it vigorously. It is good I am out on the road right now. For the rest of the day my goal is to get more money. All these taxis have been expensive and I still need to get to my hotel in Vimercate. It would be great to get another walk in wherever the hotel is located and a good Italian Dinner that Wendy urged me to have. So far, Jeroen has been unable to get us sales calls for Thursday afternoon, but I will try later to get us into places in The Netherlands or Belgium. I don't want to waste the time I have here. The high point of my meal was sitting on the little balcony during the sunset eating the oatmeal I brought from home with various types of fruit while watching "Other People's Money", one of my favorite movies. It was wonderful. The rest of the evening was spent replying to emails and getting ready to go to sleep. Tomorrow will probably be a late night in Amsterdam so I hope I get some sleep tonight.

I got up this morning to a beautiful day in Italy, exercised in my room and went out for a great walk. While doing so, I also answered my email. Ben and I are now planning our trip. Both of us will continue emailing people to get appointments. I had seven hard boiled eggs, one piece of bread, some watermelon and water for breakfast, which was all very good. My excellent taxi driver from yesterday was waiting for me out front and off we zoomed to Alcatel-Lucent. The meeting there was extremely interesting with four different engineers. We discussed the way the colors are printed from the way most of the Alcatel-Lucent products are manufactured so they will look the same

no matter what colored surface they are adhered to. They have a large responsibility worldwide and can help bring a lot of business to us so I want them to be satisfied in every area. For now, we will submit new ink samples and send gasket information. They are supposed to be setting up a new piece of business for Eric. All in all, it was a very good call and then it was off to Milan and the airport, more paperwork, getting some food and here I sit waiting to get to Amsterdam. Getting seven hours of sleep last night is holding off my fatigue, but I am still tired and will probably be out late tonight with Jeroen and Daniella. If that is the case and we don't have to go to Belgium tomorrow, I may sleep late since we will spend the whole day together in The Netherlands.

9/24/08 10:20 PM Netherlands Time 4:29 PM DST Hotel Lapershoek

The president is speaking tonight about the crisis in the economy. I will hopefully be asleep. The world economy has been sacked by the practice of granting bad loans and now the same institutions want bailouts so they don't go out of business. I am not sure how I feel about this since no one would bail my company out. They took a chance on shoddy practices and got caught. They should be allowed to fail; however, if it brings the economy to a close, then that causes a whole new host of problems. A bailout by Congress will increase inflation and decrease our currencies against the rest of the world. Everyone is certain that things are going to be horrible, but we will continue to expand.

My plane was early into the Netherlands and Jeroen picked me up. It was good to see him and we discussed what was going on including his increased role in IJN and how the new ID system would work. Tomorrow we have the meeting with Jan-Willem to go over his roll, Lencon's, Jeroen's and the rest of IJ. It is likely to be a stormy meeting.

Then we had dinner with Daniela, a former member of the Lucent ID group. She may want to do some contract ID work for us if it comes in, so it was good to have her on board. My hotel is fine, the area is pretty and Jeroen will pick me up tomorrow at 8:30 AM.

9/25/08

6:46 Netherlands Time 12:46 PM DST Hotel Lapershoek

I got up at 5:30 AM. It was not easy, but I exercised in the room and then walked around the nearby little park and watch the sun come up. It was beautiful. I got back to the room and ate breakfast that I had brought and got ready. I met Jeroen in the parking lot and off we went to meet with Jan-Willem. We spoke about the possibilities of what could happen with the conversations. I always want to come out

of every deal with everyone getting most of what they want and happy with the prospect of a lot of future dealings. I was a little worried here because both Jeroen's and Jan-Willem's' roles had been changing drastically over the past six months, especially because of Jan-Willem's divorce proceedings. I was hoping we could all agree about their individual and dual roles with their company Lencon and Ideal Jacobs. Since we had gotten the deal to take over the AL ID section, it meant that we could be colliding head on with Lencon because part of their business was also in design and also with AL. The good news is that I genuinely like Jan-Willem and want things to work out so I started the meeting with the situation of ID. I suggested that since they already had customers in the Netherlands and Belgium including AL that they should keep their customers within Lencon. They would supply us with a list of current customers and they would be exempt from any sales efforts from IJN. Both Jan-Willem and Jeroen, however, would still try to sell them our other products, which would come through IJN. As soon as we agreed on that, the atmosphere of the room immediately lightened and we worked out how much effort would be spent to help IJN finished easily and quickly. The whole discussion took under an hour and since we had scheduled the whole morning and had no calls planned for the afternoon, I made a quick suggestion that we should all go sailing. This was a great surprise to them because I am known for working as hard and diligently as possible especially when I am traveling, but I thought some time together might be good for all of us and they heartily agreed. The sailing idea morphed into having lunch on a tour boat going through the canals of Amsterdam and we left. Mariska, the IIN secretary also joined us. Driving through Amsterdam is always an adventure.

The boat was long filled with a lot of tourists, and off we went. Mariska had arranged bag lunches for us and I felt like I was back in school as we all started trading food. It was a blast. Amsterdam is a beautiful city filled with many old buildings and rich history. We had a great time and seeing it by boat created memories I will never forget. It is something I would never do on my own and am glad we did it.

Jeroen made a call once we were back on shore and it turned out we had an appointment at 5:00 with a small manufacturer so we went back to my hotel. We could have something to drink and go over my notes to give him contacts from the last couple of days. Since he was now our primary representative for all of Europe, it was important that he know exactly what was expected of him and how soon he needed to contact our customers and to follow up on items. He is learning quickly and judging by the glint in his eyes, he is ready to start selling in earnest.

We went to see a former AL employee who had the guts to go off and start his own company. He was a specialist in head measuring and

had utilized that knowledge to create a business centered on thermal related products. His company is only three years old and he has done very well. Before we went in, I asked Jeroen what we planned to do for the call. He said to sell labels and gaskets, but the man's company was too small to really be of use right now. However, he was an entrepreneur and a successful one and judging by the financial problems in the world, he was probably having a credit problem, which means his release of new products would be hampered. I did not want to sell him labels and gaskets but rather partner with him on new products that would put us into new areas. Jeroen said he understood and said again we were in a whole new ball game. We are not just selling labels and gaskets; we are a global company capable of partnering with anyone to build virtually anything. Our position was strong, and that was how he should go into meetings. Jeroen looked at me with a "light bulb moment" expression and I knew I had gotten my point across.

We went to see AC and the first thing that happened was that he remembered me from about seven years ago and then I remembered him. It was an excellent start and after I congratulated him on his success, I gave him an autographed book for his birthday. We got to talking about his business and if we could help or partner. It turned out that he was highly involved with LED's and also thermal related problems. I got an idea of a new lighting invention with his technology and ours. He liked the potential application and agreed to explore the information we would send; perhaps it had potential for the future. We spoke about some other things including a new type of light. Right before we left, he began talking about his sales people and mentioned that he only had one non-performing salesman in the US. I offered to have our VP of sales review his Website and if he thought it applicable, we might like to try to market his product in the US. We would only be on commission as I don't like getting paid for anything before we perform and he liked the idea. After being there an hour, we left happy with the way it had turned out. I reiterated again to Jeroen that we were not just salesmen trying to sell labels and gaskets and hoping for the best. We had to find out what our prospects wanted what mattered to them before we went in. Sometimes you had to go with your gut instincts and then appeal to their need to succeed either with their business, keeping their job or getting a better one.

Jeroen dropped me off at the hotel where I had dinner and some potentially bad news about a gasket order being cancelled, but nothing was definite so I tried to enjoy the evening. There was also going to be a lot of trouble to match the new AL ink, but I figured as much. We had to do it anyway so the amount of grief did not matter.

Unfortunately, I had dinner in a European restaurant and they were not ready for an American who was tired and in a rush, but we all got through it. My plans were to take a walk, make my phone calls to the

office, call home and get some sleep. Tomorrow is a big day and I am getting up early.

9/26/08

9:36 AM Germany Time 3:37 AM DST In Flight to Nuremberg

Last night passed quickly and quietly with some more exercise, calling the office, emailing and speaking with David. His selling swing in Massachusetts is going well and the high interest in our new ID section and gaskets is extremely exciting. Apparently a bailout plan has been worked out which will effectively help to partially nationalize many of the largest financial institutions in the US. The government will buy up a lot of their bad assets in return for options of a partial ownership. Meanwhile other indicators like housing starts and higher unemployment are doing nothing to lighten the mood. However, we will continue on our path and possibly accelerate it because as this gets worse and more people get laid off, more services will have to be outsourced. We should have our pick of the best people to staff our new areas and we have no long-term commitments to them so if they do not produce, they will not stay. I believe there can be a depression mentality, a general depression that can invade an entire economic area. It is a time like these when small companies with forward-thinking people can expand greatly to big success or perish. I want the former and am terrified of the latter, which is keeping me grounded in terms of the risks we will absorb.

I got up this morning, worked out, had breakfast and Jeroen was early picking me up. The trip to the airport was fast and we even had time for him to get a cappuccino before getting onto the plane. We are scheduled for an 11:00 AM meeting at AL in Nuremberg where we will announce the new AL acquisition and also see if they want to move any of their people or services to us. We can help with the people, their problems and getting their work done all in exchange for their business and it works well for me. Jeroen has just finished his second cappuccino, which means I have absolutely no worries he will fall asleep on the long drive towards Stuttgart after our meeting. My job is to make sure he has enough, food and water so he can concentrate on the road. There are no speed limits, but if he goes faster than 180km an hour, I will be very nervous. I know speed is relative, but I do have my limits. As always, I am very happy that someone else is driving.

9/26/08

5:29 PM Germany Time 11:29 AM DST Stuttgart Airport

We made it to the meeting with Alcatel-Lucent on time and met with four of their engineers. There were issues about the possible revision of some of the company's corporate colors as well as artwork standards and documentation. We also went over our takeover of the AL ID section, gaskets, our new laser and panels. It was a lot to get through in less than an hour, but we had to leave. I apologized as we left and off we went to our second call. Unfortunately, the buyer we were going to see got sick that day and could not come in. Since that was our last call of this trip, we took it a little easier and had lunch along the way to the airport. It gave Jeroen and I a chance to talk some more and by the time we left each other, I think we were both on the same page. I feel confident that he will try his best to do what is needed. The key change is that now he can sell what he knows, which is design. Profitable volume is our goal, with new product lines and new customers. I think he is on his way. I look forward to our next adventure together.

We should board for Paris soon. Jeroen and I had some great salads before so I do not have to worry about dinner.

9/27/08 12:11 PM French Time 6:11 AM DST Orly Airport Paris

We landed and I was immediately emailing and calling the office. Things there are going well and I found a cab guickly to get me to my hotel. I was not staying at my normal place because it was full, but the Best Western people said the Trocadero Hotel was right around the corner from the Eiffel Tower and they were right. In fact, right after I checked in and walked out the door, I knew where I was from previous adventures and went straight to that amazing sight. The Eiffel Tower is majestic by day, but at night it is positively dazzling. It was bathed in a blue glow with golden stars. I walked amongst the hundreds of people on a beautiful, mild, fall night surrounded by people from all over the world. I felt at peace. It had been a very good trip and I was starting to decompress from the excitement, good times, traveling, tension, and stress. I was still fighting the effects of sleep deprivation. I got back to my room, checked in with Alice, and called Wendy. She said she missed me as I missed her and I can't wait to get home and hug her. I have been on the road enough and have about three weeks before I go again. In retrospect, it is obvious that our marketing position is changing. More and more I can see we have one niche market and that is guickly becoming non-product sensitive. In other words, we are spreading our product lines past our gold area of labels to gaskets, to laser products to Industrial Design. The products change, but the market niche is the same. Rush, difficult shorter-run projects are difficult to get from anyone else and are willing to pay more for the beginning parts. Our role is to help them launch their products, keep the business that is suitable for us and help pass on those that aren't. This niche is much less of a threat to almost all other suppliers who

want long runs so we can be much more of an active partner with our customers and a liaison to these other suppliers. In times like these, we are needed more than ever. With people being fired and downsizing of sections. Our customers need outside help from people who want the stress, pressure and have the good nature to handle the problems of product launches. We are ready to help because it is our strength and we will push it as hard as possible.

With that in mind, I have been toying with the idea of changing our corporate name to Ideal Jacobs International. I am not sure if it is a good idea, but I will muse on it for a few days and maybe verify it with my VPs and partner Ben.

Washington Mutual Bank went out of business yesterday and was taken over by another company. There seem to be more lined up to follow so there is going to be a lot of economic chaos for a while. I checked one of my financial brokers and he said that my assets in his area were okay. After I lost a lot of money on Lucent stock about five years ago, I decided that I risk enough financially with going to China and beyond so all of my actual investments would need to be as safe and secure as possible. I was not concerned with a large return. I am hoping that philosophy has paid off.

People seem confident that the economic bailout will happen Monday. If so, we are on the road to nationalizing our economy, which will cause great problems later. Mr. Obama and Mr. McCain debated last night, but I have not heard how it went. It doesn't matter what the analysts and experts say. The people they are targeting are their core constituency. They are speaking to specific groups and don't care if the media likes it or not. The news people are often a very small group with a selective viewpoint that the rest of the country does not share. They do not represent what the "regular" people think, which is why they are continually astounded as to who people support and select.

In Flight-We passed the Celtic Sea of Ireland going into the Atlantic Ocean. I love that name The Celtic Sea. It sounds so peaceful and symbolizes the green fields of Ireland. I just finished going through the weekend version of the Financial Times, my favorite newspaper. I have never seen such crummy financial news in my life.

I have written the emails needed for the group in Nuremberg and Italy. They will have to be finalized and emailed to Ben and my VPs about the new Bridge idea. I am tired and will watch some TV or mov-

ies and maybe take a nap. I think I am done working for a while. If all goes well, I should be home before 6:00 PM tonight and I am looking forward to it.

9/29/08 11:52 PM DST Home, NJ

The House and Senate have not come up with a bailout plan yet. The Stock market dropped over 700 points today. I can only imagine what will ensure in Asia and Europe tonight and tomorrow. There are dire predictions of what can happen such as increased unemployment, more housing defaults, and drying up of credit. The question is how bad will it be.

Meanwhile we are still on course to expand and the crazier it sounds, the more determined I am to go forward.

This morning Roman came in. We had flown him in on Friday for his brother's wedding, but for us more importantly for the 1:30 meeting with Vinny, Sue, Me, Roman, Manny and Pater. It turns out there was another man there, Walt who had been reading my books. As we got to talking, it seemed that they wanted us to expand our plan to more types of design, prototyping, interacting with their suppliers and anything else involved with helping them get their products ready to be massed produced. The last quarter of the year begins.

Today we worked on expanding the scope of the work we can do for AL regarding design, prototyping, price reductions and in other areas. The idea of the Ideal Jacobs Bridge is coming along well and we will need to determine over the next few days how broad we need to go in order to encompass as many areas as possible. I spoke with Roman today and we agreed that he would come on board full time as soon as we receive our first order. This is the path I wanted. The people at AL and at other companies will see what we are doing and call on us to pick up the slack when they have work they need done and personnel they have to layoff. This will mean a large increase in overhead, but the work these companies will bring in should be profitable and there is the chance of more business if they choose to specify us. I really like this model and as per Tuesday's VP discussion, we will hold off on starting IJ International and will instead market it through IJUS. I have alerted Ben and Jeroen of our plan and I think it will work very well worldwide.

I have not heard anything about Congress and the Senate passing the Bailout package. I am not sure what difference it will make if it is accepted.

I am starting to catch up after Europe and Rosh Hashanah. We are working on a large contract for AL North America. I thought it was being setup for an online auction and I was making preparations for the loss of all of that business. Although we are the best supplier, we are not the cheapest. But it doesn't look like that will happen, so we will give them substantial price reductions and plan to stay in for awhile.

I just got word from AI that we got our first PO for Alex to make pro-

totypes and our new section and area of business has been launched. I am excited to see how far it can go.

10/3/08 9:21 PM DST Home, NJ

The economic stimulus plan was approved by the Congress today and the president is expected to approve it this weekend. It will cost the government 700 billion dollars and nobody knows if it will do any good. What I do know is that things will be changing and this is the best time to try to capitalize. We have our first chance to gain some new cable making business. We received a drawing and we have been asked to price it. I am not sure how I will go about doing that, but the first thing is to make sure we have the equipment to make it, the components and then we can test it. I got the names of the three large AL suppliers for cables and I emailed them all today. If my plan works, they will supply us with their components so we can stock them at no cost and then it will simply cost our own labor to make them. We can then make sure the three suppliers get the main men for the cable, in which we are not interested. I have been told it is not that hard, but we will see. In the meantime, Roman's plan for costs reductions are in and we need to see if they will generate a work PO to cover his time. The plan is in motion for us to get into this area, then to expand and eventually be working in products where we can substitute our ideas and our components as cost savings.

I have been working on the trip to Asia and have five potential stops to make in Taiwan. Unfortunately, I have no idea where anything is and need a map to be able to even try to see them all in one day. I am hoping that David's software can help with the process on Monday, but if not I know a guy at an ice cream store from Taiwan who might be able to help.

Sales have held up as well and we are a little ahead of last year which, considering the economy is amazing. Profits are down because of the massive selling effort, but the potential is good so I am not that worried. Tomorrow, I plan to start signing books in earnest so they can be shipped. They are normally well received and promote a buzz in the marketplace to help stimulate activity and business.

Wendy is in St. Louis visiting Alex until Sunday. Kayla will be taking the SAT one more time tomorrow. She has already sent in her application to Cornell University and I hope she gets accepted.

I saw my acupuncturist, Steve, today. My stomach has been in rebellion; the stress levels are high because of the economy and our sales push. I am trying to help things with changes in my diet. I like him. He is a good, caring man and I am glad he is on my team. I do not anticipate a reduction in the tension for a while.

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We have been looking to expand space, but the people in our building have not been cooperating. We have moved some materials into storage, but if we don't find somewhere soon, we will have to make arrangements to get more space somewhere else. Perhaps it is time to try to get some space from the building in Millburn that I hope one day to own.

I miss Wendy.

The price of oil is below \$95.00/barrel. That, combined with the difficult economy, I fear means that the push for renewable fuels will be, at best, stalled and at worst, mostly destroyed. I am hopeful the tax benefits for renewable fuels and construction will be enacted soon.

Minyan is done. I saw some of the people from the group last week at services and they asked me if I was coming back. I found myself saying no, therefore the decision has been made. It is strange how easy it was to say that I was finished. It has been more than twenty years of doing this and now it is over. Time to move on. I had a talk with my dad at the New Year's dinner he and mom my hosted on the Tuesday after services. We were discussing the book of the Talmud, a code of Jewish laws that I was reading and how unhappy I was with the way the rules were presented. They seemed to be devoid of morality and my dad said it was a code of "laws" and morality should not enter into it. I countered that the U.S. Constitution and Declaration of Independence were documents of a codified belief of how a country should run and the morality behind the principles of equality and freedom. I said that if the code does not contain morality than it may not be the best convention. Why was it was common that the most orthodox members of our religion seemed to be the least ethical when dealing in business? My dad said their morality only came into play when they dealt with themselves. That did not sit well with me. When orthodoxy invokes the right of moral selectivity and gives permission to treat as others non-equals, then I no longer wanted it. My dad then asked me why I remained a Jew, and I said that I was born one, but if given a chance who would want to be born Jewish anyway. We are described as stiff necked people in the Bible, difficult, unbending, and unwilling to change. My dad agreed, but argued that we have lasted 5000 years this way. I wondered if longevity and survival in the face of ill treatment was the sole test of validity. Are we measured as human beings by the amount of prejudice we can endure? What is the value in any religion that claims that only its followers, and no others, are right in the way they talk to God? Why are we all so fundamentally programmed that we are willing to die for a religious concept that cannot be proven?

Why do we insist on perpetuating this concept upon our children? Why are we on this path of fragmentation that does not pave any way to tolerance or the better ability to live together?

Zealots, the ultra orthodox, and fundamentalists of all religions do nothing but push us apart. Religious documents, even if created to promote peace and harmony ultimately support division, violence, hatred and the approval to act as you please as long as it is against someone outside of the tribe. Is God a Jew? I have always been taught that we are "the Chosen" people, that God chose us to promote his laws and a better life through peace, brotherhood and harmony. Have we ever done that as a religion? Have we ever done anything except try to stay to ourselves and be left alone to live and prosper? Have we done anything to deserve the term "Chosen?" Maybe it is egotism that leads us to believe we are the best because we have survived so much hardship? The hardship has made us strong, but the stronger we are the more hated we become. Again, what is the benefit to the world that being the Chosen people would have provided? I do not pretend to say that I am perfect by any means and have as many foibles and have done as many bad things as everyone else. I do not understand how we got into this position and I am not sure why we stay here. Is God a Jew? I have no idea. Am I a Jew? Since I was born one, I suppose I am, but do I believe it is best? I am having my doubts. I do believe the path to God is an individual journey and for me that does not work with the Minyan Group or the Temple as a whole. I do not know where I am going with this for now.

My dad asked me why I should remain a Jew and for the moment I am not sure. Certainly, the ties that bind us together between our religion and our culture and ancestry are strong, but is that enough? I need to think about this a lot more, and as Rabbi Cohen would say, that is a good thing. I am glad I have him around. If he told me thinking about this was the road to a fiery hell, this would be a lot more difficult. Am I a Jew? Yes, but I am not sure why and that is something I need to know.

I got a call this morning from my dad. My mom had a minor heart attack last night and he and my sister were in the hospital with her most of the night. He said she was going in for a minor procedure which should take care of things. There was nothing for me to do at that moment so I went riding, returned home, had lunch and went over to the hospital. It is tough watching your parents get older but it is really hard to see them sick and in pain. I stayed with my mom for awhile after sending everyone else home and as I sat and edited this

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book she went in and out of sleep. She was not in pain, but she looked very frail and sad and it broke my heart to watch her. I thought back to all the times she took care of me when I was a little boy and how things seemed to have shifted. It was very peaceful and since she was not in pain and happy, it was actually pleasant to sit with her.

After awhile, I went out to find a bathroom. Outside I saw my brother and we both came back in. I stayed for a little while longer and then left for the office. I had a 3:00 meeting there with one of my ushers. He had been having trouble finding work for a while and seemed to be in a bad mental state. He had hoped I could coach him for something better. After looking at his resume I asked him what he wanted. Happily, I had asked him the same question a few days ago and he had taken the time to write everything out. We spoke about his family and his past jobs. He was a photographer and had left a job he had liked to care for his two parents, who had Alzheimer's disease, until they passed.

Something clicked inside my head and I got an idea. I asked him if he had ever heard of a professional covering a funeral, as is sometimes done with weddings. He said he had heard about people video taping funerals but not much more. We spoke for a while and came up with the idea of creating a tribute to a deceased person with a CD or DVD. The recording would cover the person's life, testimonials from his friends and would be set up so that the final product would be a lasting memorial and they could be remembered as their children wished. He could not only interview the loved ones of the deceased, but also be involved with other facets such as writing the family history and helping with the eulogies. We will interview the people closest to them and along with your photographs, audio and visual records will create a record so you may always have a celebration of their life close at hand. We can record the eulogies at the actual ceremony, interview people before and after the event, and even help create a memorial that will forever honor your favorite person

Dad is showing some signs of the stress, strain and lack of sleep so I hope he can get some rest. Ira and Irene will both be there with him at 6:00 PM tonight, and I will be at the airport picking up Wendy, who is flying back from St. Louis. It will be good to have her home. It was fun being out with Kay this afternoon; after the hospital we ran some errands. She is a lot of fun to be around and I love her company. I showed her the building I want to rent or buy someday and she liked it. I have a feeling something may happen with it soon. I will stay open to the possibilities. We have worked out some of the space problems in Maplewood, but they are only temporary solutions and we have to find more room soon. Bringing on more overhead both in personnel and space is a scary thought with the economy the way it is, but I do not see a choice if we are going to go after the new business that is out there.

The thought of not having my mother around is extremely upset-

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ting, say nothing of what it would do to my dad.

I have the feeling this will not be the last panic attack during this next segment of our expansion, but I have been through it before. Stuart wants to set up sales calls for David and him in Europe and in the U.S. in November. David is excited, as am I. I am ready to be back at work.

Mom had another scare today, but it turned out to just be neck pain from a muscle spasm. Otherwise, she is improving and will hopefully go home towards the end of the week. The stock market continues to go down, and people are not enthralled with the bailout. Around the world, most markets are sinking. I think an idea I had would have been better: to use the money to create a million jobs to rebuild our bridges and infrastructure. I believe this is something everyone could be behind, but alas I don't think that will happen. We have been very fortunate with business and I hope this trend continues.

A potentially great thing happened today. I emailed the AL groups in Europe and the U.S. and both groups agreed, at least on a partial basis, to allow us to set up taking existing products, reduce their cost, have samples made, either by us or someone else. It could be a boom for us if we can find the right products. Ben and I are arranging the trip for Asia, and there is a lot to prepare.

10/9/08 12:13 AM DST Home, NJ

We submitted both the contract for the cable reduction program and our first shot at a piece of business for cable samples to Alcatel Lucent. I am supposed to follow up on Friday. Both Roman and Eric put a large amount of work into cable samples and Roman had already researched the cable reduction program, so I am hopeful that we can get some or all of them. If we are successful, it will launch us into this new area, which would be wonderful. We are now selling the new Industrial Design area, as well as prototyping and redesigning existing products to be more cost efficient. Since we now have permission from AL in Europe and the U.S. to do this, and they have agreed to help confirm the new samples, this gives us an open pathway in both areas, plus Asia. David is making his next sales trip to California next week, and will take another trip to Europe with Stuart in early November. Ben and I are working on our trip to Asia next week and I am excited about the prospect of sealing the gasket cutting operations with our new partner in China, and going to Taiwan for the first time. We will also make stops in Malaysia and Hong Kong.

The Jewish holy day of Yom Kippur started tonight, so I was in Temple and my ushers did well. Barry was there and we spoke about the tribute recording idea. I am not sure if anything will happen with it, but the overall plan is starting to come together.

On my way to the office, the engine light went on in my Lexus which was very annoying since I have been having some trouble with her for the past few months. The Asian and European Markets fell sharply again last night. The Dow started way down today and had its first 1000 point swing, but ended up about 128 points down. The markets will eventually stabilize, but we will just have to wait it out. In the meantime, we attack and so far it has been going well. The people in the cable area of AL want to deal with Roman and no one else, which means both Sue and I are on the sidelines for now. Neither of us cares as long as we get the business. I prepped Roman about what to say and, after the meeting they had this morning, it became evident that he is a very able student. It looks like they may go with us for the cable prototypes and maybe the cable reduction program. Coming from a large company, he asked for a proposal. Coming from a small company, I am used to dealing from my word and a handshake, but I agreed and sent him an email of what we were offering. He tried to negotiate for more vacation time (something we don't give a lot of) and a few other things, but I was meeting his basic salary and medical demands. I reminded him that a week ago he was laid off with few job prospects and then

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he asked if I would send him a formal proposal. At that I laughed and told him my word was good enough. He agreed and he got an IJ email address this afternoon. Being from a big company has it positives and negatives: the advantages are his amazing contacts and the chance to expand business, but the drawback is that he has some big company procedures in his head which have to be changed. We work quickly in all areas and I expect and demand all of our people to do the same. Roman's job is to help get business and then expand it. I want him dealing with customers and will provide him with a team to help him as he brings the work in. We can hire more people as needed, which will include some from AL doing the same work as before. It is a good situation. I want to template in other companies who are laying people off.

Alex called and we are trying to work out his plane fare to Europe. Since he will be coming back in May, which is prime vacation time, the fares are high so I am searching for some good deals. I booked part of Kayla and Wendy's trip to Europe to see Alex. Ben went to the dentist for the first time in a few years and needs a lot of work done. It has been an expensive week.

We hired a doctor to come in to give flu and pneumonia vaccinations. She and her assistant seemed competent and I received both shots. I seem to be having a reaction now and my stomach is not great. I hope I can get to sleep soon.

People seem to be slowing down in paying their bills, so we will have to be vigilant in going after late payment. Money will only get tighter and we have to be careful, especially with our increased overhead from our three new employees. They are not cheap, but they are worth the cost and are the key to moving into some new areas.

Wendy is going to the Berkshires with a friend from Sunday until Tuesday, and I need to sign a bunch of my books Sunday night to get them out. I find it amazing that I am leaving in a week for Asia. Ben and I are still firming up the appointments. The days of having a trip totally settled weeks in advance are gone. I have to stay flexible for this new world that is approaching.

10/11/08 4:30 PM DST Home, NI

Today was Green Day in Maplewood and one could not imagine a better day for good weather. It was clear, cool, the trees were beginning to change color and it was absolutely gorgeous. I got up at 6:00 and worked out indoors. I was afraid to try biking outside because of the reaction from the Flu and Pneumonia shots from yesterday. My stomach was a little queasy but there was no problem working out. I went downstairs and found out that the television shows I had planned

to watch were not accessible and after going through the dial, I found a movie called Gabriel Over the White House. I had last seen it about 35 years ago in one of my college courses. It was about a corrupt politician who became president at the time of an economic meltdown – something like we are seeing today. He had a "born again" experience by being visited by the angel Gabriel who guided him in a complete turnaround of his politics and viewpoint. He became a man of the people and eventually persuaded international disarmament after helping to put millions of unemployed people back to work in a public works program. He died as the agreement was being signed and the movie ended. Our professor back in school said that Franklin Roosevelt watched this movie before he started the New Deal, and suggested that it may have influenced him.

After breakfast it was off to the office where David and Rich were waiting for me. We loaded my car and went to the nearby field where the event would be held. Setup took little time (happily David is good with tents) and we were ready to go at 11:00 AM. As the day wore on, 2Gor, Al, Dave and Butch joined us. My mom looks very good and is showing no effects from her mild heart attack. My dad seemed much calmer and it was a nice visit. Afterwards, I went behind their apartment building to a pond. It has high rock cliffs to one side and it is a beautiful, peaceful setting. There are lots of fish in the water and I like to watch them. I think I would like to live there with Wendy when we are older and decide to move out of our house. I think it would be a good place for us. Although I never plan to retire – unless I cannot function well – I know I will have to slow down someday, and it would be nice to be in an area with a lot of things to do nearby. Most of the media seem to understand what is happening with the economy and the election, and their views all make perfect sense in a totally rational world, which of course, we do not live in. We will keep on our path, which means putting Roman on the payroll tomorrow. He will not be a cheap addition to our team, but it's a chance that I feel is warranted, so we will move forward. Vinnie and I are going to Asia this weekend. I'm looking forward to selling our new areas there and I am hopeful that there will be fertile ground for a lot of new profitable business. We are following my dream, which means that there are no excuses. I am in command and responsible and I would not want it any other way. I would rather rely on myself and my team than answer to someone else. I feel the pressure, but it will only make me work harder.

Wendy is away until tomorrow. Last night, Kayla asked me to call her to make sure she was up in the morning. I apologize to the woman whom I mistakenly called twice at 6:30 AM; I felt badly about it. Fortunately, Kayla was up before I called.

I played tennis this morning. It was a tough match. I lost, as usual.

I have gotten a lot of paperwork done and we are moving towards getting our first set of prototype orders from AL. It is Roman's first day as an Ideal Jacobs Team member and we started making his business cards. I wish him the best for all of us.

I went to see my dentist, Dr. Brown, regarding the tenderness in part of my mouth. He is a wonderful, caring, thoughtful dentist and I feel at home in his office. He is a biker and a hockey player, and it is always fun chatting with him about our various sports activities. I mentioned that I was seeing an acupuncturist and he was interested.

The stock market bounced back today and rose about 1000 points, a record for one day. No one knows if the worst is over, but we are moving ahead on schedule.

Two men from Tyco came in to discuss the cable prototyping operation. They were concerned that if we did the prototypes, not only would we want to make the longer runs but also stop them from becoming an approved supplier. We have no intention of going into that market and, on the contrary, wanted to partner with them to make rapid prototypes for their other customers and pave the way for other types of business that was the last thing on my mind. We were transparent in our intentions, our plans for working together and our hopes for mutual benefit, so I think they were convinced that we are on their side. The meeting ended well with an agreement on mutual sharing of information and cooperation. Roman began sharing documents with them, and they already knew each other from when he was an AL employee. I have not heard from the other two suppliers, but apparently Amphenol did try to find Roman so I had him contact the man directly. Tyco, however, called us first, came in to see us, and was open. I am pretty definite we will have to see what is there, and having her along will bring me a lot of peace of mind. I look forward to the day when she works for us full time. I think she will be a great addition and we have enough business to support her.

The Dow dropped a lot today and, combined with yesterday, wiped out most of the gains from the last lunge upward. I have bad feelings about what can happen, but we are moving forward. I booked my flight to India today and will book Indy's soon. India has vast potential, and Ben had decided that he wants IJUS to take the market. I am finalizing the stops in Asia for next week. As usual, good stuff came out of just trying to get appointments. I am going to see Emerson in Arizona in early November to go after their global business in labels. We are being considered because we are global – a very nice thing. I checked out the late payment situation and was not entirely satisfied, but Mike and Anna are working on it. One customer was put on hold for shipments, and another one may be on the way. So far, the one customer with big trouble may be coming out of it. We have been very fortunate so far, but have to be very careful. I am looking forward to the plane ride to Hong Kong; Vinnie is easy to travel with. I booked a flight for David to Europe and messed it up. We are interviewing a potential employee on the Monday that I get back. One of her jobs would be to research and book all flights. It is time for all of us to stop doing it ourselves and let one person do it better. It is another task I will be happy to give up. My stomach is in motion. I am worried and energized all at the same time. Steven, my acupuncturist, is trying to help me stay calm. He tells me that I must keep breathing deeply to move my inner energy forces throughout my body. I am having fun.

I was massacred in tennis today. I played well, but my opponent was almost flawless. I got to the parking lot and my car was dead again. I called up Wendy and asked if she could pick me up. Still infuriated, I called up the dealer. I got my car salesman on the phone and told him I wanted to get a new car before my lease was up and the only way I was going to buy this one for David was if the future warranty and the prices were amazing. Not a lot of cars are being sold right now, so I consider my position a strong one. I got to the office and the day did not start off well there either, but as it continued things got better. My car was fixed and returned; it had a dead battery. I hope that was the only problem. David did well in California and we were working on the cable assembly orders that were supposed to be coming in. We had originally planned to sub-contract the first order and build an assembly operation here in New Jersey. Due to the incredibly intricate and exact nature of the testing, that idea will probably not work, so tomorrow we plan to order the tooling and equipment necessary to begin operations here the Monday Vinnie and I return. I started packing for Asia and the ritual has begun. My check list will come out tomorrow and the food prep will be done by Saturday morning. I look forward to being in the air with lots of time to relax, work, write, eat, sleep and do whatever I want. The only downside is missing my family, which will begin shortly after I leave for the airport.

10/18/08 3:53 PM DST In Flight to Hong Kong

Yesterday was spent in a mad rush to get everything ready for today's trip. As usual, tennis with my brother in the morning was fun but difficult as the stress and tiredness of the week took effect. Although it was pleasant, I was not sad when it ended and I went back to the office. Happily, my car is working fine again after a drained battery that resulted in a tow. I was really angry that she had another issue and I am trying to find out if I can get another car through an expedited lease termination. I really like the Lexus 400H Hybrid, but I have increasingly less faith in this car and that is not a good thing.

Yesterday went well with a lot of work with Roman and Eric regarding our new cable assembly prototype operation, which has been both challenging and fun to get going. We got our first set of orders for this new business and the clock is now running to get product made and tested. I think we are in good shape to make the parts and ordered the hand tools yesterday. It turns out that it will cost us more than \$60,000 in equipment over three years. We cannot rely on anyone else for this

critical area so we are moving ahead and getting the various testing units as quickly as possible. It is rare that you can move into a new area without some monetary outlay and this is no exception. I am hoping that by the time Vinnie and I return from Asia next week, all will be ready to start making and testing parts.

I mostly finished packing last night, got up early this morning, and biked part of the way with Uncle Dave until he had to leave. Unfortunately, my bike, "Stella," was having some pedal and squeaking problems which almost drove me nuts while riding. Our conversation focused mainly on the economy and our plans for dealing with it. He concentrated on real estate and his printing company, while my mind was on continuing to laterally expand into new areas to capture the niche markets of business in which our customers and competitors could not or did not want to participate. Both of our strategies are constantly changing, which is not boring, but can be very tiring on a continual, long-term basis.

After Wendy and I went to breakfast, I dropped off Stella at the bike shop for repairs and finished packing my food supplies. I got picked up by the "Green" car service. This company only uses hybrid cars and I know one of the owners. I like the idea of being environmentally better, which is why Wendy and I both drive hybrids. It was hard, as always, to say goodbye to Kayla and my wife. I miss them already. We went to pick up Vinnie at the plant. He had a horrible last few days; one of his best friends died suddenly and the funeral was today. There was some good news for him however – his daughter just finished buying a business and was happily immersing herself in the details and his son just got a new job. I stopped into my office to pick up a spreadsheet from a customer to work on while I was away. Happily, I got it just in time before we left and then I was off to the airport. Getting through check-in and security was not a problem and we both enjoyed the lunch I brought from the breakfast place this morning. I always try to make sure that I, and anyone traveling with me, always have enough good food. Vinnie appreciated the thought - not to mention Kayla's oatmeal chocolate chip cookies for dessert.

I spoke with David before we left and his trip to California went well. He is now planning to go to Mexico and Europe in the next few weeks. His schedule is arduous, but he likes the challenge. Now is the time for us to be out in the field attacking new markets and going after new business being created by the world's financial upheavals. We are positioned well, but we will have to stay focused and move quickly and skillfully to take advantage of the marketplace.

We have more than fifteen hours to go and will fly near the North Pole. I was reading the financial papers, and discovered that a lot of people have opinions of why these things have happened. I will follow my own path; at least that way I only have to answer to myself and

the people I am responsible for. Vinnie has a glass of wine in his hand, a sense of peace seems to be descending across his body. Shortly after dinner I hope he will drift to sleep for many hours as he has in the past. I probably will sit there watching and ask myself how he keeps sleeping while I am not. I hope I get a few hours of rest.

I had forgotten to look for the China Cell phones we keep for traveling, and I think they may be back in the office. I am hoping Ben has them waiting for us, but if he does not, we will use U.S. based phones. They will be more expensive, but if it is the worst thing that happens to us, it will mean very little.

10/19/08

9:31 AM China Time, 9:31 PM DST In Flight, 9:48 hours to go, 580 MPH, -59°F

Judging from flight map, it looks like we are nearing the North Pole.

I got a few hours of sleep and my headache is mostly gone, which means it will soon be snack time. I brought some of my fruit-pie-insides with me: apples, pears and spices that were microwaved. It is my version of pie filling without the calories of the crust. Luckily, I had brought some breaded fish fillets with me because I could not eat most of the dinner they served. I am listening to my mentor, Jean Shepherd, and am considering having a second mug of tea, since I don't think I will be sleeping much more until we get to Hong Kong. I am a little afraid that my headache will come back so I'm trying to be careful about working on my laptop, reading or watching a movie. Vinnie has been asleep for hours. It is good – he needed it.

10/19/08

1:33 AM China Time, 10:33 PM DST In Flight

Whenever I have some extra peaceful time, like on a plane ride, I try to think. Sometimes I think about business, my family, work or the world as a whole. I am a believer in a world conspiracy theory. I believe the world is run by a small group of Incredibly Powerful People (IPP) who cut across all lines of business and government, and have massive amounts of wealth. If I were in this group, my main ambition would be to maintain control over the world's resources, governments, flow of money and power in general. There are times when that control was lessened from lack of influence over a scarce resource like oil or a group of banks or financial institutions that were able to corner markets or governments that came to power with leaders who were uncontrollable and threatened the status quo. This happened right before World War I and World War II with the rise of leaders who threatened the world order. This happened in many small versions at various times during economic panics. Through the manipula-

tions of the IPP, various markets were managed, resources allocated, governments changed, and the status quo reestablished. This was not a peaceful or pleasant process, and the manipulations redistributed the assets wanted by those who chose that path. In other words, our world social order is being controlled by this group in order to ensure their way of life, and also to keep our world running to the degree they think best. In this "contract" between them and the rest of us, when global forces rise outside of their immediate control, it is their job to foster the changes necessary to bring the world back into sync.

An example of this is happening now. The price of oil went crazy and world financial institutions began to crumble because they had ventured into areas of ridiculous risk and speculation that in rational state of mind were ludicrous and bound to eventually fail. Add the rise of Russia as an uncontrollable world power financed by their oil and natural gas money and the situation was ripe for a readjustment by the IPP. What better way than to force the price of oil down, thereby reducing the dollars available to Russia, the Arab States and terrorists to wage war against the establishment. Think about the brilliance of it all. They not only reduce the power of these groups, but they gut the structure of the financial institutions over which they probably had no control and forced people to flee into more traditional financial areas they commanded. Add to that the bailouts by various governments again bringing more money into their areas of influence and putting their own people in charge of dispersing the funds, and you have a worldwide manipulation of unbelievable magnitude.

The good news is that if this is true and these forces are at work, then the odds are extremely good that they will not allow the world financial system to get too bad for too long. Things will go back to normal, giving us all the chance to recoup some of our losses and even benefit from the return to the more traditional ways of doing business. Governments are now suddenly working together as a global team where they were not before. The bad part is that a large part of the world's population has had their savings reduced or wiped out and retirements have been pushed out or cancelled. More people will stay in the workforce, which will make it both tougher for young people to get jobs and force older workers to accept less pay because they can be replaced by less expensive younger candidates.

Where does this leave us? It means that the world financial path should eventually move upward again, if this hasn't already started, which means the expansion our company has embarked upon should be timed well. Restructuring after panics, recessions and economic depressions always allows some new companies to emerge bigger and stronger than before. Of course, some of the big ones will fail, which is already evident. It is and will be a massive redistribution of the wealth, but I am hopeful that it will be based on merit for the bulk of us and

a new set of chances for benefit, success and progress we might have not had before.

Pretending the IPP doesn't exist is fine if you don't like conspiracy theories, but the whole idea of them and the consequences and actions that happen after various events all seem to indicate that they not only exist, but are firmly in control.

10/19/08 10:52 PM Hong Kong Time, 10:52 AM DST Harbour Plaza Hotel

The flight ended well and immigration was busy, but worked out perfectly as our luggage was out on the carousel when we went to pick it up. The cab ride to the hotel was pretty as usual and it felt like we were on home ground. The weather was warm – about 80°F and breezy. Vinnie was tired and went up for the night. I went out twice, once to get some food and the second to take a walk along the harbor - both ventures were pleasant. When I got into my room there was a newspaper and the first article was about how the government here fears 2.5 million people out of work in the near future – that is a lot of people. The global slowdown is obviously being felt a lot here. I heard from my partner, Ben that he is on his way to the hotel in Shenzhen. We will meet him there in the morning and then go over to HFC together. I emailed Wendy and the kids separately, Kayla emailed back that she misses me and I should be careful. I do love that girl. I will call home probably on the road trip tomorrow morning since it will be nighttime back home.

10/20/08

9:08 AM Shenzhen Time, 9:08 AM In route to the Crowne Plaza Hotel

I was able to get about 5 hours of sleep last night, got up early, worked out in my hotel room and went for a walk along the harbor. It was glorious, the sights and smells and the view of the approaching dawn is another beautiful memory I will carry with me. I spoke to my wife, Kayla and Ben at home as well as my parents and everyone seems fine. I miss them. I met Vinnie for breakfast, which included seven hard boiled eggs, and we were picked up for the ride over to Shenzhen. There are a few ways to get there from Hong Kong: you can fly, go by train, or by van or car. The train takes awhile and is usually hot and sticky and can be very crowded. Ben was nice enough to arrange a van and we got through the first immigration checkpoint without issue. It seemed a little too easy, and sure enough we stopped and the driver motioned for us to get our suitcases and leave the van. He pointed through a doorway and it became obvious that we had to go through customs alone since the driver left. The nice people involved pointed

us in the right direction and we sailed through without issue. We got outside the customs house on the Shenzhen side and had no idea where the van was, but Vinnie and I figured it out and we are on our way again to the hotel. I emailed Stuart asking if he could pick us up at the hotel and he generously agreed. In fact, he is already there, having breakfast and waiting for us. I also got an email from some people from Flextronics I thought were from Singapore, but apparently they are in Malaysia, so I am trying to reschedule a meeting for Wednesday. I hope they are in Penang, because if they are not, there is no chance to meet with them. It is a great example of life on the road: you do the best you can and most of the time people are helpful and things work out.

10/20/08 Monday Night 9:49 PM Shenzhen Time, 9:48 AM DST Crowne Plaza Hotel

We met Stuart at the hotel and we went to HFC, the gasket manufacturer and our future partner, to go to their headquarters. It gave us some time to get reacquainted before lunch. We already had a plan of attack in place and as it turned out there were no changes. We will buy some gasket cutting equipment from HFC and various types of samples. We will install the equipment at IJUS and Vinnie would train over the next two days so he can operate it. Any runs of any size will be produced through HFC and sold under the IJUS brand name. Joint marketing will begin immediately in Europe and the U.S. We both had a similar marketing plan, which was to try to take advantage of the global economic problems by going after the difficult rush orders that the mass run manufacturers could not afford to attack. After lunch, we took a plant tour and then went back to the hotel. During this time, we also decided that we would try to get Vinnie and Allan, IJX's VP, into Alcatel-Lucent in Qingdao to see their engineers in an attempt to start the corporate redesign program, in which we would try to remanufacturer current products for less cost and more environmentally friendly. Once we start with them, we hope to migrate to the program, and to other manufacturers. Stuart and I then met for an hour discussing our move into prototype cable assemblies and industrial design and redesign. Co-selling with HFC seems like a good way to go, but time will tell. After that, it was off to exercise. Vinnie and I had dinner, during which we spoke about his going to Qingdao, about the gasket deal, the economy and business in general. He is also scheduled to go to a cable assembly manufacturer this week for some training regarding assembly. I have full confidence that he will be up to speed soon and will be able to make virtually any prototypes we need. Meanwhile, I have been getting email from home that things are well there and the

new cable assembly operations are in work.

It was supposed to be an early night, but work continues. I hope I have only two calls before we fly to Malaysia.

10/21/08 1:15 PM Hong Kong Time, 1:15 AM DST Hong Kong Airport

I had a small problem last night. It was uncomfortably warm in my hotel room, so I called the front desk to send someone up to fix the air conditioning. After he left, and I still could not get the room cool enough, I asked to be moved to another room. The assistant manager came up to my room and explained that because of the heat outside and the fact that the whole building was on one air conditioning system, moving to a different room would not help. She was apologetic and there was nothing more to be done, so I told her it was okay. She felt badly and said she would send up a fruit tray and upgrade me the next time I stayed there. About an hour later, a knock at the door produced a large bucket full of fruit and chocolates. Since I was leaving the next morning, I wasn't sure what to do with it. Vinnie had mentioned that he never seemed to get fruit in his rooms when we traveled like I did, so I dropped the fruit off at his door this morning and figured he would enjoy it when he got back.

I got up this morning at 4:30 AM, determined it would be early enough so I would not have to rush. I answered my email, worked out in the room and went outside to walk. While I was walking, AI called me and we spent about 30 minutes on the phone. There was a lot of good stuff happening at home, and I also got to watch the sunrise. The Crowne Plaza Hotel we stayed at has Roman architectural, which elements are beautiful. On the elevated deck where I was walking, I could not only overlook the city, but also spot a huge gold winged lion sitting on top of one of the big roofs. It was an enjoyable sight, and once I finished talking with AI, I called home.

I went back to the room and went down to breakfast. Not wanting to have a cholesterol attack, I only had five hard boiled eggs, some pancakes and fruit. I also saw Vinnie and Stuart there, who were eating before going to the shop for the day.

As it turned out, Vinnie would be leaving the next morning to go to Qingdao to see the AL engineers there with Allan. One day at the gasket plant should be enough for him to be familiar enough to run the cutting machine once we get back home.

Ben and I boarded the same van as yesterday. It turns out that we were going back to Hong Kong to make two sales calls and then leave from there for Penang.

As we entered the border crossing, we were told to drive to the side so our baggage could be searched. Ben said it was because traffic

was light and the guards had nothing to do. The search was painless and we were on our way quickly, but it was still a little unsettling to go through it.

Once in Hong Kong, we went to Celestica and entered into a group of meetings with various purchasing and engineering people. They were highly interested in our new Industrial Design and Cost Reduction capability and our potential to help reduce the cost of AL products. The rest is up to Ben. I am hopeful that Vinnie and Allan can also get something started tomorrow from Qingdao. Then we went to a metal fabricator who has been buying labels from IJX to tell them about our ID sections and our other product areas, and how we hoped we could work as a team to bring cost reduced products from Europe and the U.S. to our customers here. I love working as a team and I am hopeful that we can also do something with them. The two brothers who owned the company were interested in my views on the world financial problems and one had even checked our website and read some of my work. We left them two books and moved on to the airport.

Once we arrived at the airport I had a small problem with the airline. We had gotten American Express Platinum cards for the company so we could get into airport lounges when our people were traveling. When I tried to get Ben and I in to the lounge, they refused. I pushed and finally found out that this particular lounge was not run by the airline itself but rented by some other party. It is a good reason, but now I am not sure the cards were worth the expense or the effort. I will try it again before I complain to the credit card company.

We got through immigration and security without a problem, but it was hot so Ben and I separated and I sat elsewhere to cool down. I found a small shop and am drinking lemon flavored iced tea, which, considering the caffeine may not be the best of ideas, but I do feel a lot cooler now. I will leave for the gate in a few minutes. The flight stops in Kuala Lampur for an hour, so we should get to Penang around 8:00 tonight. I have no idea if I will have the energy left to do anything else, so I will play it by ear. The lack of sleep is starting to kick in and I am getting more irritable as time goes on.

I have also been talking with Ben and we have gotten a lot done regarding what has been happening and where we plan to go. It is extremely important that we meet in person every few months; faceto-face conversation is imperative to making sure we are both on the same track.

10/22/08 6:09 PM Malaysian Time, 6:09 AM DST In Flight

We got to our hotel in Penang around 9:45 PM last night and it was too late to do much, so I ate some oatmeal and bananas, and after

some work, went to sleep at midnight. I was up again at 4:30. I am definitely not getting enough sleep even with the naps I am grabbing, but I figured exercise was better than sleep. I hope I am making the best choices.

I woke up this morning to a minor disaster: my Blackberry was not functioning. This caused a multitude of problems, including not being able to call the office while I worked out, which meant I had to readjust my schedule. I split my workout and had breakfast in the middle. This was when I discovered that my stomach was not in good shape, but wanting to keep on track, I worked out anyway. From there, it was back to the room where I had to use the room telephone to make my calls, which meant I did not have enough time to get everything ready to checkout. When I got down to the lobby, the warm air hit me and I knew I was going to be sweating with a bad stomachache very soon. Ben came to the rescue and fixed the mobile problem, and we were in the car within a few minutes with high speed air conditioning and I was able to take care of a lot of the office work with Al before we made our first call. Both Ben and I had been busy setting up calls and we stopped at Flextronics first. We saw multiple people – some old, some new - and we told them all about out new ID section, our plans to help redesign products for cost reduction, the new gasket line, cable assembly prototype line and the new laser. People were enthused at the possible ways we could help them and the calls went well. From there, we traveled to Tyco, and it was back over the bridge between the island and the mainland for the second time to go to Kontron. It was our first visit there and since we were already doing business with their groups in Canada and Germany, it was an appointment to try to bridge those relationships here. The buyer seemed positive about the possibilities, and both Ben and I were pleased at the outcome.

After that, we were done with calls for the day and we raced back over the bridge before it got packed with rush hour traffic and arrived at the airport at around 4:00 PM. We are now about to land in Singapore. My stomach is okay, but not great and I will try to eat dinner later.

We heard from Allan that they received an inquiry from AL in Qingdao after telling them about new industrial design capabilities. This is a good sign.

10/23/08

5:03 PM Singapore Time, 5:03 AM DST In Flight to Hong Kong

We landed in Singapore and the rainy season was in full bore, but the countryside was still beautiful. We stayed in the same hotel as our last trip and Ben and I went out to find some dinner. It was very hot and humid and we made our way across the street to the food court of the mall. It was not a difficult choice since my stomach was still not

great and there was little chance I was going to eat stir fry, so we ended up at a Japanese restaurant. Ben looked like he had his doubts, but the food was grilled for me and not bad. Ben had his usual noodles and it turned out well. I went back to the room, determined to get to sleep early and, after talking with the office, finally did around 11:00 PM. I was up at 5:00. My Blackberry was functioning well and I was able to talk to Al, Wendy, Kayla and David, have breakfast, and be ready for the 8:30 AM pick up for the day's sales calls. First up was Tyco, then it is was off to Trend Technologies, a customer that IJX had just started dealing with and we went over the same areas of how we could help each other. They were just as enthused as everyone else about being able to convert U.S. and European made parts for use in Asia and being the intermediates to help make it happen. With the global stock markets still going down, people are cutting back everywhere, and it has put us into a progressively better situation to follow our marketing plan. We stopped at Starbucks; where Ben ate and I only had tea for fear that food might not sit well with me at the moment. I did, however, buy some food for later in case I did not have time to eat before getting on the plane. We went to see the people at Flextronics and our goal was two-fold: one, to talk about our new ID section and cost reduced products and second, to make sure we are on their preferred vendor list. The meetings went well and both Ben and I were not only satisfied about this last group of meetings, but the last few days as well. We were short on time to get to the airport, but our driver did a great job. Ben came in with me to make sure I made it onto the flight on time. We are due to be in Hong Kong in about another two and a half hours, then I have about a two hour layover and I am hoping to be in Taiwan at around 12:30 tonight. Titan is supposed to meet me there to go to the hotel. Once I arrive, I will check what time we have to leave in the morning and determine if I have time to work out or not. I am very glad I came on this trip. Just going over things with Ben, coordinating our strategies and making plans for the future were worth it alone. We have to work together globally to ensure that we penetrate these new areas in an orderly way to maximize our chances for success. I took a chance and ate some of my sandwiches and a banana. So far so good. I may try the airline dinner. I am feeling better and I hope it continues.

I heard from Vinnie that he and Allan had dinner with one of the AL buyers last night. Their day went well and I will hear more when I see him on Saturday. Compared to yesterday morning when I felt lousy, I am doing great.

My optimism is running high, tempered by the financial events of the world. I hope we are right in our path, but there is no turning back now. The world is changing too quickly and we will have to try to stay ahead of it in order to gain more success.

10/23/08 9:07 PM Hong Kong Time, 9:07 AM DST Hong Kong Airport

The plane ride was fine, except my seat was broken and kept sliding backward. It made it uncomfortable for me and I'm sure it was a real pain for the poor woman behind me. I apologized and explained the situation, but there was nothing I could do. I told the flight attendant and they made me change seats before landing due to an FAA regulation. The seat I was moved to had a broken monitor so I am glad I did not move there sooner. Still, I had an aisle seat and I was happy to get that. I decided to try to use our American Express Platinum Corporate Cards again to get into the airport lounge. Unfortunately, it did not work with Cathay Pacific. I tried a corporate lounge that I paid to get into, but it was so warm I could not stand it and left. I am now in a relatively vacant seating area that is nice and cool, and the only other person here is a pleasant looking woman who makes no noise. I called the office and things are fine there; Al is handling everything well as usual. Mike is sick, but he came in especially to help David with some electronics problems before his next trip to Mexico. I love hearing about our people helping each other; it makes me feel good. Unfortunately Rich's grandmother died, so we are having five trees planted in her memory in Israel. I have an account with the Jewish National Fund through which I buy trees in groups in advance to commemorate events. People like the idea of having a tree planted, because it is a symbol of life and makes a positive statement to a sad event.

I am getting tired and I feel I am getting irritable. I have a physical need to work out every day, so I will try to get in a few hours tonight when I eventually get to Taiwan and will walk tomorrow morning before Titan and I start our sales calls.

10/24/08 11:01 AM Taiwan Time, 11:01 PM DST In route to Lite-On Corporation

My planes were on time and Titan from IJX was there to meet me with the driver to go to the hotel. When we arrived, I exercised a little, had some food (thank goodness for my peanut butter and jelly sandwiches and the apple from the hotel), and calmed down enough to go to sleep around 3:00 AM. I got up at 6:00 AM and planned to go for a walk outside while I spoke to AI, Wendy and Kayla. I went around the block of the hotel and on the way I found a struggling worm on the sidewalk. Wishing to help it, but not actually touch it, I sacrificed my Police Benevolent Card for 2008, which could have been useful if I were stopped for a traffic violation, and put him into some nearby bushes. He landed on top, so I shook them to make sure he got to the ground. I threw the card away and continued my first and only lap.

Taiwan is much like China and Hong Kong in the non-tourist areas; there was not a lot to see and it was reasonably hot and humid so I went back inside.

The gym was not open until 7:00 and in order to not disturb the surrounding guests they would not open it earlier, so I walked around and quietly made my phone calls. I felt like I was in a restricted area so I was guiet and at 7:00, after having finished my calls, I moved into the gym. While I was biking, I happened to find an old movie with Natalie Wood, an actress I admired for many years. She unfortunately passed in a boating accident. A very young Robert Redford was also in it, but Natalie Wood was the only one I saw on the screen. After my workout, I had hard boiled eggs for breakfast (I am definitely not taking a cholesterol test for at least a month), then packed and dressed. Titan was on time and off we went to Delta Electronics Corp. IJX is making labels for them but no one had ever visited. I had thought that people here spoke English as much as the Chinese, but we are out of the major city area and I was very happy to have Titan with me as a translator. This was also good because he is learning how to sell and the best way to learn is to be forced into helping from the start. We have the chance at new business for a specific label and an insulator. They are also an Alcatel-Lucent supplier and loved the idea of partnering for cost reductions, so they can submit to AL and use our components in the process.

Then we went to Lite-On Corporation, but unfortunately the person we were supposed to see was at the main headquarters. The address I had been given from IJX was the wrong building and we had a tough time finding out where he really was. As it turned out, we could still see him on our next call, so nothing was lost. The best plans are just that: plans. Once you are out there, you do the best you can with the changes that occur. There may have been a chance to see another person from Tyco, but there wasn't time so Titan called with our regrets and we will see her on the next trip. I have not seen a Subway sandwich shop here. I would like to stop and get something for the airport for later.

10/24/08

2:43 PM Taiwan Time, 2:43 AM DST In route to the airport

The next call to another engineering company went quickly and without great progress. We saw one engineer who mostly wanted to talk about cheap labels and only to Titan in Mandarin, so not much was accomplished. As I said to Titan, you can't force people to listen, you can only try to make the best situation for them and hope they go for it.

After that was our last call to Microelectronics Tech. and Global

PCS. After talking for awhile we went into the price reduction plan for AL. They were a supplier for them and looked at our plastic panel design and thought it might work for one of their panel groups. After seeing a sample, we redesigned a handle on it together and all agreed that if the pricing was good we would bring the idea before AL and try for our first cost reduction. It was very exciting, as everyone was joined in on the possibilities and how it could work. It was a lot of fun and could mean a lot of business for IJX. I called Ben later and told him about the potential and how well Titan did. It was a really good last call and feels wonderful to be done. The thrill of a good sales effort is hard to explain. It is an adrenaline rush that feels like your whole body is suddenly elevated to a new level of consciousness. The only word for it is a kind of euphoria and it is addicting because it is so pleasant. It is a natural high and there is nothing like it. Unfortunately, after wards I normally get very tired, but since I now have an airport to wait in, I can always take a nap there.

I had hoped to catch an earlier flight, but it looks like that will not happen. It's not a big deal; I can work at the airport until it is time to go. Since I already exercised today, all I need to do when I get to Hong Kong is get to my hotel, find and eat dinner, and walk along the harbor.

10/24/08 5:09 PM Taiwan Time, 5:09 AM DST In Flight

We got to the airport and I lucked out. I found an earlier flight and am now on my way to Hong Kong. I hope to be at the hotel at 7:00 PM. It will be good to see Vinnie and the harbor again.

10/25/08 12:53 PM Hong Kong Time, 12:53 AM DST In Flight

I got back to the hotel around 7:45 last night and had already arranged to go for a walk with Vinnie to see the harbor sights once more before we left. It was hot and humid, but it was a wonderful stretch of the legs. We talked about what had happened during the trip and both agreed that it had been very productive, though our roles here in Asia had shifted. IJX was now able to stand on its own and we were no longer coming in as heroes from afar to fix problems. Instead we were now partners and were working more on marketing, sales and new product areas. In this case, Vinnie was able to see firsthand how the gasket machinery was built and operated, so when it arrives at IJUS in December it should be ready quickly. He also visited a cable assembly plant and is now ready to lead our new effort to build as a prototyping operation at IJUS. He and Allan even made a sales call to

AL Qingdao and the result was positive regarding our new marketing thrust for reduction of parts costs through redesign by our new Industrial Design groups. The day-to-day running of our IJ business is in good hands with the people we have, so I will focus on bringing in more profitable sales and expanding our new distribution centers and plants around the world.

I found out during this trip that IJ has almost 70 employees, and that combined with our other locations means we are over 100 worldwide. This is an amazing number to me. When I started with my dad, it was just the two of us and a secretary.

We are expanding in the face of a world contraction and I can't think of a better time to do it. Our customers will be almost frenzied in their need to cut costs and we have the abilities they need to not only save their jobs but advance themselves in the process. Expanding in the face of this global Tsunami, as it is being called, is both frightening and exhilarating at the same time. It is saying that we know that things will not collapse, they will probably reduce more but the tenets of basic business will stay viable and eventually move back upward. You don't get chances to expand like this often in your career, so we are pulling out all of the stops to take advantage of it.

After breakfast, Vinnie and I got to the airport in plenty of time and went our separate ways for awhile. I bought chocolate for my crew, as is tradition, and then went to the gate where Vinnie was waiting for me. I had heard from Stuart that he would be there soon and we ended up boarding together. He is a good man and I am very hopeful of what we can accomplish between our two companies.

This is an excellent flight: Continental Airlines over the North Pole with about 13 hours to go.

I have to center on gaining more business as the economy deteriorates, then more companies will go out of business which means bad debts will be created. Cash flow and credit is everything and unless our customers are paying us, then we have nothing to continue in terms of day-to-day operations. Since things will get worse, we need more customers spread out over more diverse areas to help equalize the chance of trouble and to ensure that money comes in. It is the standard operating procedure of our company: more customers, more high profit sales, take risks with new customers (as long as the profit potential is high), and keep expanding laterally for new product lines.

The takeover of the AL Industrial Design Group is a key to this. This was a major coup for us to accomplish. The AL name is still extremely strong and well branded, and being aligned with them, especially in industrial design, gives us immediate credence with of their suppliers and other customers as well. It is the battering ram that will help enable us to break through the wall of resistance for product redesign that would have been almost impossible a few years ago. While we are

known for labels, part of my job is to spread the brand of who we are and who we are becoming so people are open to think of us in new areas and willing to give us a try. The Ideal brand stands for exceptional quality and service, and being able to handle the tougher areas. We just need to expand the idea that our business covers more product lines and services. This will not be an easy task, but it will be much more possible starting with the name recognition we already have.

There are certain movies that have affected my life. Two, to be exact. The first was All The President's Men, which, coincidentally, I am watching on this flight. It's about the journey of two reporters for the Washington Post Newspaper and their involvement in the forced resignation of President Nixon. I thought it was a fantastic film and it inspired me to become a reporter. So much so that I went to college and got a degree in communications. Unfortunately, my skills as a reporter and journalist were obviously not as good as I thought, for I received no job offers and had to change careers. While I have no regrets changing fields, the training did do some good. Like the tracking of a story the finding of new markets and product lines are similar. Happily, there are not any criminals involved and the results are more sales and success for us. But the hunger to find out, the need to find a pathway and the structure to find them began as I trained as a reporter.

The second movie was Other People's Money. It is a story about a man who engineers a corporate take-over of an unwilling target. I found it mesmerizing and have watched it many times since. The idea of bottom fishing and taking over companies drives me with the thrill of the chase and the hunt for success. So far, I have not tried a corporate takeover, but the idea of forcing our way into new markets is never far from my mind.

Many in the liberal left wing media of our country have Mr. Obama so far ahead that he as already won the election. I tend to differ; if something is certain, it rarely ever happens. His calls for a redistribution of wealth could hit people hard and if the tax burden becomes too difficult, we many have to adjust our business plans.

I have not been able to get the building I want out of my mind. It may sound crazy but I am going after it. If I can structure it I can offer the current tenant to buy the building and then we would buy it from them. We would give them a few years free rent and we could then take it over part by part. I have no idea if they would be interested in buying the property and then exchanging it with us. The owners of the company are Korean and their country has been exceptionally hard hit by the bad economic conditions. I don't know how we would work out the space with our current landlord; it would be something fun to try.

What I am afraid of is that if Mr. Obama gets elected and has a majority in the House and Senate than his fiscal policies will become

reckless and he will start giving everything away and pave the way to high inflation, more entitlements that we can't afford like Social Security, which will be further hindered by his proposed policies. I am hoping for deadlock. Whoever is president then at least either the House or the Senate gets enough votes for the other party so a veto can be used to stop any big direction to either side of the political spectrum. I want us to have government from the middle, a moderate stance on issues that can keep us free from foreign entanglements and allow us to work together with other countries as opposed to inflicting our view of how things should be. I want to be let alone to build as I and my people see fit with as little interference as possible.

Getting back to my conspiracy theory. If I was part of this group and I wanted to cripple all of the countries that fund themselves through oil revenues outside of my control, I would try to bring down the cost of oil quickly and steeply, like what is happening now, and then the following would happen.

Russia, Venezuela and the Arab countries would suddenly not have nearly the resources they had before. In fact, they would become crippled quickly because their main investors had been leveraging their assets like a giant pyramid scheme to buy more. As soon as the economy tanked, their big investors were caught without the resources to make their commitments and began to go out of business. The Russian government will not have enough to create the political and military clout they had before and would recede in the world power game. The Arab states and Venezuela would have their economies and their ability to fund activities like terrorism that the world order would not want reduced. The alternative fuels movement, like what happened in the 1980s would once again be destroyed because no one will put out the investments needed. Therefore, we will be left with an oil based economy with the resources being handled by the world order group who will once again control what is happening.

When I spoke to Wendy, she mentioned that Russia had temporarily closed down their stock market and there was talk to do it here. I hope they don't; the markets worldwide need to find a new level and should be allowed to do so. If they fall another few thousand points, at least they will stabilize somewhere and only then can things start to grow again.

Eric, our former senior designer from Alcatel-Lucent, was asked to be on an Industrial Design Committee for AL and I will tell him to say yes. In fact, I may even ask to have Mike join as well since he is our VP in charge of ID worldwide. The more ingrained we can become in this new area, the more we will learn and be able to add our input. It will also put us into position for more work.

The midway meal service is now done. I had bought two duck wrap sandwiches before leaving and just had one. It was good and I may have the other. The lights are back off in the cabin and it has become peaceful once again. I may go crazy and have another diet soda. There I go, teetering on the edge of craziness again.

My next trip is scheduled for November 3rd, the day before Election Day. I will go to Tempe, Arizona and back again in one day to see a single customer. We have a chance to take over their labeling worldwide and that alone is definitely worth the trip. If we are successful, then we can go after their gasket business next.

We continued marketing worldwide with our new Industrial Design Centers. We are also utilizing the buying talents of our people and offering to help with cost reductions. Who knows if any of it will work? You try many things and usually something will work to some extent.

David leaves for Mexico in the morning and I have a lot of meetings. It will probably be a few days before I am totally caught up. I will also start on getting calls for both my Arizona and India trips so I can get my schedules finalized as quickly as possible.

I called the man about the building I want to purchase in Millburn. Our timing is good, and it may be available. Let's see if we can get it.

10/28/08 9:43 PM DST Home, NJ

The level of excitement last night and today was high. After talking to the general manager of the building in Millburn, it turned out my timing was just right. They had an agreement with their landlord that as of January 31st of 2009 they would either buy the building or it would revert back to the landlord. The company owner was not sure he wanted to own or lease the building himself, so an offer from me might be a viable alternative. I was willing to give them a good deal on a lease so they were just as happy to have us buy the building, give them the space they wanted and give them favorable terms. I put a tentative plan together of how to get the building I had dreamt about for years. I was not sure how much they wanted yesterday, but I've already alerted my bank as to what I would probably need and we started sending over the financial documents today. I contacted my landlord this morning and he was interested. The plan was for us to leave our current location and move to the new building. We would take half and leave the other half to the company already there. As part of the agreement with us, our landlord would let us out of our lease here. I called the general manager for the company from the building and found out the following plan that changed things. First, the building was valued at about 45% less than I thought. The troubling news

was that they needed two thirds of the space and in order to do the deal, they wanted at least a four year lease with a possibility for more. I was willing to work this out and since I was now going to have to stay in my current space anyway and set up a secondary operation there I was free in terms of what I needed to do and who I needed to partner with. Still, I wanted my landlord involved to help negotiate the best deal and do the maintenance on the new building and any construction necessary. I emailed Uncle Dave that I was partnering with my landlord and he would not be involved in the purchase of the building because he is in real estate sales. I felt badly and told him so, but guilt is not a good reason to do business and if he can't add value then it is better he not be involved. I hope he sees it that way also.

Our global efforts at marketing labels, gaskets, Industrial Design, product re-design, cable assemblies and our new laser all seem to be going well.

The Stock Market went up over 800 points after a few days of losses. It is like a seesaw and very unnerving. We are moving ahead.

10/29/08 9:47 PM DST Home, NJ

I got an email from the general manager of the building I want this morning. It seems that the owner wants the building for himself and was lukewarm to an outside offer. I thanked him and kept on going with the bank just in case they can't get their financing. It is disappointing, but perhaps just a delay.

The cable assembly business is much tougher than I thought. The tough part is the testing and we found that out today when we started learning how to do it. The loaner machines malfunctioned, so I am hoping we have another tomorrow so we can test our parts and finish them out. The person making the assemblies seems okay and I am hoping his work will pass inspection. It is tough getting a new area together, but I am hopeful it can turn out well.

I had acupuncture today and my man Steve thinks I am killing myself with my schedule. I told him that part of his job was to do what was needed to keep me going at a high energy level. He disagrees with a lot of my lifestyle choices: a lot of work, exercise and not enough of sleep. I eat a lot of raw foods and that is also not good according to his ways. I am not sure if I can stay with him since we are such opposites, but I know he has my best interest at heart so I will try to modify a few habits and see if they make a difference. I like the actual acupuncture itself and I think it is helping.

My Tuesday morning tennis partner had to change his schedule so I start with a new man in a few weeks. Next week I am out late from the trip to Arizona so I will sleep later than usual and workout at home.

Things are good and he approved of our general direction, allocation of resources and the potential buying of a building. It is good to have his support; he would not give it unless he was sincere.

The stock market has been going up for the past few days. Our customers are in full money-saving mode and bordering on panic. This is enabling us to get into areas never before accessible with our new product redesign and cost reduction programs. David is using it well in Mexico, as I did in Asia. He goes to Europe in a week with Stuart, and I will start making appointments for them in the morning. It is good to go in with a viable alternative to simply lower costs and profits with something that will help everyone. As for Steve, I am trying to breathe deeply and let the good air in. Mr. Obama had a 30 minute show on television last night on two networks and at least one cable station. I think it reinforced his arrogance in the public's minds with his thinking he is already president and can dictate what Americans watch. He also prevented them from watching their regular TV shows. So in one shot he annoyed them and placed doubts in their minds about his ability to handle money well. The polls are closing in rapidly to a dead heat and this election is far from over. I think last night was a major mistake for him.

We got one call for the G.R.I.P. project from one homeowner. With

the price of oil below \$70.00/barrel, our program, as well as a lot of alternative fuel potential, is probably dead.

I played tennis with my brother this morning. As is usual on a Friday, I was tired, he was tired, and the game was secondary to the good time we had. Vinnie and I had a 10:00 meeting with a customer from Canada, who is a contract manufacturer, the head buyer and the head of engineering. We talked about our new design cost reduction capability and although he was hesitant at first, he was up to a "possible" by the time we finished. Having a lot of contacts at Alcatel-Lucent helped move things along. I have another meeting with a business friend at AL in Whippany next Friday, but I forgot I am supposed to go to the Berkshires with Wendy. This is the second time I messed up my schedule, which means I am very tired and making mistakes. I will call him and reschedule. I am not sure how much time jury duty will take next week, so I need to move him forward anyway. He is a nice man and I hope he is okay with the changes.

Alex and Eric are both doing well and bringing in paying work, but Roman is frustrated that the AL people won't allow him to do the work he once did as an employee. He will have to find more streams of business in order to pay for himself. Sales are a tough business, but he chose the road. It may be profitable or not – that is up to him.

I spent part of the day setting up sales calls for David and Stuart's trip to Europe starting on November 8th. So far, they have one appointment in Hungary, and I will help to get more. They will also push our new business model, which works perfectly with the current stressed financial climate of the world. I am still signing books. I have about 700 more to go for this batch, but we need more books and will have to go back to press.

Ben has asked me to help sell the new design idea in Asia, which I can do from here and in India. Tushar, Indy and I will be traveling together in December and we are setting up the calls now. My focus is on sales, which is very tiring, but exciting. It is where I can serve the company best.

The new franchise model for our manufacturing sites seems like a good idea. IJX was the prototype, where we got going with someone competent in charge, backed off when they were capable of running things, and now offer help with sales and marketing when it is needed. This is the model we will use in India and elsewhere. My original idea of utilizing modular plants may work here, especially with a gasket cutting operation, cable assembly prototype and a small distribution center. We can do this virtually anywhere with little expense and will

be able to move quickly and easily if it is necessary. I really like the idea of spreading laterally for the small rush jobs with higher profits. We can jump from place to place and focus on where the money is. It is not the way to build a billion dollar company, but I would rather have a smaller, more portable one with franchises. It is amazing how quickly things are changing. The stock markets around the world did alright this week. I hope this will be a step toward calming things down.

I have been reading an autobiography of a former pornography star – a woman who starred in X-rated movies. Her childhood had been horrible and filled with all types of abuse, until she finally hit rock bottom and was able to save herself. After she weaned herself off of drugs and alcohol dependency, she went to acting school and wanted to become a "legitimate" actress. Her second role was in a low budget film and during filming, she realized that the long months of work in formal acting training were going to be useless. She made the decision to go with her gut instinct and do it her way. In the end, it was the path she chose from within herself that paved her way to a new life and success. I like the idea of going your own way.

I had an epiphany this morning. Growing up with my dad, I watched him as he rode through life tearing a path for the journey he dictated. He faced the world head on and whether he succeeded or not in relationships, business and his dealings with the world, he ignored them all in favor of his own design. Watching this, I decided I did not want to slash and burn, rather I wanted to try to take into account all of the people I was dealing with, the conditions they were living with, and use them to weave a path with my own so we all wound up in a better place.

My dad's way worked for him because his scope was narrow and well defined. He got what he wanted most of the time and he was content.

My way has also worked and enabled me to branch out much further. However, I have also come to realize that it too has its limitations. By listening to what people say and watching their situations, my viewpoints have been clouded by what might have been a better path. Case in point: when I sold in Asia, Europe, Mexico and India, my

people on site and elsewhere would tell me about how things were in the various countries, how different it was from America, and how you had to do things their way to have any chance of success. I listened to them all, trying to understand their customers and fit within their framework so as to not be that overbearing, ugly American forcing his way upon others.

While we have been very successful, we have hit a wall with the new economic reality that has taken over the world. Nothing matters anymore in business except the following:

- Finding people who need your products and services.
- Selling those people your products and services.
- Getting paid and getting more business.

That, in a nutshell, has always been business. However, in better times, things like customs and localized ways of doing business could influence things. Not anymore – business is now a completely black and white playing field.

Therefore, in reaction to this new playing field, I will adapt. From now on, I will no longer listen to anyone else regarding the intensity or manner in which I sell. I will attack in the manner as I see fit with the resources I choose to command. Our selling capabilities in other countries are limited at best. Our best sales come first from me with direct attacks, then from David and finally from our other VPs and managers who sell both directly and indirectly. That is our attack force, that is where the business is generated, and that is how we will move forward worldwide. If I am going to sell successfully in Asia, India, Mexico and everywhere else, I will do it my way and if they don't like me as me - an American, a white male, a Jew, or anything else - then that is their business. But I also know that their best chance of survival in this world is to keep their job or get a better one. They will be able to do those things by dealing with me and my people worldwide and that will generally override anything else. The veneer of caring about what others think when they are selling for me is gone. If they sell, I will nurture and treasure them, but if they don't and just give me excuses, then I will fire them or go around them. Just because I own the majority of the IJ companies worldwide, doesn't mean that I have absolute control. I know what I can and can't do, and my energy resources are limited by time. I will focus on where the best chances are and that is my decision. My father was right when he told me I had no voice until I could prove I could sell by booking sales. The same holds true for my people worldwide.

The world is in turmoil and we have the chance now to move rapidly ahead all over the world. I have the ball when it comes to selling and it is up to me where we place our resources. The ultimate success or failure of all of our companies rests on our ability to sell. The

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warning is out to anyone who wastes my time or gets in my way. My father was right again – the slash and burn technique is best for these times.

Yesterday was spent playing indoor tennis with my brother, biking outside in the cool, crisp, beautiful NJ autumnal weather, going to the office for some last minute preparations, and picking up Kayla and her friends from the religious retreat they had over the weekend. After that, I signed more books to be sent out this week, packed for my one day trip to Arizona, and then spent the balance of the evening emailing back and forth with IJX. We are having some marketing changes and doing things differently is always made a little tougher by the cultural and time differences. With the economy the way it is, we have to go back to our core of rush, short-run, difficult jobs. IJX has not been marketing that way and has done very well so far. I am worried about the next few years when the customers they have now begin to peter out as they often do. If we do not push for new customers and types of business now, and the right type of business and customers for us, it will spell doom for later on. I have been in this business for many years and, along with my grandfather and father, have seen many economic situations. This one is not different from the others we have gone through. It is difficult and will cause great hardship, but for those positioned correctly, it is a time for great potential growth. That is what I am trying to do now with IJ worldwide. I want us in position to boom and what I want often seems to counter conventional thought. I smile inwardly when people working for me who have only few years or less of sales experience try to argue with me about the correct sales path to take. Their theories are meaningless and usually get in the way. When they can sell, I will listen, depending on their level of success. That is the great part about sales: it is easy to differentiate from those who can and those who can't. If they are not smart enough to rely on my decisions, they will be fired. We go by my path, my views and my decisions. I am responsible for all of my people worldwide; therefore, we go by what I say.

I am not getting enough sleep and I hope I can get some on this flight. The good news is that I only have one stop close to the airport, so I shouldn't get too lost getting there. I have one main meeting with the chance to take over the bulk of the customer's label business worldwide and if we get that, I am hoping to move to their gasket operations and other areas. It is a good chance and well worth the cost and effort to get there. I drove myself this morning, which was cheaper and easier than a car service and should be faster getting

home tonight.

I am having David follow up on every book that is sent out, which means he will have over 1000 phone calls to make over the next two months. That will be a good use of his time since the holidays will make it much more difficult to travel efficiently until January.

It is a great time of year here. I do not think I am doing any more traveling before Thanksgiving after today's trip, but you never know.

Home

My son, Ben, is finding his job at the recording studio both instructive and frustrating. Every company has its own corporate culture that is decided from the top down. Whether it is a benevolent dictatorship, democracy, back-stabbing free for all, well-structured, survival of the fittest or some combination, each one has its own unique way of functioning. In our case, I try to make it a benevolent dictatorship with a team hierarchy in which each group within our various companies and departments works as a cohesive team and tries to outperform the others. The competition is set up so that a single group can appear to be better, but the overall level of each team and the company as a whole improves. Bonuses and promotions are not based on destroying fellow employees, but are based on how an employee played in the benefits to the company as a whole, how they get along with others and how they help to move things forward. Obviously, we have our various controversies and personality clashes, but we make a huge effort to keep a positive attitude and I think we generally accomplish it. With every new employee, a new balance or equilibrium must be established, and that is modified greatly whenever a family member or a new company is added to our fold. In Ben's case, the culture doesn't appear to be positive, but more of a dog-eat-dog situation, which enables neither loyalty nor the maximum in efficiency, productivity or profit. He is seeing the disentanglement of a less-than-perfect corporate culture that is starting to chafe. He plans to spend a few years there to learn his craft and move on, but I can see already that he is beginning to formulate how he will want to structure his own company when the day comes. I can see that he also has problems with working for someone else and that will eventually lead him to his own company. The numerous additional burdens of being in charge (such as having to watch all aspects of the business and making a profit at the end) far outweigh having to answer to someone else and live by their rules. It is much better to rule with the troubles included than be led with less responsibility.

Alex is doing well in school; except for an unfortunate injury sus-

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tained by trying to jump over a garbage can at a Halloween party, but all is well. He is determined to graduate with a dual-degree and is doing everything necessary to see it done. I applaud his scope, tenacity and willingness to do whatever is needed to achieve his goals. If he ends up working for me, the dual-degree may not be unnecessary because it is one of the steps to prove to him that he can choose a goal and reach it. I admire his perseverance and his strength of will – two very good traits if he comes to work for us. He leaves for Italy in January and I hope has a wonderful time.

Kayla is ready to be out of high school. Unfortunately, she still has until June and in the meantime I hope she can make the best of it. Our township high school is amongst the best in the country regarding the level of academia, but with that, unfortunately comes a level of pressure that I was never exposed to. Her commitment to studying ensures my wife and I never have to check up on her, but she spends too many hours, in my opinion, studying when she could be taking it a little easier and relaxing. Of course, that is what people say about me so I guess she comes by it naturally. I think college will be a little easier for her than high school since the pressure of grades will be less; she can branch out to find new areas of interest.

My wife is a fantastic mother and homemaker and her time is coming quickly when she may or may not have to make a change. Kayla will be off at college in the fall, which will end the bargain, she and I struck 23 years ago that she would stay home as long as the kids were in school. She could have worked part time if she chose to, but she did not. Now she has the ultimate in choices which can be the most difficult. She can do anything she wants. I would still like dinner most nights, but she is basically free to do as she pleases. If she chooses to take care of me and continue to run the house as she did before, that would be absolutely okay with me. If she wants to work full or part time, that is also fine. In a way, it is much harder because there are no restrictions, at least right now, with her decision.

Work

I love my job and I love being able to change as I want. I can move in any direction and try anything and my people will unite behind me to try to make it work. The best part is that we all know that many of my ideas won't work, but we still try. Sometimes it is the failure of a group of ideas that lays the groundwork for one that will and it is that knowledge that keeps us moving forward. We are not right most of the time but enough that the business keeps growing worldwide and we are having a great time. The older I get the more I understand that having fun is such an integral part of the path to success. The journey is so much the adventure that if you are not enjoying it then the fleeting moment of actual success is not worth the process.

Right now I am immersed in how to create a sales organization that will not only satisfy my demands, but also work within the framework of China and Asia. I know our people there, especially Ben, are trying to do as I want in terms of aggressiveness, follow-up, utilization of our resources, building for the future and being ready in case of trouble. But sales requirements are tough enough when they are within your own country and culture and the confusion and disconnects increase geometrically when you change either. I am coming to the conclusion that sales by formula may be the way to go everywhere. The formula I follow is to set up systematic communication with every customer every 90 days and make sure they get something they will keep, like my CDs and books along with product announcements. Add to that having the monthly newsletter online for them to access so they can read it during their breaks. Enough customers will be contacted frequently enough that, by the percentages, business opportunities will occur and new and increased business should follow. It is strictly by the numbers and it works, but the trouble is implementing the structure to have it done. I would guess we have about 2000 current or potential individual customers worldwide. Multiply four counts per year and vou get about 8000 hits with current people only. That means our people should be making contact 8000 times per year with written and promotional items – not to mention actual phone calls, visits, and emails. In a company with a head count of less than 90 people worldwide, that is a pretty daunting task, but it is doable. I write and record because I love to do it, and the secondary benefit is for the company and the branding worldwide. The product announcements stem from whatever we are doing at the time from gaskets, to injection molded panels, to our new Industrial Design Groups. Everything flows together. It just needs to be systematically utilized for the maximum effect. We will need to formalize the procedure of how, when, and with what the product is sent out, and that is one thing I will start working on right away. I want a system set up for advertising and branding so fewer things are left to chance. We can do this worldwide and we can start it right now.

Here is what we will send our people worldwide:

Hi everyone,

I have been giving a lot of thought to our overall advertising, marketing and world branding.

I want to create a formalized system where all of our customers worldwide get something from us in the form of a book or CD, product announcement, line card and sample every three months. I also want them all fol-

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lowed up either by phone or email. I know it is a lot of work and expensive, but I feel that it will reap many benefits.

We will send out the following: 2/1/09 – CD plus flyer plus sample and lines card 6/1/09 – CD plus Flyer plus sample and lines card 9/1/09 – New book plus Flyer plus sample and lines card 12/1/09 – CD plus Flyer plus sample and lines card After each mailing, all Ideal Jacobs companies will contact everyone to make sure they got it and also check if they need anything at this time. IJUS will prepare all of the materials and send them in bulk to the individual companies for their own distribution. Please make sure all of your contact lists are updated in the Filemaker Database so none will be missed.

The world is in turmoil and people need a place for security and the knowledge that they can rest easily. That happens when they call us. We just have to remind them that we are here and this will do it.

We are unique in our abilities to help our customers. Make sure they know it.

We got into Phoenix early this morning and by the time I got to Emerson, it was about 11:00 AM. As I signed in I heard two guys signing in with three other guys and it turned out we were all seeing the same buyer. I had come all the way from New Jersey and there was no way I wasn't going to see this man. I also had no plans for a group meeting with the other people. I asked one group if they were printers and they were packaging people – no competition for me. The others also were not printers so I relaxed and handed out my latest book to everyone. We were all getting along well by the time the buyer came out. He nicely apologized to me, saying he expected me later and asked if I could wait awhile. I said it was no problem and promptly set up an "office" at the nearby table that also had a phone. There was also a restroom nearby, which made for a very good situation. The receptionist, Joy, did justice to her name and helped me track down two other people I wanted to see. I had given her a copy of my book also, which I autographed later. The first person was an engineer who liked our company and loved Al, but had a problem with some rush charges. I said we would work it out and then I talked about our new product reduction program and he was interested, but not directly

involved in their team for that purpose. I called a member of that team I knew who also came down and explained how we wanted older products that we could analyze and redesign for cost reductions and then make the products. He said they were already doing that and I said we were coming from a non-traditional point of view and if we did not come up with significant savings then they had nothing to lose. He said that they would decide the reductions and then bid it out to their suppliers. I said I wasn't interested in being on their bid list and either they let us use our brains or I wasn't interested in being involved. I could tell it was unusual for him to have a supplier refuse to do as ordered, but it ended well. He may try us or not, depending on what comes up and if I made a big enough impression on him. You never know in this business.

The buyer came out again and we went to lunch. His plan was for one global supplier to take over the entire label related business worldwide to guarantee and regulate quality, inventory and supply-suitable pricing. We were able to do all of that and we will start exchanging information this week so I can put together a world proposal for them. It was a good meeting. We got back from lunch and I saw one more engineer who had a problem with spraying a conductive layer on a card cage that cost too much. I suggested an alternative material with a conductive plating layer and said I would send information. It would not be business for us, but he agreed to tell his cost reduction group that it was our idea if he took our suggestion.

Then it was back to the airport where I had little trouble going or coming which was amazing. I dropped off my car, bought food for dinner and here I sit at the gate. My plane is due to take off on time at 5:40 PM. I have about ninety minutes to go.

I spoke to the office, David, and Wendy. All are well and I look forward to my return.

11/3/08 8:42 PM EST In Flight to New Jersey

We have about three hours to go. I am sitting next to a pleasant woman named Carol. She is from New York and her husband is a retired dentist and full time inventor. It is amazing to actually speak to someone who has patented products and is making money from them. One of her sons is in the family business and he and his father seem to be getting along well. As a veteran of the family business adventures, I can tell by her voice that there have been some strains but both seem to be keeping their eye on the ball for keeping the business successful and their relationship intact. The father is about 65, which means that he could still be working for quite awhile. If they don't sell the business before that, as she mentioned, or bring in another son, then they

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will have an interesting transition as the years go by. I remember well how it was with my dad and even we had strains. I think we had one of the best generational transitions I have seen. We at least still have a relationship and can talk to each other, which is far more than most others, and the business not only survived but thrived through it. As is often the case, it may not even be up to the son and the father, but rather the son's wife and his mother. Family relationships are difficult enough on a normal basis, but add business to it and you are asking for a bundle of potential trouble.

I called Wendy earlier and she is laying out a turtle neck shirt and long underwear for me in case I want to ride outside tomorrow. It will probably be cold, but I still may want to take out Stella for a ride and clear my head. We have to get David and Stuart's trip going so I am hoping we can get more appointments locked down tomorrow. If it was just David, I could send him without anything official, but since Stuart is going it has to be more formal.

Tomorrow is Election Day here in the United States. Finally, it will be over one way or another. I have rarely seen such excitement or anticipation over an election, not only here but in other parts of the world. Everyone has taken a side and right now it looks like the Democrats will not only take the presidency, but also both houses of congress. If they do, then my taxes will probably increase, but I will make the best of it. Who knows, maybe Mr. Obama will do a good job. I obviously wish him well, but I do not have high expectations.

I am tired of sitting. I will work on my daily log, maybe edit or watch a movie on my computer. Home sounds good.

Newark Courthouse – Newark, NJ

Yesterday was an epic day in our lives for a few reasons. The first was that Al's first grandson was born and the second was that Mr. Obama was elected. The first is a joyous event and the second, I will keep my fingers crossed that in four years we say the same. In the meantime, we will take steps for the economic changes I believe are coming. Yesterday was spent trying to catch up from Monday's trip. It was hectic and ended with Eric, the Lexus salesman, bringing me my new car. David is getting my old one.

I got up at 3:30 AM and after the office and working out, I played tennis with Paul and then it was down to the courthouse. I was a little apprehensive about being able to find it again. It has been a few years since I last had jury duty, but it is my responsibility as a citizen, so here I am. My office is buzzing about the election and, as I said to people here, I hope in four years that Mr. Obama is seen as the best president since President Washington.

In the meantime, email is going on and we had to cancel the trip to Europe for David and Stuart. We could not nail down the trips enough to make it worthwhile so we postponed it. Unfortunately, Stuart had already booked his flight so I offered to reimburse him for any charges he lost. These things happen, especially in sales.

I had my triple-decker peanut butter and jelly sandwich for my second breakfast and I will feast upon the leftovers from last night's dinner and apple and insides for lunch. A group of us were sent up to the eleventh floor for some type of criminal case. I have become friendly with a few of the people, and as we waited we talked about the judicial system and some of its advantages and drawbacks. I have a theory that they had us wait so long as a psychological advantage for the judge and prosecutors to influence the defendant to accept a plea bargain. I think our presence helped them to come to a decision and we were sent back downstairs, back into the general pool. We will never know for certain, but that was my theory.

11/6/08

10:33 AM EST

Newark Courthouse – Newark, NJ

I was not called again yesterday and we were told to be here at 10:00 AM.

This morning I got up early, went to the office, played tennis, eventually got back to the office, picked up 3Gor and we drove to my house so he could pick up Kayla's car. His was too small to carry the needed parts and test equipment to go see a supplier in Long Island. I said goodbye to Kay, who is going to see Alex in St. Louis this weekend. She also has an interview at Washington University, Alex's school,

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which has moved up to her second choice. We all hope she gets into Cornell early decision next month. It will make things much easier. We have now been called to a jury and are waiting outside the courtroom. I have the feeling the people inside are still negotiating a deal before going to trial. Having a jury waiting outside can only pressure the defense people because once we go through the door to the courtroom, I believe, the trial has to happen.

It is a little frightening here. The thought that your freedom could be taken away for a long period of time is horrible and being around it is a little worrisome.

11/6/08 12:49 PM EST Newark Court House – Newark, NJ

We were brought into the courtroom and a pleasant, but very tough judge read us the rules of the court. Right before lunch he asked for people who thought they had enough hardships to be excused. A bunch of people raised their hands, and they stayed behind while the rest of us left. We go back in forty minutes to start the selection. I have no reason to be excused, so if they want me, they've got me.

11/9/08 9:53 PM EST Home, NJ

As it turned out I was picked for the jury last Thursday. The judge went through the questions and I answered them all as truthfully as possible, knowing that I would be picked. I figured if they wanted me, then so be it. I had never been on a jury before and it was part of my civic duty to do so. There were unfortunately a lot of people excused. At the end of the day, we were still short on people so I have to go back this Wednesday to finish the process. After we get fourteen people, the prosecutor and defense attorneys start the process of excusing people they don't want as jurors. I am not sure what will happen, but I am prepared to serve I am needed. I am not sure if they will need me because I would definitely fight if I thought the person was either guilty or not guilty and I am not very easily persuaded so the defense or prosecution may not want me. I ended the day by going back to the office before going home. I do not go back until next Wednesday.

Friday morning, I played tennis with my brother and then it was up to the Berkshires with Wendy. We got up there around 1:00 and I had a few hours to go ride my bike and decompress. It usually takes some time, and by dinner with Wendy's parents, the office had pretty much shut down for the weekend and I was relaxed and enjoying myself.

Saturday morning, Wendy and I had breakfast and then I went riding again. My timing was almost perfect as the rain did not start until

I was most of the way done. When I got back I had a snack and went to pick up David for lunch. It was pleasant and we spoke about family and the current economy. I thought the major car companies in the U.S. should be allowed to go bankrupt, but he didn't. No one would bail Ideal Jacobs out and I did not think anyone else should, but apparently I am in the minority on that point.

Mr. Obama takes office early next year and he has his work cut out for him. So far, even though I did not vote for him, I like what I see. Saturday night, we had dinner with friends and I got up at 6:00 AM this morning to go biking again. I thought it would be very cold, but when I actually got outside it was warmer, which made the ride even more pleasant. It was a gorgeous, late fall New England day and the scenery was spectacular. Wendy had breakfast with her parents and we were on the road toward home shortly after 10:00 AM. Amazingly, our representative was answering his email and said we should have an answer this week. I cannot attack without their money commitment so we will have to wait for that.

Today was a big day. David, Vin, and I went to Bell labs to do the first on-site product review for our new cost reduction program. We did not have a good idea of what to expect, but happily, I picked a good man. Cliff was very nice to open his product area and let us look around. We asked him where his problems were and he had a few where I think we can be of help. One is for a new part to augment a problem door, the other is for a new EMI shield covering, and a third is potential gasket use. It was a very good start to this new program and gave us all more confidence that we can contribute to what is needed and create new business for ourselves.

We had put in over a million dollars of estimates with another cus-

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tomer for different types of suitcases to carry equipment and display cases. The customer said they could not afford the outlay at this point; they are the corporate center for marketing so I suggested I re-price both groups so we would become the distribution center, gather the orders and ship in small quantities. The buyer agreed to listen to the proposal so we are busy gathering revised prices for small quantities and should be able to re-quote later in the week. This is the same company that gave us the biggest order we ever had in 2001 and actually took us out of debt for our plant in New Jersey. Creative financing and thinking is ever more important with the economy as it is, so we need to stay loose and on our toes if we plan to move into new areas.

We got the files for the two parts we wanted to cost reduce from Cliff today. We started work on the door modifications and sent them to Eric to begin the renderings. We are going to need some help from Cliff on the EMI Shield Door before going ahead on that. Ben asked me to contact a man from Andrew Corp. regarding our new program. It turned out that he is now head of engineering and was very interested. He gave me contacts to his directors in three countries and said he plans to meet with Ben when he goes to Asia this month. We all decided we needed a formal presentation for our people for this area so I began working on it tonight. For the contacts in the U.S. and France I may still go myself, but for China, Ben will need to do it himself unless I can get over there from India. The learning curve for all of us will have to be fast on this one, both to hold our credibility and to gather in the business as quickly as possible. I asked the man for a contact for their people in India, but he did not answer back. I may have pushed too hard. It can be a problem when you are aggressive. I hope it turns out alright with him.

Newark County Courthouse – Newark, NJ

My fellow jurors and I are waiting for the courtroom to open so that more people can be chosen. Some will be challenged and hopefully the jury will be set by early afternoon.

I got up early this morning, went to the office, played tennis with my coach, went back to the office for a second breakfast, and then came down here to the courthouse. I have a lot of work to do, so I will try to be efficient. Right now, I am at the far end of a long hallway. There is no room for me on the side where the courtroom and everyone else is, so I have to keep watch to know when to enter. On

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the other hand, it is quiet and that is nice. Now I am going to write out the copy for the new Industrial Design Presentation. I started it last night and hope to have a draft ready to get to Mike later today. I hope to be back in the office by 5:15 tonight. I will not go to acupuncture because Steve's babysitter cancelled on him, so I will have some time before Wendy and I go out to dinner.

We got into the court room, but the system is backed up so we need to go back at 10:45. I am hoping we get enough jurors by lunch so they can start the challenges this afternoon.

11/12/08 9:50 PM EST Home, NJ

It turns out that I got through the selection process and am now on the jury. The instructions from the judge were explicit: don't talk about the case, and don't even think about it. Let the information come into our brains, process it and then talk about it as a group to reach a decision. It is a heavy responsibility and I take it very seriously. Tomorrow morning, we will hear a testimony then hopefully make a decision late tomorrow, if not Friday or Monday. The two alternates will not be chosen until after the trial is ready for the jury to decide. It is good to be over with the selection process and now that I am a part of it, things are getting interesting. I look forward to a good experience and a fair decision.

Meanwhile, Ideal Jacobs moves on and we are pushing to get our first cost reduced amplifier panel ready for the approval process. We have the okay from the end user, now we need the AL engineer to agree to review and test it. That is Sue's area and mine, if she can't get through.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average dropped more than 400 points today. The federal bailout program that was originally set up has been modified, and I don't think investors liked it. Many companies are also having problems – especially the American car companies – so things have not yet gotten to the bottom. So far, there has been no word from my bank on the building loan, and I can't move without them. Interesting times we live in.

11/13/08 7:34 PM EST Home, NJ

We finally got a jury seated by late yesterday afternoon. There were only two challenges by the prosecution, which meant they were excused and two new jurors were put in. We got out around 4:00 PM, so I rushed back to the office and eventually had dinner with Wendy.

I got up at 3:30 AM this morning, went to the office, to tennis, back to the office, and onward to the courthouse in Newark. Once

again, they started later then they had planned, and we finally got going around 10:30 AM. As it turned out, there were only three witnesses, closing arguments and the judge told us what was expected at about 4:00 PM. Now that it is over, I can tell you about it. The case involved a young man who was charged with forgery, passing bad checks and identity theft. By the time we retired to the jury room, we were all tired and anxious to get the job done. I suggested we take a preliminary vote on the five counts and it turned out that was basically 8-4 in favor of a guilty sentence. But I have to hand it to the people who thought he was innocent, because as they explained their side, some of us, including me, agreed with them and changed our votes to not guilty. It was not a matter of thinking the young man was innocent, because we really didn't, but the prosecution and defense seemed so incompetent and so many questions were unanswered that we could not say we felt there was enough information to convict him. The only way that justice was done was it may have taught both lawyers to be more thorough, and maybe the young man saw the error of his ways. I also saw the power of having a great attorney and if I am ever in that situation, I want the best I can get. The jury I was on was filled by a group of really good people who wanted to do an excellent job. We proved the system worked in that the man was tried by a jury of his peers and that is the most you can ask of any system. I will also say that the incredibly slow pace of the proceedings was close to driving us all crazy and not having to go back for three years is a good thing. It was an interesting experience and I am glad it is done. I did my civic duty and feel really good about it. I bypassed the office and went straight home. It turned out that my son, Ben, was home for dinner and it was great seeing him. He looks fantastic and I am scheduled to meet him on Sunday to record with Rabbi Cohen.

Tomorrow, I will try to catch up and see where everything stands. So far, next week appears to be normal, which will be nice since the last couple have been on the crazy side.

11/15/08 12:51 PM EST Maplewood Train Station – Maplewood, NJ

Today has finally come – I am actually going into Manhattan by myself to go visit Jed Distler. It is something about New York and the foreboding nature of the place that has me apprehensive. This is opposed to the thrill and exhilaration I have in facing other cities around the world. This one, the closest, a 40 minute train ride, is the one that seems to evoke nerves. But no matter, I wanted to see Jed and I always try and face my fears so New York is where I will go. I have prepared for this four hour journey much like I prepare for any other. I have my laptop case with me, filled with various types of safety and health

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items and of course an umbrella and covering for my case in the event of rain. Jed was very nice and said he would meet me in Penn Station so that, unless I can't find him, there is almost no chance of me getting lost since New York City is his home turf. I have work to do on the way in and out. I need to work on the script for the taping tomorrow. My questions are not finished and it needs some work before I am ready. I did check with my son Ben and he is set for the session so it looks good. We will begin tomorrow in Rabbi Cohen's office at about 1:00 PM.

It is starting to get crowded on this train platform. A lot of people love going into the city, so why do I have a problem with it? There are a lot of old inner stuff coming out regarding fears I had when I was younger that I never had to deal with because I have successfully avoided New York in almost all of my dealings. Happily, I like traveling, and going to cities all over the world. The first time always causes some anxiety, but it usually fades quickly to enjoyment or at least a medium level of acceptance once I am there. I have found that most places have something to offer and the trick is finding it. In my area, those benefits are often very different from everyone else's.

For instance, in Hong Kong, there is a great coffee shop where I can usually get sandwiches. I enjoy walking along the incredible harbor and there is the hotel in which I like to stay. In Paris, I love to walk around the Eiffel Tower area. It is truly beautiful and I never tire of it.

Back to reality. I just boarded the train and so far so good. I am in a two-seater alone. My ticket is out, but I am watching carefully to make sure only the conductor takes it. My paranoia is higher because I am not in my usual suit and tie in which I command more respect than the golf shirt and pants I wear now. That uniform helps to make a man and it is one reason I have no problem wearing the suit of armor that is part of my normal apparel. It is very warm today, however – mid 60s in the middle of November – so it is just as well I am wearing as little as I am. The train is filled with families and I can hear the sounds of happy children on their way to the big city and adventure. As is usual, I have already checked with two people to make sure I am on the right train. I am glad Jed is picking me up.

It is time to focus on something productive. The script below is for tomorrow. I was having some trouble trying to figure out whether to talk about tough times from a financial, moral, relationship or basic survival point of view. I realized that I was working on two different scripts at the same time. The business one will have to be separate, and the one for tomorrow with Dan will need to be about how to handle things mentally.

Times are tough, really tough, and maybe as bad as the Great Depression. What do you do when your job is threatened, or worse, lost? How do you handle it when you and your family are being mentally slammed down

from the constant downsizing, cost cutting and bad news everywhere? Is there any way out on a temporary or permanent basis? Let's talk about it. We are the Sunday Night Lifeguards.

I'm Andrew Jacobs, back again with Rabbi Daniel Cohen. Hi Dan,

1. What is trouble to you?

To me, tough times are defined by an inability to utilize my mind and my body, and when my health is in jeopardy.

In other words, if I can function, I believe I can work enough so that things will be okay. Real problems, to me, include when me or my family are sick, when someone I care about is in trouble, or when I am having business setbacks.

I have an advantage of some history since my grandfather started our company in 1921 and my dad was a young boy during the Great Depression. I grew up hearing stories about what happened, how they dealt with it and the means necessary to get by and thrive.

They called it the Great Depression because a dark caste had fallen over the entire country and the world. Many were experiencing that futile feeling of not being able to control their own destiny. There seemed no chance for a better life and many were worried about where they would live and how they would eat.

2. How do you go about dealing with an overall riding feeling that you can't do anything?

Many people were immobilized with fear; everything they had known was no longer solid. They had few examples of success since so many were affected, but some people did better than just survive, some of the biggest companies in our country were started during those Depression years.

3. What does it take to decide that everyone else is wrong? When can you know it is right to go against the common beliefs of what is true?

4. How do you find the courage to go against it? To dare to hope to not only survive but also do better than you might have done before and those around you?

5. How do you know when you are doing it right?

6. Let's talk about faith. How does it fit in here? Story about jury service: people are willing to give up a few days pay when

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they are not making much, but still have faith in the system and believe that their participation was their duty and they would want others to support them if they were charged. We were all there because we wanted someone else to do the same for us. We were working for the common good. There was no profit involved. People were losing money, but it was a higher ideal. People had faith in the system and each other.

7. What lessons in history parallel the times we have now?

8. What can be learned from the people who went through it before? Talk about the immigrants in this country. Not only did they have little if no money they did not even speak the language and they were willing to face death to get here. They did not want guarantees, just the chance to make it. The "American Dream" was not a handout rather it was an opportunity to be able to make something of themselves and profit directly from the effort they put out.

9. What is surviving? What is thriving? How do you know when it works? How do you know when you have won? When do you feel happy about what you have accomplished?

Define what is necessary for survival, what it will cost in terms of effort and resources to get there. In the case of the immigrants, it was simple. They did not have money, but they were willing to work. Perhaps that time has come around again.

Maybe it is time to clarify what is important and then allow ourselves the luxury of feeling good about accomplishing it.

It is a redefined system of values: less consumerism, fewer things; more emphasis on what happens from the inside out.

10. What makes us happy and gives us pleasure?

11. What are people remembered for?

They are not remembered for making money as much as what they did for others and left behind, helping people in education, the arts, building companies that employed others, giving people the opportunity to help themselves.

Survival comes first and surviving is a very big deal. It means a level of success and it should be thought of as such. Being able to feed and clothe yourself and your family and to afford a place to live is an accomplishment. It may have been downplayed recently, but its worth cannot be denied.

12. What is taking care of yourself worth to you and your family?

13. What happens when you lose your job? Is it the worst thing that could have happened or the best? Are you now in position to go after something better or worse? Was trying for your dream job because you thought you had to play it safe stopping you from moving to a different place?

14. When is the worst thing that could have happened turn out to be the best?

Things often happen for a reason, but you need to step back and look for that reason. Maybe it is time to move.

We are talking about a changing of expectations and levels of success.

15. How to we change those definitions within ourselves?

Dan, please tell the story about the Rabbi and the congregant who came to him because his house was too small and he was going crazy. The Rabbi kept telling him to add animals inside the house until here was no room for anything and then told him to get the animals out and the same house that seemed impossibly crowded before will seem like it has a lot of room.

16. Even harder, how do we change those definitions in others namely our spouses, children, relatives and everyone else?

Looking like a failure in someone else's eyes can be more devastating than your own.

17. Less clothes, no vacations, not going to more expensive schools, living within the means of what reality are what we are focusing on now. Is that strength or weakness?

18. Do lowered expectations mean failure or do they simply mean change?

19. If you can't afford a new car, but you now have time to see your kid's ball games are you still successful?

20. If you can't go away for a two week vacation, but can still find enjoyment in being with your friends for an afternoon in the park or a barbecue in your backyard still successful?

The world is filled with choices, perhaps one has been made for you for now, you either have to downsize a little or downsize a lot, it can bring with it huge amounts of stress, disappointment and pressure to try and stay where you were. But it also gives you the chance to reevaluate what is a really important.

As sappy as it sounds, hearing your children say they love you and watching them smiling and laughing is just as important if not more so than the promotion you may not get now. Being hugged by your spouse and everyone planning for what can be done instead of lamenting as to what can't is just as important as the vacation you can no longer afford.

21. Look around, what good is in front of you? What do you already have that you have been ignoring because you did not have the time or it did not seem as important?

22. Dan, List the 5 most important things to you.

In my case, they are:

- 1. My family
- 2. Our health
- 3. Our ability to utilize the chances to succeed
- 4. To enjoy the journey, laugh and have fun
- 5. To do the best we can

None of the items on that list concern money, they only deal with the chances to use what we have to do the best we can.

Think about what matters to you. Think about what you already have. Re-evaluate what is important to you, not what others say you should care about. If your friends are not supportive then find new friends. If you are unhappy with your situation, try and look at the good parts and if you are not satisfied, utilize your strengths, work harder and go for a long-term gradual betterment of your circumstances. No quick fix is worth anything. The journey is 95% of any project, the final victory or defeat is often such a small part of the adventure that the results are simply used to launch into another endeavor. If we are fortunate, it is a long road and can be filled with the joys we wish to see. For Rabbi Daniel Cohen, I'm Andrew Jacobs and we are the Sunday Night Lifeguards.

We got in on schedule and as I got up to the train station from the platform, I saw a guy in an orange jacket. He looked a little greyer, as do I, but basically the same and immediately we were talking about everything. We walked outside to look for a place to get coffee and ended up walking for about twenty minutes. New York has a vibrancy that can be felt everywhere. The people seem to move with an electric step, moving quickly as if they all have an appointment

that could change their lives for the better. We eventually landed at a café. We had a wonderful talk about politics, business, where we were both heading, life, spouses (he had been married for a 28 years), acupuncture, medication, parents, finances, and music. I had always remembered him as a musician and that is both his way to make a living and his passion. The years peeled away as we spoke and both of us reminisced about a 6th grade book report we had done together forty years ago and how much fun it had been for both of us. His passion for art and to perform has never dimmed and we both had, at various times, tried to have our own radio shows. There was a sense of peace about him. He was doing as he wanted, as am I, which made it a very positive experience for both of us.

The time came to walk back to Penn Station and it was obvious from the drop in temperature and the newly laden cloud cover that Wendy's information about a storm coming for late afternoon was accurate. by the middle of next month. With Alex's help, this project should be ready much earlier for next year, but I seem to say that every year so we will see. I have had a lot of fun today and I hope for a long, peaceful night's sleep. I have a lot to do tomorrow.

After breakfast, sharing pancakes with Bailey, tennis and a great bike ride in the invigorating cool autumn air outside, I had lunch and made my way to the temple. Armed with lunch for Ben and Dan, I arrived at Dan's office and happily saw my daughter Kayla, who works there, and another young man whose father was killed in the collapse of the Twin Towers on 9/11. That event will always be personal for me. I knew two people who died that day and I will never forget what it meant to this young man's family as they rebuilt themselves in the years since it happened. As it turned out, I had also seen his sister on the way in and happily, they both seemed fine.

Kayla was going to go shopping with her cousin Jessica for the afternoon, but a bad headache had cancelled her plans and she left shortly after seeing me to go home.

Ben, Dan and I spent the next ninety minutes re-working the script and taping. I originally planned to interview Dan about handling tough times, but he thought it better with him asking me questions about business and the general working environment. It seemed to go well and I will happily leave it with Ben to edit and add music. He is fantastic in his chosen field.

If things go as planned, this will be my first normal week in awhile and I am looking forward to getting a lot done.

I had two conversations with the bank, and the bottom line was

that we have to occupy 51% of the place and they want me to sign for the building personally. I emailed my landlord, who would have to let me out of our lease and I do not know why he would want to do that. I will offer him a good deal as my partner in the new building, but I doubt it will be enough. In the meantime, we will keep moving ahead. I agreed to purchase the expensive cable testing equipment and the balance of the new laser was paid from the credit line. I hope I am right regarding the marketplace – or at least right enough.

I spoke with my landlord. He cannot let us out of the lease. Our exposure is too high, so I told the bank to forget it. There is more space in our current building and we will look at it next week. I actually feel better now that it is decided. Going into that much debt at a time like this was very risky. Our crew here is doing well and picking up the slack. The economy seems to be getting worse, which means it is an excellent time for us to expand into it to take market shares. I am finding it a fascinating and overall an enjoyable adventure.

Vin, Mike and I went to Bell Labs to see one of the engineers about reviewing his product line for cost reduction and another man to work out the cable assembly problems we have been having. As it turned out, the first man was not there because he had to take his mother to the hospital. But as it happens, I did see Cliff going out to lunch and was able to talk to him about the door support job. He said he was making some progress and apparently we were already making him a sample. Eric had told Alex to do it, so we are further ahead than I thought. I am hoping the sample will swing the job. We are working on the EMI Door Shield for Cliff as well and are making changes to the new rendering from Eric.

We saw the cable man and his buyer and they could not have been nicer or more helpful. They want us to do this, were not surprised at the problems we were having and gave us renewed hope that we can do this. The supplier who did the job for us was apologetic about the problems and we all agreed to work together to get things going.

The weather has turned cold here. It was around freezing with a heavy wind chill. I had on two pairs of socks, thermal boots, long johns, sweat pants, three shirts and my wind breaker when Uncle Dave and I rode this morning. Added to that were heavy gloves (which felt more like medium thickness once I got going), a thermal facemask, goggles and a helmet. In my backpack, I had an extra sweatshirt and gloves. Normally I get to the meeting place a little early, which gives me time

to go to the local stream to look for fish. Today, Uncle Dave met me partway up the hill that I was going down, so I suggested we go view the fish anyway and he agreed. The water looked cold and we did not see any fish, so we pushed onward. Our conversation focused on the economy from the beginning. He is in real estate and printing, and times are tough for both. We spoke about my decision not to buy the building and he mostly agreed with my assessment that now was not the time to be bringing on more debt. I am a streak seller and sell best from a position of strength. Heavy debt is a weakness in my eyes that drives one towards panic and that is not a good place for me. I have decided to wait a few years. Our lease is up in four and a half and we have to start moving in three and a half to see what is around then. Right now, according to Uncle Dave, there is a lot of space available and prices are going down. Waiting awhile is probably not a bad thing, and since I am going to do it anyway, it is a most point. We are hardly standing still. Our new laser came in yesterday and I also gave the okay to buy the testing equipment needed for the new cable assembly area. We will know how much additional space we can get in our building in two weeks, which will make my landlord very happy. We also plan to set up our new overall system with the various new product lines and space, and will work it out to our best advantage. From my phone calls yesterday and my overall feeling for how things are going, I would say that the overall financial situation will continue to go down for a while. Having taken over the AL Industrial Design group seems to have been a very good move for us. It has given us the legitimacy to go into companies and offer suggestions for reducing their costs, solving problems and brings business to us.

I have coined a new phrase for what we do. We are now called "generalists" people whose disciplines have a little knowledge covering a lot of areas. It is enough to be able to cross over the lines to reach new ideas and ways of doing things and we will hopefully remember the limitations of our knowledge base. I am also instituting a new type of training, which I call "dry firing." Dry firing, relating to firearms, means to train without live ammunition. For selling it is the same idea: getting ready for sales without actually being in a selling situation. For those watching me, it is simple. They watch what I do. When we are in a non-selling situation, we create one by going anywhere and asking the following questions for any situation involving equipment or people:

What are the problems? What are the needs? How are they being handled now? How can they be handled better? Identifying the elements involved Setting up solutions Selling those solutions I plan to use this extensively when I go to India and in all the training I do from now on. It is like on the crime show where they say they are gathering evidence. We are taking in all of the visual cues of a situation, processing them, asking questions to create a plan to help whoever is involved. It is the details, it is the problems, and it is the act of questioning that brings out the possible solutions. I want to bring the confidence level of our people past asking the standards of what you need and where your problems are, to seeing where they work, the products in which they are involved, and really getting down to helping with the actual problems. Cost cutting is a major deal and will become bigger. Those who can think, reduce costs and give better solutions will thrive and that is where I want to be, and that is the reason for the spread-out of product offerings. We need to be multidisciplined in order to be able to get to an overall solution.

After I got home, I had lunch, signed some books (I have about 250 left), and spent the afternoon with Wendy. She had the great idea to go to Hoboken to take Ben out to dinner, but we could not work it out. She and I will go out together instead, which is not a problem. I like spending time with her.

Ben is coming for lunch tomorrow so we will get a chance to see him then. Kayla is also due back in the afternoon. She is on a retreat with the temple and is presumably having a great time with her friends. She got into Rutgers, which is a very good school. I did not get in there when I was applying to colleges. She will find out about Cornell in the middle of next month, but she's gotten into her first school and I hope that will take some of the pressure off. I spoke to Alex today. He sounded wonderful and is due home on Tuesday for Thanksgiving.

If things become unstable there, we will need to take precautions quickly to make sure we are covered as much as possible. It is good that we are meeting next month. These are scary times in some ways, and exhilarating in others.

I played tennis with my regular Monday morning partner and he got hurt today. Besides a hernia, which I knew he had, he had pulled his groin muscle. He is out for at least a few days, but I hope he is okay.

David was in today and we worked on the new "generalist" idea and forensic selling. Amongst other things, we went onto one of our customers' websites, brought up some pictures of his products and figured out some possible solutions to problems he may have. I emailed the customer and he replied saying we would talk next week. Since he did not say no, I am counting it as at least a partial success. I am extremely heartened at the potential. I also called and emailed some other potential people for business, and the possibilities seem positive.

We sent the door support sample to the engineer at AL today and he was very happy with it. He needs to go through the buyer, we shall see if it goes anywhere. We also sent the same man the EMI Door Shield renderings we created and he sent back the target price. He was worried that our tooling would make it too expensive, but since we planned to use our new laser and did not need any, we seem to have a chance there. This engineer was also extremely helpful and wrote an email saying we were accepted as potential vendors for all types of product review and production, which we sent to the people at AL in China. We hope it is enough for them to allow us to try in other areas besides labels.

We had our annual Thanksgiving feast today in the office and people brought in an amazing assortment of food. I not only ate one dessert, but two – something they had not seen me do before. Wendy came also, and it was a very good time.

It turns out I need a visa for India, so David and I went to get pictures today. He will probably go with me. My passport application also went out. Happily, Indy checked before it was too late.

The government bailed out Citi Bank today, and the stock market liked it. Our new president is talking about handouts to the car companies. He may end up being okay. I don't understand bailing them out, since the government did once for Chrysler and it did not seem to help.

We need to keep pressing on our sales. The market is ready to break for us with our new areas; we just have to keep going after them. We are offering the right products at the right time, we just have to execute in as many companies and areas as possible.

The new laser is causing a lot of buzz and I am excited to see it in production. So far, our financial position is good. We will have to layout almost \$300,000 in new equipment for the last six months

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of this year. If I am right, they will help position us well for the next few years.

I miss her.

There was a major terrorist attack in Mumbai, India today. It is still going on. A lot of people were hurt and killed. Now comes the hard question for me: do we cancel the trip or not? I emailed with Ben and the hotel he stayed in was one of those attacked by the terrorists. They are apparently targeting the English and Americans. I emailed Tushar, who is in India, and he said to wait a few days to see if we should still come over. Our plans were to go through the airport as a stopover, but not stay there. Is it safe to stop there? Is it safe to go there at all? I don't like to think that I am bullied from doing anything. I also don't want to take unnecessary chances. We will wait until Tuesday. If we don't make this trip, it will be awhile before I try to go back. In the meantime, Ben is still stranded in Thailand. The airport is blocked by anti-government demonstrators. I hope he can get out soon.

It would be easy to turn our back on all of it and just stay in the reasonably safe places where we feel comfortable, but unfortunately, that is what most people will do. I don't like feeling afraid and normally force myself to move forward. We will wait a few days.

11/27/08 10:38 PM

Thanksgiving Day – Home, NJ

I got up this morning after sleeping until 7:45 and, after breakfast, went biking with Uncle Dave. It was not terribly cold out, so I did not need a mask or goggles. We had a pleasant ride and I spent the rest of

the afternoon eating and relaxing. Family time began arriving around 2:00 PM and Thanksgiving was wonderful. The emails began again tonight, with Ben still stuck in Thailand. The government, it seems, will intervene. Ben says things are getting worse. He cannot get out by plane, bus or train and he is prepared to wait it out. He says some of the foreigners at his hotel are becoming unsettled and the chances for big trouble are increasing as the government prepares to intervene. The news in India is much worse with the terrorist attack in Mumbai almost over, but with more than 100 people killed. Wendy is very concerned and is hoping I don't go. I have to think after this that security will be greatly tightened and things will be much more secure, but you never know. There is a lot of trouble of all kinds out there and here, but we can't stop moving because we are afraid.

The terrorists in Mumbai took over a Jewish center and executed five people. It is now apparent that they were not only looking for Americans and the English, but also Jews. I have gone from being worried and scared to angry, and now I want to go to prove to myself and my crew that we will not be intimidated. There are places in the world I will not go, but that is because they are dangerous for everyone. Being targeted does not sit well and I am now leaving the decision up to Tushar and Indy. Unless the government bans us from going, then we are on. I called Jon, my self-defense trainer, and we began lessons again today. I had stopped because of a nerve injury in my arm. I always call him when I am feeling afraid for whatever reason. Right now, it is India and I am glad he was in. Practicing against an attacker is a good way to regain the level of self-confidence needed when traveling. I am glad he is on my side. Even though I biked today with Uncle Dave and was already tired, I am glad for the second workout. The soreness felt good and meant I accomplished something. I will try to see him again before I leave next Saturday.

I heard from Hayden Tiger, one of my best friends from high school. He received a copy of my latest book and emailed his thanks. He is a good man and I wish him the best. He married young, has four children, with that same wife and seems very happy. He is a good role model for his and everyone else's children.

We had a second Thanksgiving celebration tonight at Barbara and Cliff's house. This was the fifth day in a row that I have had roast turkey and although I really like it and eat it often, I am prepared to take a break from it for the next few days.

Ben mentioned that the Chinese government was sending over planes to Thailand to get the Chinese visitors out. There has been no

word as to exactly when they will arrive. I marvel at Ben's patience. I would most probably be going nuts by this time.

11/29/08 9:41 AM EST Home, NJ

It is Saturday morning. Wendy and I went out to breakfast. Part of our conversation was about my trip to India and why I felt it was necessary. She doesn't want me to go because she's afraid of what could happen. I brought up the risks of other areas where I travel and how some are off-limits, like parts of South America and the former Soviet Union. She was more concerned with what was happening now and I fully understand her apprehension. I am thankful she is concerned for my safety. Something inside me, however, rebels at the idea of not being able to go where I wish to conduct business. It also would not look good to my team if I seemed afraid of going into certain areas, especially one where we already have people living. Tushar lives in India now. I was, however, okay with emailing Tushar this morning and seeing if we could avoid going through Mumbai at all. I just don't want to feel locked out of a whole country. I have not heard back yet. The current financial turmoil in the world is not going to help matters and as things continue to get worse for a while, then stability and safety will get bad in all areas where the power resides. It is a time of extreme confusion and new leaders will rise to the surface, some good and some bad. We will have to deal with them as they happen.

Being in India with two natives can only, in my mind, be a help. Wendy asked if I would contact the state department regarding any warnings for U.S. travelers for India. I will of course, but probably not until Tuesday. I know she always worries when I am away from home, and this trip will be worse than usual. I am sorry about that, but bad things can happen anywhere. As a believer in fate, if I was meant to be in India and I don't go, than I risk just as much by being here. I am on a path I will follow unless

Tushar, Indy, the U.S. Government or another attack intervene to stop me.

I got word from Ben that he has a seat on a plane out of an alternative site in Thailand. It took him four hours to get to the military airport, three hours to get a boarding pass and then the plane was delayed ten hours. At least he is safe and has a way out. Unfortunately, he has not eaten for ten hours and I am not sure what food is available. He says he is just happy to have a way home. Meanwhile, 2000 security forces have surrounded the demonstrators at one of the main airports in Thailand and the protestors have reportedly kidnapped a policeman. This is looking worse all the time and it could have a very bloody ending. The government cannot allow this to keep going for

much longer. Too many foreigners have been trapped with no way to get out and the government is looking very bad. Meanwhile, on a happier note, we are going to a Bar Mitzvah tonight for my cousin, Jeff's youngest child, Danny. He is the last of that generation and it is great fun to have everyone together. It is especially joyous because it again signified the end of the family feud that plagued us for over two decades. Although my uncle has passed, the memories of my dad and he warring still remain. I am very happy to see them fade as the years pass by and celebrations like these occur where all sides are together.

My body hurts from yesterday's workout with Jon, as I knew it would. Whenever you exercise muscles in a different way, there is always pain to account for later. It doesn't bother me. In fact, I rather enjoy the sensation of being back in training. Being able to handle myself, at least to some degree, gives me comfort when going into potentially difficult situations. You never know how you will react in any given moment, and the best you can hope for is to have the option to make the decision of whether to go with the flow, submit, fight, run or do whatever can be done. Given the choice, I would go as fully armed as possible, but that is not an option, which means that running away is a totally suitable alternative and in no way denotes cowardice.

Still, I will go biking again with Uncle Dave this morning, which means it will hurt for a while before my body loosens up. It is well worth it; not only being with him, but also being outside and burning calories, which will mean I can eat well at tonight's celebration. I have been monitoring my weight and so far I am fine. It is a throwback to the days when I was "hefty" and I never lost the self-image of myself being fat. Being made fun of when I was a child is something I will never forget. You have no idea of the joy I get seeing the people and their type, who used to ridicule me, look now forty years later: overweight, out of shape and looking much older than I do. They did me a giant favor and in a reverse way I am most appreciative, but am also not sad about the way they turned out. I do not pretend to be the nicest guy in the world. I am intolerant of idiocy and people who get in my way. I especially can't stand those who will not let me help them so they can help me in return. I have the audacity and confidence to think I know what is better for most people than they do. Life is all about perspective. One man's view of conceit is another's view of confidence, one's opinion of what should be done is another's path to doing it. We are not on this earth to watch and be led; we are here to make things happen in a good way for ourselves and those around us. Being citizens of society brings with it the responsibility of using our brains, trying new things, challenging ourselves and being willing to put ourselves "out there" with the risk of failure. When we abrogate those duties, we deserve what happens to us.

I was just emailing with Al, who has been in Europe with Mel to see their new grandson. They have been gone almost two weeks and I miss her. While our people have taken up the slack, she is definitely a vital part of our team and I look forward to Monday morning and seeing her back at her desk.

We got the price for the 3000 sq. ft. from our landlord for us to expand. It is too expensive so we are looking elsewhere. Uncle Dave is on the hunt.

I have cancelled the Shanghai portion of the trip to India, which is better for everyone. I hope I can still get on the same planes and in the same hotels for the balance of the week, as I hope for Tushar and Indy. I am focusing on selling, which is very tiring, but extremely necessary. Our VPs and people at IJX, IJM, and IJN can handle things there. My job is rainmaker for the world; that is where I do best, as well as the overall of world expansion and keeping an eye on things. Al is back and I had no great list of problems. Our crew is doing well and covered for her with little trouble on a short-term basis. The plan is that when anyone of us is out for a week or two, then the others take care of things, and so far that seems to be the case. I am proud of

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my teams. There are nine days until Kayla hears from her first choice school. I hope she gets in.

The new laser is almost ready for testing, which will be very cool once it is in full operation. The stock market is making very wide swings. The auto companies, as well as others, are trying to get bailouts or loans. There is a big shakeout across the world. I hope it is our time for profitable expansion.

The crisis in Thailand appears to be over. The Prime Minister and most of his people have been kicked out and a caretaker government is being formed. Both national airports are back in operation. The main questions are if the new government forming can last and what political and economic repercussions will follow from the overthrow. I am very thankful it was done without violence, and I hope that continues.

Wednesday night is usually date night for Wendy and I. We have dinner and it is our time during the week to have an hour alone together. She has been very worried with the recent events in India, and since I am going there this weekend, she asked me two things. The first was not to wear my lewish Star and the second was to promise that if it became necessary, I would forget about my plans and the cost and get out of India immediately. I responded by handing her my chain with both the Star of David medallion and my amethyst crystal that I got from a medical intuitive. I find it amazing that the two things I normally take when I travel, which are my U.S. passport and my Star of David, were both means of identifying who to kill in the last attack in Mumbai. What is wrong with all of us, that belonging to a religious group or being a resident of a particular country is enough to sort you out for death? What a horrible thing to have my family think about when I am traveling, and how uncaring of me not to decide to strip myself of it in advance. I can't go without the passport, and I am proud to be an American and Jewish. I do not go with the standard advice of saying I am from Canada or that I am not lewish. I believe in saying who I am, but advertising it is a different matter. Like it or not, some people hate Americans and will kill them for that reason alone. Some people hate Jews and will do the same thing. I carry a U.S. passport and there is nothing I will do about that, but maybe the time has come to leave the chain permanently off as a constant reminder that instead of setting myself apart as a lew, I should be trying to get along as a member of the human race. There is no glory in dying because I declare myself a lew, but there is a lot of good in trying to make the world a better place for all of us and trying to get along. There is a big difference between being submissive and working towards unity; be-

ing afraid to work together and working toward a better world where religion is not a separating issue; moving ahead with our lives and doing what is right versus being terrorized.

My chain is a symbol of how I am different, but perhaps it is time to promote being the same.

I am in full traveling mode and getting ready to leave Saturday night. I gathered most of my clothes to bring into the office tomorrow, so they are for the week I get back. I like to be prepared.

I spoke to Steve, my acupuncturist, today. His health is not great and he has to cut back some of his hours, which includes coming up to this area twice a week. Neither of us wants to stop, so he will come up once every two weeks and make house calls, which will include my office. It might work out even better than before. He is a good man and I want to keep him on my team.

A designer/customer was in today with a new order for motorcycle parts. We spoke about some joint production and distribution possibilities and I will have our people here and in Europe check the possibility of customizing accessory parts for motorcycle groups. My people seem to like the idea so we will try it. Some ideas work, but the majority don't, which is why you have to keep finding new ones to go with the odds.

I will speak with Indy tomorrow and confirm Saturday's trip to India. Unless there is a specific or impending attack, we will go.

Our people are making good progress with the new cable assembly operation. It looks like we can do everything in-house. The customer approved some samples today with more going to them next week. It is a lot of work, but all new areas are. Our team thinks the potential is good enough to pursue with extreme vigor and resources, so we will continue. The new laser is being hooked up and I hope we have the training for it by Christmas.

The heads of the three biggest U.S. automobile companies went before Congress again today. Last time, they flew in by corporate jet and had no plan. This time, they drove in hybrids and asked for a fortune. They don't get it. The only way for them to survive is if the union is broken and they can start from scratch. The union contracts have doomed them to oblivion and the only thing bailouts will do is postpone the inevitability of their takeover or demise.

Kayla has a swim meet. Wendy went to watch her and I hope they get home before I fall asleep so I can say good night.

After I got back from playing tennis with Ira this morning, Al came into my office and closed the door. This is always a bad sign, especially when she says it is not a bad sign. She handed me a printout of a new warning from the government regarding airports in India. Apparently, there were new terror threats, not to mention a very high state of security. At best, this meant probable long delays in getting anywhere and at worst, potential hijackings and death. What I found out later was that my wife had heard this on the news and called Al and they decided to try to get me to postpone my trip. After thinking logically for a few minutes, I cancelled the trip. I don't like be scared or to appear afraid, but there comes a time when being a white, American Jew in a country where terrorists were targeting "my kind" just did not make sense. It did not take long to cancel and rearrange everything, and I happily thought that fate was at work and I was meant to do something else next week, which also calmed me. As it turned out, the news was welcomed by virtually everyone among my family, office and friends, so it seemed like the right decision.

Meanwhile, David and I received a lead that Roman had gotten from a contact at Nortel. Since I now had time next week, I emailed the contact and offered to come down to see him next Wednesday to discuss our new cost reduction program. Had I not cancelled India, I would not have been able to schedule the potential call. Happily, it seems like it will work out and I have the chance at a company that I have been trying to break open directly for twenty years. It would most probably never have happened had I still been going to India. Fate? Maybe, and in a good way I like to think so. I am also determined to bring Indy into our group, so she and I will meet for lunch next week. I feel it in my bones that she can sell (especially the new cost reduction program), find potential customers and new products. I will pursue it.

After speaking with the parts designer, Andrew yesterday, I put together an email to our people to set up a group to determine if we can make and distribute custom add-on motorcycle pieces. We have a group of riders in our group and after a query from me, they are already sending in ideas and others are either getting patents and projects from others or helping to find selling areas. We have a little time to work on this. It is creative, which our people love, and a new area, which always gets the juices going. Giving someone a chance to use their brains can be like a long-term shot of adrenaline. Everyone loves the chance to create and think.

It is always fascinating how quickly things can change, and it is one of the parts of life I like the most. I hope to still get to India, but not until things calm down.

12/6/08 10:00 AM EST Home, NJ

I am writing in the cave with soft music playing and it is very calm. It did not take very long yesterday to cancel out the trip to India and get back to most of my normal schedule. This morning, after I slept for almost ten hours, I got up and made breakfast with Wendy and Kayla. Kay has only until Thursday to hear from Cornell and the tension level is reaching a fevered pitch. I really hope she gets in so some semblance of peace can return to our somewhat crazy household.

The economic news for the world continues to be mostly bad. About 500,000 jobs were lost in the U.S. last month, one out of ten mortgages are in some type of tardiness, the three large automakers are still trying to get loans, and there is a general fear throughout the nation and the world that things will get worse before they get better.

It is in times like these that I am so thankful to my grandfather and dad, who went through the Great Depression and numerous other bad times. The paranoia or rational fear - however you want to call it - that economic times are cyclical has forced them into a mindset to always prepare for the worst and try to profit from it. I am a paranoid optimist, which is a paradox that makes my life interesting. While I tend to see the silver lining and potential in most areas of life, I am also straight-jacketed by the fear of failure and of going backwards. What does this mean? It means that I have become a manic planner, trying to view all of the potential things that can occur and plan for them way in advance. People see me make so many fast decisions, but they are based on massive amounts of pre-thought that stems from my fear of failure. The increased paradox of that is that, over time, I have enabled myself to be able to count the fear, the actual failure itself and the knowledge that they both not only exist within me, but are rational and good to have actually freed me to move faster. I believe failure is necessary part of life because that is where I learn the fastest. I have come to count on it as a necessary step in the evolution of our company and in bringing myself to the next level. Based on percentages, if I am not failing in a certain amount of things I do, then I am not trying hard enough, taking enough chances or moving into new areas. It is like my Uncle Phil, the extremely successful man in the food business, has said: if he had a credit manager who had no bad debts, he would fire him because he wasn't taking enough chances with bringing in new customers.

An idea on a project that doesn't work is not a bad thing. It is a by-product of the process of moving ahead and if you can't handle it, you have to get out. By definition then, the higher and faster you move, the more failures you will have, but they should also begin to sting less, knowing they are the only road to travel. I don't like to lose

- no one does – but in the context of life and its movement forward, you can either accept it as an attempt that did not work, or let it start to destroy you. If you get to the point where you are looking back and figuring how much more you would have made if you had not done this or that, then you have lost the way forward. You could not be where you are now unless you traveled the road you paved. That is why we all have to keep looking ahead.

We put in a new cable assembly operation a few months ago. A cable assembly is usually a piece of electrical wire with various types of electric connectors added onto it. It sounds simple, but they can be very complex, and we went into the business knowing virtually nothing. My plan was to use an outside contractor to do the work until we could do it ourselves and then do most of it in-house. Unfortunately, the supplier we picked did a hatchet job on the products and although they seemed to test okay from our side, the entire shipment was rejected by the customer. Not only did we look incompetent, but the thought of going back to the same supplier to have him fix the problems, even though he was willing, was not appealing. I pooled our people together and asked them if we could learn to do it ourselves and they seemed to think we could, so we took the chance and brought everything inside immediately. We submitted samples last week and most were approved, so it looks like we are on our way. Part of the great advantage of having our staff is that they are happy to do anything to get the job done. In the case of this business, much of the work is being done by some of our MAC department people along with our head of dye making and manufacturing. No one says, "This is not my job," and everyone pitches in to make it work.

While all of this was going on, our new laser was delivered and our people were working to help install it. Not only do we save a lot of money and time doing the work ourselves, but also our people learn the operations much faster and give us a speed advantage to get new potential products into the field.

When times are tough and getting tougher, I believe the solutions are as much internal as external. I believe our people can do anything. We are only limited by the brakes we put on ourselves. With the multitude of experience and processes we control, there are limitless amounts of things we can make to sell. With our brains and our willingness to fail, we can try anything to see if it works better, faster or can be done more cheaply than before.

Through it all, we hired a new man to start on Monday. He will be on press because we have been down one person since Maria had her baby. He will also work part-time in the packing area. He is from Ecuador, has no job and just wants a chance. I hope he works out for all of us. If he does, we can take another person from shipping that he will augment and put her in the pre-press area to help there since they

are down some people who are working in the cable assembly area. We have no barriers; if the person can do the job, whether they are formally trained or not, they get the chance. That is why I am sometimes amused at the perceived importance of where someone went to college. In our case, I would be happy enough if those applying have graduated from high school, and going to college is a plus, but not a necessity. We train most people from scratch anyway, so where they went to school does not matter. Going is a good thing, but the experience of attending is usually enough. Ivy League schools, and in fact most colleges, give their graduates a skewed view of their worth after they graduate. As I have said before, I am prejudiced against people from the best schools because they have more to unlearn and usually have attitude problems.

By the way, regarding immigrants versus U.S. born citizens, I do not care. We look at the individual and whether they are young or old, from here or not, we only look at how they can fit into our team and whether they have the guts and willpower to learn our system, function well within it and have the positive upbeat attitude to add to our corporate culture. If they can't have fun and enjoy work, then they can't be at our company. Life is too short to be around those who are sour, depressed, condescending or bad in general. It is my world, my domain and I control it for the betterment of all of us involved and that is the way it is going to stay. Smiles, saying thank you, and pats on the back can turn a bad day into a good one. Our place is the sanctuary, the protected place where the rest of the lives of our people stay out, which is one reason why they like to be there.

I leave for biking in less than thirty minutes and have to get ready. It is about 32°F outside, so Uncle Dave and I will have to watch for ice patches. I will put on many layers and will look like a large bumblebee with my helmet and goggles. I don't mind looking different. Over the years, I have come to the conclusion that I am not the same as most people and find that it is a comfort to define myself that way. It makes those moments when I break out into song and dance that much easier for people to accept.

12/6/08 6:48 PM EST Home, NJ

I am back in the Cave. It has been a good, but somewhat strange day so far. I had been so ready to leave for India that now I am not going, I am a little unsure of what I should be doing. I went biking with Uncle Dave and it was very cold but invigorating. We were discussing what to do about my need for more space and our general consensus was to wait a little longer to see what options might still open up. Happily, we don't need more space this second, but not having it is cramp-

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ing us and hampering our expansion. Patience may be the best advice for the moment. I booked my flight to North Carolina to go see Nortel on Wednesday. It was expensive to get direct flights and the best idea seemed to go very early to make sure I am not late, which means I had to cancel tennis. I am scheduled to arrive about 8:00 AM and my appointment is not until 10:30 AM. We do have other customers down there, so I think I can fill in the time.

I have been giving a lot of thought to the motorcycle parts designer I mentioned.

Here are his pros and cons:

- 1. He is an excellent designer with an extremely good feel for finding what is needed and making solutions to fulfill that need.
- 2. He loves motorcycles and his passion for working with them is obvious.
- 3. He was able to find a market and began to exploit it.
- 4. He does not have the infrastructure to find additional places to sell the products.
- 5. He does not have the resources to release more than one product at a time.
- 6. He does not have the personality to sell directly himself.
- 7. His strength is in design and person-to-person communication, but he does not work well through email or over the telephone.

The question then comes up, do we want to deal with him on more than a customer supplier relationship like we do now. My feeling is if that he was left to find products to design, research the best and most-cost effective ways to produce them, and then hands off for the products to be produced, marketed and sold, it might be the best of all worlds. It would seem that working together might be good, since we do have the marketing skills, the sales force, and the financial position to fund the prototypes and initial production.

Tough times bring unusual possibilities that would not normally come up. If the designer's business was booming, he would not need us. If we did not want to expand into additional areas besides Telecom, then we would not have been talking to him. But we were which leads me to think there might be some synergy between our two companies. The next question arises of what to offer and how to do it. I do not think he wants to sell his company; he seems to me to want to keep control. Perhaps then, we could work on a project-by-project basis. We could offer him a commission on a design he brings us plus all sales that are received. That would free him from having to finance it himself and also not join our two companies too closely together.

The next question is how much to offer. If he is experiencing tough

times, then the outlays he has been doing to launch his products have got to be causing him financial pain. The question is then, what is it worth to him to be able to give that up and just take a share of the profits? My guess is that the chance to center on design and what he loves and leave the rest to someone else would be something he would love, especially getting access to our marketing and sales worldwide. Therefore, if we offer him \$5000 for any of his ideas we accept and then a 10% gross commission on any sales that occur, that will help to strengthen his short-term cash flow, stem his cash outlay and also give him a chance to capitalize on whatever good happens, plus he will not be stuck if it doesn't. Of course, our designers would also be creating new products, and unless we asked for help from him, he would have no participation. If we did, we could split the difference. I am not sure what money means to him, whether it is a big deal or simply a means by which to live as he chooses. Money means different things to different people and I would never assume that my views would apply to him. The best way is of course to ask, but first I need to give this plan to my people to ensure they agree, since we will all have to work together. It is of course wrought with danger if it doesn't work, but then again, so is everything else. We will have to have a rock hard agreement about who owns what design and for how long. Obviously, from my side, if I pay him \$5000 for the design, then my company owns it. I am not sure, but we probably would not bother to patent or trademark any of it because the potential legal defense will probably not be worth it.

By the way, I had the idea that we can use our new laser to actually personalize all of the parts we produce, which means everyone can have their own name, logo or anything else on whatever they want, as long as we design it that way.

I love new areas. They bring out such rushes of creativity and adrenaline that it really doesn't matter if they themselves work out. The mere experience of trying new things keeps everyone jazzed up and excited, which transfers to everything we do.

This morning, I played tennis with a new guy. We had spoken about it a few years ago and I said I would call; better late then never. He is good, but does not play much which is the reason I was able to win one set. With a new president coming in, having a program bashed is not a good way to sustain funding, so I asked the head of PTrack if he would mind if I responded. He was fine with it, so I plan to write something tomorrow.

One of the many great things about owning my own company is that there are few people I have to answer to. They are my wife, my kids, my VPs and Ben in China. In this case, since I also checked the head of PTrack, which means if I want to write back the newspaper and let them know how I feel about the author, their paper and the groups backing them, then I have a green light. I am already angry and I haven't even read the article yet. But it is time to stand up for the group that has done so much good for us.

I had lunch yesterday with Indy. My plan was for her to start "birddogging" for us. Bird dogging is a hunting term that refers to when a hunting dog finds birds for the hunter. In the same way, she would find leads for us to try to sell our various services and product lines. She was receptive and I have high hopes for her contacts, perseverance, passion for success and the love of the hunt. Selling is a strange game; it attracts a very select group of people who crave the feeling of having made something out of nothing. The savoring of the success is often increased by the amount of effort it took, so it is the whole process that brings joy, heart break, success, failure, rejection, submission and passion all in the same process. If you do it right, it never ends and can bring continual energy to life.

I visited a rest stop on the Parkway on the way back to the office, had a quick nap and bought a large soft pretzel, which was excellent.

I got home last night and only Bailey was there, who was happy to see me. The plane is ready, the crew is ready, and we are ready, but the ramp to the plane is not. I hope we disembark soon. Happily, I have some time on the other side in case we are delayed.

In Flight to Kennedy Airport, New York

We landed early. I got my car and started towards my first call. Unfortunately, I headed in the wrong direction on the main highway. By the time I figured out my mistake, I lost about thirty minutes, but was still okay with time. Unfortunately, I did not trust my MapQuest directions – a bad mistake – and ended up stopping for directions one more time in addition to having to call once. I finally made it about ten minutes late. The company was an Alcatel-Lucent sub-contractor and the man I saw had been dealing mostly with Alice at our office and really liked her. It is always good to hear great things about our team. We talked for a while. He is hoping to retire in a few years; something that should not be an option for me for a long time. I may try different things, but actually retiring is not something I dream about.

After the call, I made my way back up the main road and got to Research Triangle Park. Some of her friends are going also, so she won't be alone. It will still be very tough to drive away with her still being there.

The Senate shot down a package to bail out the three car companies. Their unions balked at the idea of renegotiating their contract and preferred the possibility of bankruptcy. I have seldom seen a union do anything good for their members, only for their own hierarchy. The printing industry was filled with stories about union leaders destroying segments of the business as opposed to working with the changing times and needs of the people they served. I think the bailout is a bad idea and if the companies fail then they should go under. No one is going to help small businesses and obviously the bailout of Chrysler years ago did nothing to make them more competitive today. Capitalism is a tough system and if they can't make it on their own, then it is their problem. Besides, I also see everywhere people who are buying foreign

cars are still saying we should bail out the auto companies. They have done a lousy job in all areas and it is time for a new generation of car manufacturers in the U.S. to emerge without the burdens of unions that would rather kill the companies than be competitive. I believe we can competitively make cars in this country, but not with the current companies in place.

The Bank of America announced massive layoffs, and other companies are announcing more. The problems are not over, but there will come a time when all of the cutting will be done and things can then stabilize and begin the movement back upward. In the meantime, we will push our new cost reduction programs that will enable our customers to be more competitive with better products in faster time frames and gain more market share. We can grow together and that is our plan.

David has been really sick and lost most of his voice this week while he and Stuart were in Illinois on sales calls. The good news is that they got through them all and Stuart was able to pick up the slack when David's voice totally gave out. I hope David is okay. I may force him to take a few days off.

Uncle Dave found some space for us to rent nearby and we are going to look at it on Monday. Unfortunately, the available area in our building is way too expensive. In three years we can move to a new space and maybe our own building. By then, I am sure it will be a pleasure to reconnect all of our local sites into one spot. I hope we can afford to buy our own place.

I slept over nine hours last night and I really needed it.

I got up, had pancakes with Bailey and finished the December Newsletter. Then it was time to get ready to go biking with Uncle Dave. The weather here has been cold – barely above freezing – and with the wind chill, it feels much colder. I had on a lot of clothes, but even so I was cold at some points. It is time to start thinking about stopping for the winter and biking indoors. Afterwards, I went shopping for Kayla. Tonight was her annual "Midnight Run" with our temple. were in his group and if he would be interested in taking part of his group to work for us. We could reduce the number of people Sanmina needed for the same amount of work, and they would pay no benefits since they would be our employees and they could be virtual, which also means no location expenses for them. He liked the idea, so I drafted a proposal he could send to a vice president he knew this afternoon. Having taken over the Alcatel-Lucent Industrial Design group is turning out to be a big plus for us; the branding of being with them is big. We shall see if this one works out.

Six of us went to see the space that Dave Williams found and it was not suitable. Then we went back to our old building and saw the bottom floor, which we had occupied before moving in Maplewood. Tim, the landlord, was always a good guy and we got along. The guys liked the space, so Tim and I negotiated and came to a deal. We should have the lease to sign later this week. We will send over the entire inventory three years and older plus all storage materials. We will probably only need to be there once or twice a week. I will offer Uncle Dave some space there to move his printing company. I hope it works well for all of us.

Alex is home and went to Long Island to drop off his friend who he drove home with from school. I should see him tomorrow.

We got a call tonight that Flextronics in Chicago needs products at a Flextronics facility in North Carolina tomorrow. I offered to send one of our guys down by plane and they agreed. Our anniversary was today, 24 years Wendy and I have been married, a very good thing!

As it turned out, Mike went instead of 3Gor to North Carolina and it seemed to work out well. 3Gor stayed and worked with his team on the cable assemblies that needed to be finished and Mike was able to work to and from the customer. To get him home sooner, we changed his flight to LaGuardia and he taxied back to Newark Airport to get his car. One of my tennis partners has diabetes and his blood sugar was too low to play this morning, so I ended up coming home to work out on the treadmill. It turned out fine however, first because I did not want him to get sick, but also because I could watch a television program with some financial specialists. One of them made sense to me and predicted two more years of economic problems. I am planning to try to give us the advantage during this time. The Sanmina engineer and I spent part of the day working out an attack plan. He is following it well and we will see how far it gets. I found out about another plant closing today; more people out of work. There are more companies

shrinking, giving us the opportunity to help them not only to take on their people, but also to get business. The following is the gist of what we are offering. This will be sent from the company engineer, designer or whatever position to the upper management of their company:

As we all know, our company is going into a period of high turbulence. A lot of people are losing their jobs, however the company itself needs to go on and hopefully be in a better position to not only weather the immediate storm, but also excel in the new emerging environment.

In that end, I have a proposal that I hope might be of some interest. I believe that our company needs to do the following to remain viable:

- 1. Cut the workforce
- 2. Cut the benefits to the remaining people
- 3. Cut the infrastructure needed to support the remaining people

With that in mind, I was called today by Andrew Jacobs, president of Ideal Jacobs Corporation. They are a small multinational company who recently took over one of Alcatel-Lucent's Industrial Design groups located in New Jersey. They currently have design centers in the U.S. and the Netherlands and are creating one in China. They hired the Alcatel-Lucent people with the following benefits:

- 1. Alcatel-Lucent dropped them from their payrolls.
- 2. Alcatel-Lucent only pays for the work they want done.
- 3. These people know the company and what is expected so there is no learning curve for the new people.
- 4. They helped to take care of some employees who otherwise might have been in trouble.
- 5. They could do the same for one or all of our engineering/pricing/ design groups worldwide. It could be a way to save money, help some of our people, and get more work done.

Right now, we have approximately eight people in our departments. If Sanmina is interested, Andrew would be willing to hire some of them and make them virtually based in Canada. The workflow through this group would be unaffected. However, he feels he can do it with fewer people so that the cost to Sanmina for the same work will be substantially reduced and he will still make money. If this idea has any merit, please let me know and I will have Andrew contact either you or whoever else would be involved to set up a meeting next week.

Our new laser will be ready for training tomorrow and then we can start making products – very exciting!

I will prepare a new world sales plan and send it to Ben next week for review. The next two years will be critical in our growth and profitability and we all need to be in agreement for it to reach its potential.

We also spent the day getting ready for the ISO 9001/2000 and ISO 14001 audits next week. It will be good to go through them and be finished. Getting ready for the end of the year interior audits is always a big deal. Having the UL people come in is happily forcing me to do it earlier than normal.

It was a cold day today and I found myself thinking about the warm air of summer. We have a long way to go, although the winter solstice is within two weeks and then the days start getting longer again, which is the first step towards spring.

Roman is done. He did not accept the reduction in pay, the new job description or the offer to be a consultant. I moved Alex, our prototype man, into the position of being head of cable assemblies in dealing with AL. He is already stationed in Whippany a few days a week, knows most of the people involved and just needs to learn the nuts and bolts of the business. I have confidence that he can do it. He is nervous and doesn't want to disappoint us; good motivators to learn and do well.

I made reservations for rooms for when we take Kayla to school. It is hitting me that she is actually going away to college. I need to get a handle on this so I am okay in the summer when we drop her off.

Our assault on Sanmina-SCI to take over their design and costing groups is temporarily stalled. I am going after them myself now and emailed the president of the division in California. If there is no word tomorrow, I will call him and see how far I can get. I did speak with a VP from Commscope, who have known for a long time and they may be interested in our industrial design capabilities. We have a lot of great things to sell; it is a fun challenge.

One of our customers shut down their facility in New Hampshire. The VP of product development is a good man. We have been talking. He wants to keep his development team together and today we discuss adding their capabilities to our company. That would mean we could do everything from initial design through finished product including re-designing for cost reduction. We will finalize tomorrow and he will probably come on board as VP of product design. The big challenge is going to be finding work to keep everyone productively busy. This means attacking various companies and having them fire their in-house teams and replace them with better, faster outsourcing – namely our group. It will probably be a tough sell at the beginning, but if we can get it going, the profit potential for all areas of our company is enormous. We even have the capability of low-cost production in Asia. These are all of the parts of our master plan to become a partner for specific companies we have yet to target. I am thinking that the small companies might be better targets, or maybe the niche areas of larger ones. I won't know until we actually get out there and start selling.

We designated Alex as the liaison for Alcatel-Lucent for the cable assemblies. He needs some support and training, but I think he will be great. We all agree it is a good area. We will do our best to move the learning curve at warp speed, but I doubt I will be willing to put in much more testing equipment until the payback is better.

Mike's mom had a brain aneurism today. We all hope she ends up okay. I do not expect to see him again until Monday.

I met with Nancy today. She is a medical intuitive, which means she can read the energy areas around and inside the body to see potential problem areas. She also does work with regression (checking for past lives) and can hear from people who have passed. I know it sounds strange, but I have known her for almost twenty years and believe that she is not a fraud. We spent some time together today and her training as a therapist also came into play. We are building a network so we can develop, change or make almost anything. I love where we are going, but we need the sales to justify the expenses and exposure. The government is bailing out GM and Chrysler for the short-term. I don't think it is a good idea, perhaps as the rest of the country believes, but the politicians will do what they think is best. I hope they are right. My writing has become a very important part of my job, whether it is corresponding with customers and potential business, my book, scripts for CDs, or newsletters, it is all communication to help keep us out there. I like it.

12/20/08 3:22 PM EST I am in the Cave – Home, NJ

I slept for almost nine hours last night and probably needed more. I got up, made breakfast for Wendy and myself, and went out to shovel. It was especially tough because the waterlogged snow last night had frozen. I had to use my large flat metal ice scraper to get between the driveway/walkway and break it away piece by piece. It was a lot of heavy work, but I got almost all of it done in time to go see Uncle Dave. He is doing well and we had a nice walk, except when he slipped on a patch of ice. He appeared to be okay and I went back home to finish the driveway. It is done until tomorrow, when we are expected to get more snow. I have been working on a plan for next year's sales efforts for Ideal Jacobs worldwide. Below is what I have come up with so far. Once I have finished, I will pass it to our VPs and Ben for review. Once finalized, it will be our working blueprint for next year, not as written in stone, but as a working quide to help keep us on track.

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Here is my plan for moving forward as a global company for 2009, please send me your feedback.

- 1. Plant and company closings here, like in Asia and all over the world have accelerated and will probably not stop until 2010; therefore, part of our strategy has to center on how to not only deal with this as a problem, but also view it as potential business. With that said, we are already beginning to attack these companies immediately upon hearing of the potential closings and seeing if we can hire part of their design, engineering, estimate staff before the business is lost to their other sites. Since our people could be virtual, and they do not pay them any benefits or have to have a location for them to work, they are much less expensive. In addition, we have found that it usually only takes half of the people to actually do the work so we make money on all fronts. Once our people are in these key design, engineering and development areas, then they can help to designate us for the components for the parts the companies are manufacturing. We gain on all fronts: we make money on them as employees doing their jobs, we have first shot at being the supplier of choice on their drawings and we know what the company is planning to do so we can tailor our product offerings to get more of the business.
- 2. Cost Reductions: Up until now with our cost reduction program, we have been able to offer everything from redesign to new design to making enclosures and swapping components. But we have not been able to actually re-design the interior electronic and software "guts." One of our customers, Rivulet, has just shut down its plant in New Hampshire. The former VP of Product Development, Brett Claydon, will start work with us next week to take over the position with us. His job will be to fill in that last piece we could not offer before. Now we can do everything from concept to long-run, from re-design to cost reductions to implementation. We can offer the whole package.
- 3. In tough times like these, going to a prospective or current customer and telling them the standard line of what we make will probably fall on deaf ears. What we have to appeal to what the customer wants and that is simple to identify. The most important thing is keeping their job and the second is a better job. How will they keep their job? Many have been cost-reducing like crazy, but will quickly come to the point where their suppliers will break down either by using increasingly inferior products, longer

lead times or by going out of business. In any of the cases, shortrun suppliers will quickly become their greatest assets since we are coming in for the rush, shorter-run jobs, price is much less of a problem and puts us in position to take more to that business.

- 4. New Product Areas: In 2008, we expanded into gaskets, prototype cable assemblies and now have our new laser. The purpose of all of this is to supply more products to our existing customers and to spread out laterally to people we are already dealing with. It is much easier selling, different products to existing customers than finding new customers, therefore expansion – not only laterally, but in volume – for existing products is extremely important. At this point, I do not see a reason to buy any new equipment, at least here in the U.S. for 2009. However, every time I say that something new seems to arise. We are contracting for an additional 4,000 square feet of space at a new facility because we are out of room. A very good sign.
- 5. The main moneymaker of our business has been labels, and it will continue to be for the foreseeable future. The many benefits of this area have consistently kept it as our highest profit area. IJX has been able to move into this profitable area and will continue to actively pursue it. Even IJUS has gotten more into this area because of customer demands to supply all levels of service. The question is how to keep feeding the highly profitable area with new business as the old drops off. I am hopeful that the four areas above will help.
- 6. Personnel: regarding sales for 2009.

Andy

I will focus on the cost reduction programs for the product manufacturers because they design and make the first runs of the products. I will also center on taking over the engineering groups for both manufacturers and contract manufacturers worldwide. I see my function as getting us into new areas, getting us chances at large pieces of business and then having the rest of the IJ team take over. I will watch for chances to take over other companies and try to stay ahead of what the market needs.

Ben

IJX has done extremely well in 2008 and I would change nothing in what they are doing regarding labels or other parts. For new business, they can keep as they are going or offer the new services listed in items 1-4. Asia is a different market from North America and Europe and I will leave it to you. I do think items 1-4 will add some great

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weapons for sales and when we meet in Europe, we can go over how I plan to sell it so you can do the same in Asia. Obviously, my efforts at worldwide sales should benefit IJX and I will need your help when dealing with their groups there.

David

You are in charge of expanding on business we already have. You will focus on business from contract manufactures and expanding on items 1-4. When opportunities come up, we can attack on the main parts of items 1-4 and then you go from there. You are also responsible for all overall sales outside of Asia as needed and making sure that the contacts of the people we take on are exploited as quickly as possible. IJ Netherlands is profitable and with the addition of some of the Alca-tel-Lucent label stocking there for Europe, should be expanding. Do the best you can with them. As for Mexico, you are going there four times a year. If and when the Sun business leaves, we need to move to replace it. If Ben wants your help, he will ask for it.

IJ India

With the recent terror attacks, I feel the chances for business there, especially with the global slowdown, are greatly reduced. I will probably still go there, but hold little hope for the short-term. I think there is much more profitable and easier business in North America and Europe and prefer to focus our attention and resources there. However, if our plans for taking over the global engineering groups for companies does workout, the engineering services of India might come into play – another reason for me to still go there.

In conclusion,

Our companies worldwide have done extremely well for 2008. If all works out well, we have the chance to not only pay off the IJUS debt for the loan to IJX (early I might add), but also become completely debt-free, including paying off the new laser and cable assembly test equipment. While I do not see 2009 or even 2010 to be good for the world economy, I do think we are extremely well positioned to handle what happens and profit by it. I think we are in the right place with the best team and our time is now, ready to soar.

I fell asleep and did not finish the 2009 sales program, so I went back this morning and added more. In the meantime, I got an email back last night regarding our proposal to Sanmina-SCI to take over part or all of their engineering groups worldwide. My overture was

passed to one of their heads of engineering, who emailed me back, skeptical of what I proposed, but willing to listen. I emailed him that I would get back to him on Monday. Here is the proposal:

Ideal Jacobs Corp. was established in 1921 by my grandfather, Morris Jacobs. We are a small multinational company with manufacturing plants in New Jersey and Xiamen, China and distribution centers in Guadalajara, Mexico and the Netherlands. Until recently, our major thrust has been in manufacturing specialized labels for telecommunications corporations and contract manufacturers, but we then spread out to fabric over foam gaskets, short-run metal and plastic parts and prototyped cable assemblies. This year, we took over the New Jersey Alcatel-Lucent Industrial Design group (please see attached), hired their staff and took over the group's design, color and feel in consulting and prototyping work. It is from there that we spread from design into cost reduction via re-designing existing products and their parts.

What we think you want:

- 1. Maintain the level of engineering you have for:
 - A. Being able to project costs for potential business so you can submit competitive bids.
 - B. Setup how things will be manufactured.
 - C. Decide where they will be manufactured based on capability, available resources and current demand.
 - D. Review products being made for cost reduction.
 - E. Create prototypes for those reductions and follow the path of sending them for your customer's review, acceptance and then putting them in production.
 - F. Being able to price projects quickly so that Sanmina-SCI can submit their bids faster and more efficiently than your competitors.
- 2. The problems we think you face:
 - A. Your market share is going down.
 - B. Your profit margins are being forced downward.
 - C. The more your people are pushed the less efficient they become, the slower work is done which delays bids, cost-saving measures and the ability to modify the various segments for overall cost savings.
 - D. Moving more products to Mexico and China is not yielding the levels of savings that were hoped for.
 - E. You are being pushed from all sides to reduce costs while increasing your levels of efficiency and profit potential.
- 3. The best of all worlds:
 - A. Have a worldwide engineering team that is fast, efficient and not only able to price new projects quickly and accurately but

also offer suggestions at the same time for cost reductions which will save money, bring products to market faster, and enable your company to make more money with less people.

- B. Not have the overhead of having part or all of your team on payroll, No benefits, no infrastructure to house them. Simply pay for what you use.
- C. Not having to fire the people yourself. If you change the system, then there is fewer problems with all parties involved instead of going through continual layoffs. In this case, the group would be moved to our company. After a review of all personnel, we would decide who stayed and it would be up to us to not hire as we see fit. Your company would not be involved and the emotional trauma would be deflected away from you to us. Since we are not personally involved, it should be a much easier transition for all involved.
- 4. What do we get?
 - A. By taking over all or part of your engineering sections we make money in a few ways. The first is obvious. If you group is currently costing, 7,500,000 per year worldwide and we can do the same service for 30% less then that is a major cost savings for you. We think we can actually do that and still make a profit for ourselves by reducing the head count, higher efficiency locally and doing it on a worldwide scale, which will also increase efficiency through less duplication of efforts.
 - B. We have a secondary profit area which is cost reduction. We have seen your products and feel we can have a major effect on cost-cutting, which will not only help your company become more competitive and help your bottom line, but also enable us to supply the cost-reduced components and parts. In other words, it will enable us to create a system where we can identify cost reduced parts or products, prototype them at no charge, take them to your customer for approval and then supply the cost reduced parts or product to you company. We would not do anything unless there was at least 15% reduction in your current costs. You would actually be getting a cost-reduction group in permanent high gear because we are doing it not only to help you, but also help us because we want the additional business.

It is the best of all worlds; we will watch everything, continually pushing for increased efficiency obtaining great results and for cost reductions in all areas to make money for both of our companies. The harder, smarter and more efficiently we work, the higher the returns for both of

our companies.

My suggested course of action:

- 1. You and I meet as quickly as possible. I will come to California and we see if we can work together.
- 2. We (Ideal Jacobs) will immediately go to your plants worldwide, interview your staff and see who we would keep.
- 3. You tell us how much you are paying worldwide for these people including their benefits and the associated costs of having their offices and support systems. We then tell you how much we can save you directly from taking over your groups worldwide. The projected cost savings on the cost reduction are impossible to predict, but would be a bonus to any proposal we give you.
- 4. We start with one location for three months to shake down the system and prove our worth.
- 5. After three months, we meet to review our work and if worthy, we take on the rest of the world.

We can either speak by telephone first or I can see you in person. Please let me know your schedule.

Yesterday was a crazy day. I was up fifteen minutes early so I could play tennis and get back to the office earlier than normal. We had both our ISO 9001 and ISO 14001 auditors in. Vinnie, Mike and I were involved in the audits and they went very well. The 9001 audit was done around 2:00 PM and the ISO 14001 finished at about 3:00 PM. The auditor was back in this morning to finish up. In between, I was working on our new sales presentation for trying to take over the engineering/design groups for various companies. It is a stretch, but you don't get anywhere if you don't push. I ended the day with a headache and went home, but not before I got more information from Sanmina-SCI about how many people they actually had in design, cost analysis and engineering. It looked like my estimate of their gross payout for personnel, their benefits and support was low, so last night I sent an

email with a revised amount of what I thought they were paying and how much we could save them. I then turned off my phone and went to bed. This morning, I woke up to find that the man had emailed me back soon after and said he got the information. Now we had to wait because I could not push anymore.

They did not talk much. I think they were a little overwhelmed at the possibilities. David and I took them to lunch and bought cookies for their long ride back home. As a general rule, you should always have cookies along when traveling. I am interested to hear their feedback. I have no idea what part of the plan we put out or anything they want to be involved with.

I emailed our groups at IJM, IJN and IJI to let them know our new marketing thrust and plan to talk to Jeroen and Indy in the next day or so. The last part of the day I spent in doing paperwork, getting some UL approvals going, and working on Caterpillar Corp. They have been having trouble and we thought our new program could help us all. I sent an email, but we don't know anyone there, so it is a shot in the dark. This will be the pattern for a while: target companies and attack with whatever program that will work best. We can help almost anyone not only save money, but also reduce their stress and end up with a solution that is good for all of us. We will only be seen as good guys to the people we ask to stay. It is our job to separate those who work hard from those who don't, and that will be the deciding factor of who stays. It could end up being an unpleasant process, but that is part of the deal.

Our cable assembly prototyping operation is slowly coming along and we are gaining experience and some confidence. It will take time.

Ben wants to come over on January 5th and leave the 6th. He wants to talk in person.

12/24/08 10:08 PM EST Christmas Eve – Home, NJ

The day started with a rainstorm, which covered everything with a sheet of ice and made for a difficult drive. I made it to the office without much trouble, but could not get to tennis. When I tried walking outside it was so slippery that I was forced to stay within the building parking area. There is not a lot of activity because of the holiday so I spent the day selling our new program to take over the design/ engineering/industrial design groups of various large corporations and speaking with Brett. It took them nine hours to get home last night, but I think they were happy they came. We discussed strategy and where to go from here. One goal is to revise our website to reflect our expansion. The potential is huge and we will pursue it heavily. I also traded emails with my new landlord about the new space in

Millburn. It flooded out once, so we can't get flood insurance. We are taking it anyway. I do not think Uncle Dave will be able to come with us and with the potential flooding problem, he may not want to come anyway. I sold some of our other product lines this afternoon and by the time I was ready to go meet Wendy for dinner, I was very tired. It has been a very productive week and a lot of hard selling, but no complaints from me. We need to get a first account for the new product line. It will be difficult to sell and the hardest part will probably be deciding who we will take with us from the company and who to let go. At most, we plan to keep 50% of the candidates, I am hoping that after interviewing, most of the choices will be obvious. People are predicting harder times for the next year or two, if I am right, then our new areas should he fit to help companies cope, and grow and us with them.

12/25/08 5:33 PM EST The Cave – Home, NJ

It is Christmas Day, which does not mean a lot to us since we are lewish, except it is a world holiday and most things are shut down. I hope the tenants of peace and goodwill purvey everywhere and we can begin more as one people in that direction. With that, I find myself with a small sense of disconnect since if my plans for the large company works, we will take over parts of them and immediately let go at least half of the people. I tell myself the only way to make these companies healthy and give them a chance at survival is to cut the waste. On the other hand, putting people out of work does not settle well. I tell myself it is okay, because as the companies become healthier, jobs will be created and more people can be hired. That is true, but in our case, it will be our decision about who is hired and who isn't, and we will not have a lot of time to make those decisions so I hope we make good choices. I have no patience for anyone who did not do the work they were paid to do or did not use their maximum efforts and skills during their workdays. To those, the gravy train is over and I will have no problem showing them the door. It is the others, who we may miss or misread that I worry about. We are offering a really good deal for those who we select to stay. Good jobs, being able to work from home, flexible hours, the ability and internal need to use their brains, hearts and a chance to make a better life for themselves and their families. It is a great gig for those who want and need to work hard and yearn for a chance to be something better. For those who want to just get by and do the least, they will be looking for work elsewhere.

Biking with Uncle Dave was very quiet today – no fights or yelling. He liked my plan for taking over the engineering, design, and industrial design sections of large companies enough that he wanted

to think about being a representative for us. I encouraged him and will send him all of the information necessary to look for potential candidates. All he has to do is find the situation and unfortunately, it will be a common one. We need those heads of companies facing immediate problems and eventual disaster because they are not efficient enough in handling their employees and preparing themselves to go after business in the marketplaces. It is also for those companies with products that are built too expensively that we can redesign for lower cost. We can take a company that is barely making it and turn it around to dynamo if they let us. The hard part will be to convince these owners, presidents and CEOs that we are one of their last chances and they will have to trust that we can do it. We can start section by section, but someone will have to grit their teeth and say go for it, then stand back and let us do our jobs. There are two potential problems. If the idea does not catch on, it will not hurt us too badly, but if it does work in multiple companies, then we could become overloaded guickly. Our window of opportunity will only last as long as the downturn – maybe two years – so we have to sell hard and guickly. There is rarely a good time to be laid back, patient and content. This "sell" has to be lightening fast and right to the top. The best thing is if we have someone there who can guide us to who makes the decision. It will preferably be someone we can hire to stay and help us run the sections. I have spent my life getting ready for a chance like this. We will make major positive changes across industries and the time is now to forget the limitations, even if they are there, and go for it across the board and without any fear. We will make mistakes, but we would do that anyway. The worse the economy gets, the better chance we have to sell.

Since it is technically a holiday for us, I got up at 5:30 AM instead of 4:00 AM, went to the office, photocopied a play for Kayla for her religious retreat, and played tennis with my brother, which was pleasant as always. I then raced home, picked up Kay and her boyfriend Max, whom I like, and we went in search of a temple in Morristown, NJ where they were being picked up along with other members of their group. Thanks to GPS, we found it easily and it turned out to be a temple I used to belong to about twenty-five years ago when I lived nearby in Morris Township. After dropping them off, I raced back to the office and Don, our computer specialist, was waiting for me, right on schedule. He was there until about 3:30 PM and I spent most of the time working on our annual ISO Quality and Environmental audits. I have some additional work to do on them and still run the OSHA audit.

After that, I went to see Nancy, the medical intuitive/channeller/ therapist. It was here that I made a discovery. I have had many trainers in my life, most physical, but some mental. Apparently, I needed some work to help me through the idea of having to decide who will be fired in this new business program. If we will only need 50% of the people working at a company, then someone has to decide who stays and who goes and someone also has to tell them. That person will ultimately be me and I have been having problems with letting a lot of people go, affecting their livelihoods and their families. A lot of times in my life, I do not understand why things happen until I am in them or they have passed. In this case while talking to Nancy, I realized I was there to learn to handle this. So be it; I am game and so is she, so we will continue to see how it goes.

I have generally figured that the ability of a person to handle stress directly relates to how successful they are and how much money they make. The more you can take on, the more you are worth. In my case, that meant absorbing the stress from all areas so I could process the data contained within it and boil it down to make my decisions. That is often why I seem to be able to make decisions so guickly and rarely second-quess myself since I have already processed it. The good part is that I can act quickly and decisively, but the bad part is that I am taking inside myself a lot of negativity, which I then have to deal with. If this is going to be coming in increasingly higher levels while taking on groups who have to be downsized, I have to find a better way to absorb the information. It is not going to be easy, but I am hoping Nancy can help me with ways to do it. In the meantime, we can also talk about channeling, past lives, help from people who have passed on and energy fields within my body. All in all, it is a very interesting journey and I am happy to be taking it. The strains of what is going on must be showing; Wendy keeps asking if there is anything she can do for me. Having a supportive, wonderful wife is good all the time, but especially amazing when you're attempting to jump to new levels. I am a very fortunate man and I know it.

After that, it was back home to dinner. Wendy was with me, but not eating. She, Alex and Barbara, Barry, went to New York City for lunch for my son, Alex's birthday. They had a great time, and a lot of food. Alex is now 20 years old. He is a man and has turned out great.

I woke up at 6:30 this morning from the middle of a dream. Yesterday, I had seen a note on my desk. I had asked David earlier to check the newspapers for a listing of companies in trouble and he had sent me a small list. One of them was the Canadian company, Nortel,

one I had been after for years. It occurred to me yesterday that it was a good time to attack them for our new program and for whatever reason this morning at 6:30 I wrote the first part of the email. This was a little dicey since the only contact I had with a vice president was from a man who no longer worked for us, but I figured I had nothing to lose. I finished the opening and eventually went back to sleep. After a nice breakfast out with Wendy, I went to my office and finished the email and it is now sent. If Nortel is in the kind of trouble I think they are, my offer of our new program may come at just the right time. In order for our process to work, the company has to be in bad enough shape where the people are worried about their jobs and bankruptcy but have not already gone over the edge. Timing is everything, and the only way to know how to get it right is hit enough chances so the odds will be in our favor. Next week should tell a lot when I begin to follow up on people I have contacted at various companies.

I got an email from our designer, Eric, who sent us the first renderings for the new motorcycle after-market parts and they are very cool. I showed them to my son, Alex, who thought they had potential, which says a lot. We will go over them intra-company this week and hopefully be able to start prototyping in the next few weeks. Eric is going to a big motorcycle rally down south in the spring and I would like to try to sell these if it is possible.

Then it was off biking with Uncle Dave. I had good news that our new landlord for our second site had agreed it was okay if Uncle Dave also set up in our new space. Unfortunately, there are some drawbacks there. It had badly flooded once when we were there and now no one can get flood insurance, so it is a little risky. However, the rent is low, the location is fantastic, and the landlord is trustworthy and nice, so we are going for it. Uncle Dave knows the possible dangers, so it is up to him and he will look next week.

The Pakistani Government is now massing troops along the Indian border. This is doing nothing to alleviate my worry and apprehension about not only going there to check out the place but to do business. I am now worried about traveling there again and may leave it up to the future when and if our new programs work out and wherever we need a distribution center. We may center on North America and Europe for the next two years, while letting Ben take Asia and trying to move past what we already have.

Back to the bike ride – it was cold, drizzly and foggy. Had it not been for the good company of Uncle Dave, it would have been dreary and seem to last a long time, but with him it was not bad at all. I like being outside, even in weather that is not considered perfect or favorable. Sometimes that is the reason I enjoy it – to be out when others think I am crazy, whether it is too hot, too cold, rainy, or snowy.

I am listening to the music of John Barry. Amongst other famous

scores like the movie themes to Midnight Cowboy and Out of Africa, he also wrote "Lions at Play." That music, better known as the theme for the film "Born Free", was popular when I was in grammar school. I remember playing that song in a clarinet trio with Tommy Stern and Steve Lang during our spring concert, which must have been about 1966. Tommy later became an attorney and Steve, a successful composer. Being in music was a positive thing for all of us and I know for me, from playing through high school and into college, gave me many experiences I never would have had otherwise. Unfortunately, having Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD) means I can no longer take the continuing repetition of playing music. It used to drive me crazy when I was younger, but I could still do it, now it has become impossible. The good side of have something like OCD is that if you determine you will do something, you can't stop unless you reach the conclusions you decide are satisfactory. In other words, if you decide you are going to be successful then, however you define it, you have to get there or you will literally drive yourself crazy in the attempt. It is the single best way to ensure something will get done: simply declare it to yourself and the task ahead when and to what must be done. I am not saying this makes you the easiest person to live or work with, but it does tend to either make you successful or destroy yourself in the attempt. I do not have OCD to the worst extreme and can give myself a little slack in some areas, so it is not as bad as it seems. However, when it comes to making sure the house it locked up at night and the lights are turned off, or being germ phobic and washing my hands, it can be a little self-destructive. None of us are perfect and it constantly reminds me, as I am checking or washing my hands, to be more tolerant. People think certain things are more important than I do and I should try to think from their point of view before I react.

I always believed that I was capable of certain things and that others were not. I was talking with Wendy about Mr. Obama and his wife. They are both competent, gifted people who started with very little and made it to the top. They believed they could do it and that nothing could stop them. I applaud their belief system and have decided that they should be emulated. If they have no bar to hold them, then none of the rest of us should either. I have done well and have absolutely no complaints, but there is no reason why I can't. The decisions rest with me. The capability to be more is there, I just have to constantly stay outside of my box and keep pushing. The worst that can happen is people say no, laugh at me and tell me I am out of my league. They don't matter because I have the ball.

It has been months since I went to Minyan and I confess I am not missing the service. Even though some of the members called and asked me to come back whenever I felt like it, I have not done so. The structure of the service is still not working for me, and in fact I am re-

belling inside at the thought of it. I should not have kept going simply because I felt the obligation to do so. That extra time has pushed me further past than I might have been. Had I stopped sooner, it might have made it possible to go on an infrequent basis as opposed to not at all. I have found my ties have been loosening to our synagogue. After Kayla graduates from high school, I am not sure if we will continue our membership. Maybe it is time for a change. We will have been there for about 23 years and that is a long time.

One of the standard rules for new salesmen is to go after every relative, friend, friend of a friend, people you knew in school, anyone you had any contact so you could try to sell to them. From the time I started selling in the family business, I had a problem with this, which came to a moment of truth when my dad told me to call an account many years ago and tell them I was taking it over. The words would barely get out of my throat and I found myself horrified that I was being given something, especially as a boss's son. I did not want help from my dad, my relatives or anyone else. I wanted to do it on my own. This was considered an extremely immature point of view by most people, and they were right, but in my case it forced me into a mode of being able to sell to people I had never met and to get into companies where I had no previous experience. That forging of my soul into iron had both great and detrimental effects. The good part was that I was not only able to open accounts of all sizes, but also do it well and guickly. The bad part was that since I had this innate talent, I felt no need to learn to handle accounts because I could always get new ones. Obviously, the immaturity is apparent, not to mention the frustration it brought my father, but it took several lost accounts before I realized I had to learn my craft so I did not waste my talent.

That talent has become especially useful now since I have become the main "rainmaker" for the company and the person responsible for opening new accounts, finding new pieces of business and new product areas. The success I enjoyed at the beginning gave me a confidence that has never left and I am truly grateful for finding out about it early. However, that early experience of being "given" an account and the negative feelings of being a boss's son galvanized my resistance to use the contacts of those close to me. This is both because if they did not go well I would have to deal with the problems from my team, and because I had hoped we would never have to use them.

As I said, this was and is an immature point of view and today I decided to stop it once and for all. From now on, we will utilize all contacts from any source whether they are friends, family, business or

anything else. It is not because things are bad – on the contrary, things are good. But we are entering into a recession for the foreseeable future and the chance for gaining new customers rapidly will never be as good as it will be now. People in trouble and in fear of losing their jobs are the best targets we have because we can help them on all fronts. We have to capitalize on my abilities and everyone else's contacts to penetrate now as deep and as fast as we can.

I believe we have something unique to offer. It is our duty and obligation to put it before as many people as possible, to help their companies, secure their jobs and to get us more business.

It is Sunday night. I am not tired; in fact, I am dancing to the music of Jim Croce as I write this. It is probably better I am doing it here in the solace of the Cave. I am not sure how my people would feel seeing me. Of course they don't seem to mind my singing in small quantities, but dancing may be pushing my luck.

When dealing in an economy like this, some of our best weapons are cash, a small amount of debt and a bank credit line. Over the last few years, I have channeled our debt through IJUS, keeping the other operations debt free. That is going to change. In order for me to be as mentally free as possible to go after the huge potential of business in the world, I need to have as few obligations on us as possible. Whether it is a defect in me that debt is bad or an asset, both can be considered true, and that is the way I am wired. I also need a lot of cash to finance the operations in which I want to engage, including setting up the new software and hardware group, taking over engineering and design groups of our customers, and other things that come along. Therefore, I will plan on moving money from IJX to here to help finance our expansion. Happily, we have it, which is a testament to Ben's team. While the chances I plan to take are not as big as opening in China, they will be large. If I am right, it will pave the way for a new chapter in our company. If I am wrong, it has happened before and as I take chances it will happen again. The stakes are continually getting higher and that makes it more fun, stressful and invigorating. I am not sure if Ben knew what he was getting himself into when he joined forces with me. He took chances being my partner and so far it has been a very profitable ride. He seems safe, but he is frustrated at the many changes and the forcing of seeing himself constantly starting over within the company. As we spoke, a plan emerged in my head. With him, we could take over his group, downsize it, do the same amount of work and charge AL 30% less and at the same time be involved with cost reducing a bunch of their products. As we spoke, he got both more excited and more constrained as if he did not want to let himself get too lost on the possibilities of what could be.
